Katherine "Kaye" Deyarmie 1925-2010

Katherine "Kaye" Frances Deyarmie passed away on Thursday, April 22, 2010, at the Willows Care Center in Willows, California. She had been ill the past few years, requiring her to be on dialysis, as well as having heart problems and recently was diagnosed with cancer. She died peacefully in her sleep. She was born on July 28, 1925, in Eureka, California, to William P. and Ethel A. (Hecker) Wilkinson. She was the 3rd oldest of 6 daughters and 2 sons. Her early life included classical violin training, as well as operatic voice training. She was a member of the Wiyot Tribe – Table Bluff Rancheria, of Loleta, California. She was married on December 7, 1942, to Gene M. Deyarmie, who was a young sailor stationed at Samoa in Humboldt Bay. While he served overseas in the Pacific during WWII, she worked as a "Rosie the Riveter," and became a journeyman welder building dry docks. After her husband's return, he worked as a logger, and they lived in various logging towns around northern California, where she often played "fiddle" in local logging camp western bands. During the 1950's, Kaye and her husband and children moved to Oregon, where she was the "quintessential ranch wife," helping her husband with ranch operations, while raising her 3 children. She sewed, crocheted, knitted, baked, canned, as well as helped bring in the hay or fed young calves. Nearly every night, she would sit by a window, play her guitar and sing her children to sleep, or tell them stories of her younger life, mostly about her relatives among the Wiyot/Bear River Community of Humboldt County, CA. She was active in PTA, as well as church choir, and often she and her oldest daughter would perform duets at church functions. In 1961, she and her family moved to the Sacramento area, where she lost her husband to cancer in 1965. After his death, she worked as a cashier, a maid, and a laundress until her retirement, living in Eureka, Arcata, King Salmon, Citrus Heights, Roseville, Williams and Colusa. For the last 16 years, she resided at the Eskaton JFK Senior Center in Willows, California, where she was very active in the Residents' Council, serving in various officer positions, as well as being well-known for donating many beautiful crocheted afghans to raise money for the charitable concerns of the Council.

Kaye was preceded in death by her parents and husband, her sisters Lucy Sand, Wilma Landers, and Virginia Graham, and brothers Daryl Hecker and William Wilkinson Jr. She is survived by her sisters Joyce Startare and Karen Arnold, her children: Tim Deyarmie, Pat Wright, and Nancy Deyarmie, her grandchildren Todd Deyarmie, Ken Scriven, Charlie Wright, and Stevie Nez. She also leaves 3 great-grandchildren: Brittney, Tyler, and Justin Scriven, and many nieces, nephews, and cousins. It was Kaye's wish to be cremated, and her ashes returned to her homeland in Humboldt County. She believed the Redwoods to be the most beautiful place on earth. There will be no funeral, but a memorial for her will be held at the JFK Community Center, 714 North Humboldt, Willows, CA, on May 7, 2010, at 6 P.M. Another memorial was held in Eureka, CA, for her family on June 12, 2010.

Maps of Wiyot Territory

This month I began researching historical maps of Wiyot territory with the aim of eventually mapping the 200+ Wiyot place names that were recorded by J.P. Harrington and others. I recently spent a week in Washington, D.C. where I was able to copy several historical maps of this area.




left) In this detail of an 1851 map of California's "Gold Region", Arcata is still called Union, and the Eel River is referred to as the "Mendocino or Eel River".

Wiyot place names

Goudini = Arcata

Jaroujiji = Eureka

right) This detail of an 1852 Census map of California shows "Vandusen's Fork" and Bucksport. Notice how different Humboldt Bay and the mouth of the Eel River look compared to the map from just a year earlier!



left) This picture shows a detail of a 1907 map of the area, with more modern (English) place names. At the time of this map, Eureka's population was 7000 and Arcata's was 1000.

