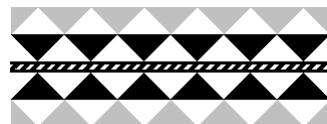

Language....

Wiyot Animal Stories



Do you know many Wiyot stories? I have featured a few of them on this page over the last year and a half, but you may have grown up hearing them from your parents or grandparents. Many traditional stories tell about how animals came to be the way they are. See how many of the following questions you can answer based on Wiyot tales (answers at the bottom of the page):

1. Why do **We'n Hushurrenuwilh** (Mole)'s front paws stick out sideways?
2. Why does **Svinughurrih** (Sand Cricket, aka Jerusalem cricket or potato bug)'s face look 'peeled'?
3. Why does **Hiwat** (Abalone) have red streaks in its shell?
4. Why does **Bitsoulaksh** (Owl) hunt at night?
5. Why doesn't **Gou'daw** (Eel) have any ribs?

As part of trying to better understand the Wiyot language, I am continually working to make these stories more widely available in the community. I have printouts of all of the stories referenced above, and many more, which I would love to pass on to anyone who is interested. Stories are copied from Teeter, Reichard, and Kroeber and converted to standard spelling; I edit the English translations to make them more readable, but the Wiyot is as told by native speakers (Della Prince, Jerry James, and others). Audio is available for most of the stories and other texts told by Della Prince; please contact me for materials and more information!

Genographic Project

Don't miss your chance to participate in the Genographic Project, a National Geographic sponsored study that is exploring human ancestry and migration across the world. Two members of the Project, Theodore Schurr and Jill Bennett Gaieski, have provided information to the tribe, and attended the Elder's Dinner and Intertribal Gathering at Redwood Acres last November to work with interested individuals.

The project is tracking human movements by studying DNA markers that women inherit from their mothers and men inherit from their fathers. These markers define lineages that are passed down through maternal and paternal ancestors in human families from the distant past to the present.

Through the analysis of DNA markers, we will be able to explore the ancestry and history of indigenous communities in the U.S., and assess their relationships to other first peoples in the Lower 48, Alaska, and Canada.



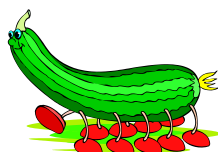
Participation in the project involves a consent process, an interview about your family history, and a cheek swab to obtain DNA for the marker analysis. Participation is free and information about your distant family ancestry will be provided to you. Participation in this study is entirely voluntary. The Wiyot Tribe's Community Garden Update

The community garden has been slightly delayed from the June storms but we are very close to providing great, nutritious fruits and vegetables to the residents on the reservation. So far early vegetables, including lettuce, zucchini, sugar snap peas, chard, kale, and broccoli are close to being harvested and will be handed out to tribal residents and/or be used for community events such as the elder's lunch. The department plans to continue harvests into the early fall months before the winter frost occurs. Upcoming arrivals to look out for include: squash, cucumbers, pumpkins (in time for Halloween), tomatoes, green cabbage, bush and pole beans, cauliflower, and carrots.



Volunteers are always welcome to come and help out or if you are interested, just stop on by and we will be happy to give you a tour. If you have any questions, suggestions, and/or would like to pick up some information, call or visit the Environmental department.

The Importance of Water: "Where You Live" by Tim Nelson

In July, the Boys & Girls Club of Wiyot Country learned about nonpoint source (NPS) pollution in both the urban and rural environments. This lesson was then followed up by a guided tour around the constructed wetlands at the Potawot Health Village.

During the lesson, students learned about both urban and rural environments and how nonpoint source pollution affects each environment. To begin, students were taught that NPS pollution is pollution that is man-made or natural that is picked up by rain or snow and carried into a waterway. Unfortunately, NPS pollution is the primary factor affecting water quality health in the U.S. and offers challenges to identifying the source of contamination. The lesson was used to tie into previous lessons on watersheds and groundwater in order to show how NPS pollution in the rural/urban environment can affect the entire watershed. When describing the differences between the urban and rural environments, one key topic concerns the surface of the land. In more urban areas, the ground is almost primarily impervious as concrete, asphalt, roofs, etc. do not allow for the absorption of water. On the other hand, more rural areas contain almost primarily pervious surfaces such as grass, soil, sand, etc. In one city block the pollution generated from impervious surfaces such as roads and roofs can be nine times greater than a woodland area of equal size. This is due to the inability for water to infiltrate the soil but travel off roads, into storm drains, and dump out into our nearby waterways and eventually the ocean.

Both urban and rural areas have pollution issues but the large population densities combined with the large area of impervious surfaces makes urban areas a much greater concern in regards to nonpoint source pollution. In both urban and rural areas, the top pollutants of concern are hydrocarbons like oil and gas from vehicles, heavy metals from combustion and runoff from roofs, sediment from construction activities, trash, fertilizers and pesticides, etc. In Los Angeles

alone, there are an estimated 26 million cars on the road! The amount of oil, gas, soot, and carbon output in urban areas is mind boggling when compared to smaller rural areas. Therefore, we as humans need to derive best management practices (BMP's) in order to deal with NPS pollutants. Since it would be impossible to halt every American from driving an automobile, we have created ways to deal with pollution as it is generated. For example, storm water retention basins act as catchment basins for storm water runoff from oil and gas slicked roads. Once in the basin, the water is held, treated by wetland plants, and slowly ejected either into another basin, into a field, etc. thus preventing pollution from entering our waterways. Other examples include buffer strips, permeable pavers on driveways, diversion trenches, silt fences, and many more.

The Potawot Village once resided on wetland plains where the Wiyot people would traditionally come to collect plants for cultural practices. This land was then converted into pastureland for cattle raising thus eradicating the wetland habitat along with the culturally important plants. In order to address storm water pollution issues, the Potawot Health Village constructed wetlands around the center in order to catch hydrocarbons from the parking lot, runoff from the roofs, etc. The parking lot is purposely sloped toward vegetated areas that gravity feed the NPS pollution into culverts that drain into wetland ponds for treatment. Similarly, all the roof gutters empty into these treatment ponds where any heavy metals eventually settle to the bottom of the ponds and are treated by wetland plants such as azola, tule, horsetail, cattail, etc. Also, basket making demonstrations are held at Potawot and materials used (i.e. tule) come directly from the wetland itself.



These constructed wetlands are a great example at how we can adapt to the presence of NPS pollution by treating it on site.

Money for College

Wiyot Scholarship Deadline August 1, 2010

It's not too late! If you are interested in attending a college, university, trade or vocational school this fall and you need money to do it make an appointment with the Social Service Director to talk about financial aid. Financial aid includes all types of money, loans, and work-study programs offered to a student to help pay tuition costs and living expenses. The Social Service Director can help you with some financial aid basics like filing your FAFSA, and applying for a BOGFW, EOP or EOPS. The Social Service director also keeps a binder of available scholarships. Stop by her office to see if you qualify for one or more of these scholarships.

The Wiyot Tribe has two types of scholarships available to college students. The Bureau of Indian Affairs scholarship is available once per semester to college students in good standing. The BIA scholarship requires completion of an application and statement of financial need from the colleges' financial aid office.

The Wiyot scholarship is competitive and broken into three types, part-time, Full-time 2.0 or higher, and Full-time 3.0 and higher. The application process includes a form, personal statement, letters of recommendation, and college transcripts.

If you are interested in one of these scholarships please make an appointment with Michelle (707) 733-5055. Time is running out....the deadline for the Wiyot Scholarship is August 1st and classes begin at most colleges at the end of August.

For those proud men...

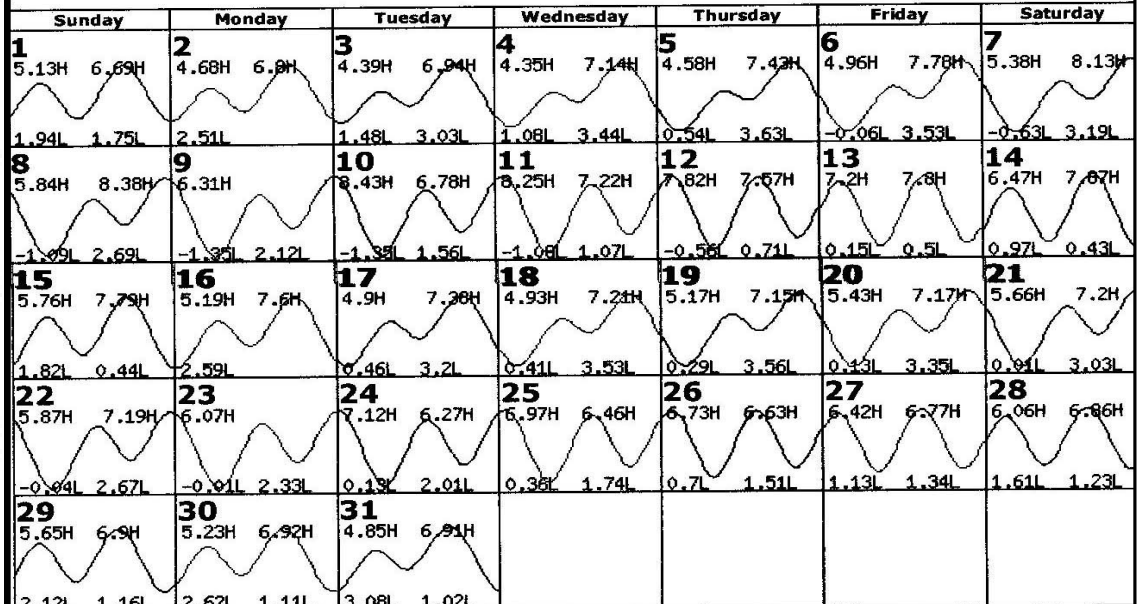

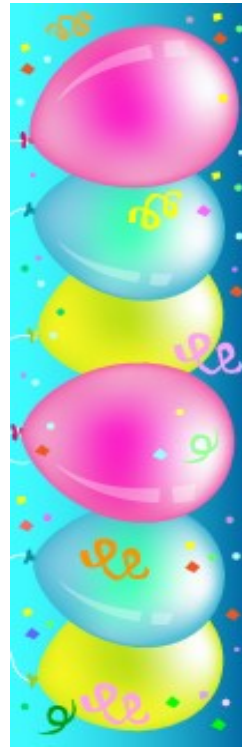

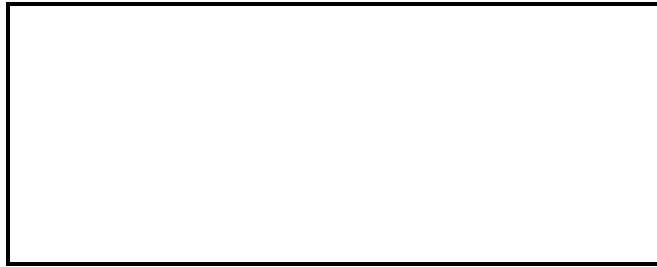