- **Hitwulh, plhutk walh** = a basket and a rock
- **Tsanats, plhutk walh** = a spoon and a rock



Update on the Marine Life Protection Act (MLPA)

The big MLPA news this past month is the Regional Stakeholders Group (RSG) completed its Round 2 proposals for North Coast MPAs. The RSG was split into two groups and each group came up with two proposals, for a total of four. Although we were successful in removing an MPA from the mouth of the Eel River, there are proposals for MPAs in the South and North Bay, off the coast of Samoa, South Cape Mendocino, and Mattole Canyon. There are also some new Special Closure Areas, which will prohibit any access to the area. These are all at off shore rocks, including Green Rock, Flatiron Rock, False Cape Rock, Sugarloaf Island, and Steamboat Rock (see map below). As before, all of these proposals included language that traditional tribal gathering, subsistence and ceremonial uses will not be restricted. The Department of Fish and Game, however, has stated that such exclusions from restriction will not be allowed under the existing law.

On June 28, Satie Airame from the MLPA's Science Advisory Team (SAT) will be meeting with Council, Staff, and Tribal Citizens to discuss potential impacts and remedies from the Round 2 Proposals. The SAT is responsible for determining levels of protection in each area, including what uses, if any, will be allowed. There will also be a meeting of the North Coast Tribal Coalition on June 21 in Klamath to discuss strategies for dealing with the MLPA.



State Water Resources Control Board Denies Petition Joined by Wiyot Tribe

In April, the Wiyot Tribe joined a petition and complaint filed by Friends of the Eel River (FOER) to the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) requesting that the Board modify the water rights of Pacific Gas & Electric in regards to their Potter Valley Project (PVP). The PVP, a 9.2 megawatt hydroelectric facility, has diverted flows from the upper Eel River to the Russian River for over a hundred years, contributing significantly to a long decline in Eel River health.

The Eel River is suffering in many obvious ways. Hydrology alterations, physical impediments (such as dams associated with the hydroelectric facility), reduced flows, and sedimentation have all contributed to the precipitous decline of Pacific lamprey (eel) and salmonid species, some nearing the brink of extinction in the river. Failing legacy logging roads and historic logging practices have added tremendous sediment loads to a river already rife with unstable geology, increasing turbidity of the water and silting in once-prime salmonid spawning beds. Furthermore, negative impacts of the PVP aren't limited to the Eel River: just as reduced flows have impacted Eel River fisheries, the increased flows resulting from diverted water into the Russian River have resulted in impacts on that river's fisheries as well.

Unfortunately, the SWRCB did not choose to act on the petition and complaint filed by FOER and joined by the Wiyot Tribe, citing a dubious lack of jurisdiction. However, the Wiyot Tribe will continue to pursue the cause of returning Eel River water to the Eel River. The river needs it, and a host of other restoration activities, if we ever want to see water quality improve and critical fisheries persist.

Raspberry/Blueberry Sorbet

Using frozen raspberries/blueberries makes this sorbet a snap to prepare. (No ice cream maker necessary!)

1/4 cup water
1/4 plus 1 tablespoon sugar
1 bag (12 ounces) frozen raspberries/blueberries
Or 3 cups fresh raspberries frozen
1/2 cup heavy cream

1. Stir together water and 1/4 cup sugar until sugar dissolves.
2. Pulse raspberries/blueberries in a food processor until coarsely chopped. With Machine running, pour in sugar-water; pulse until mixture is smooth. Transfer to an airtight container, and freeze until firm, about 30 minutes.
3. Whisk cream and remaining tablespoon sugar until soft peaks form.
4. Scoop sorbet into 4 glasses, and top with whipped cream.

Boys & Girls Club of Wiyot Country

The Kids in Control program had a very busy month of May. The Red Cross provided a presentation of earthquake/tsunami preparedness to members. The Tribal environmental department continued on the theme with a presentation to club members about fire safety procedures. Members learned to assemble a quick kit which includes: shoes, flashlight, cell or radio inside a grocery bag.

The Power Hour program offered tutoring for 17 days during the month of May. 106 children were tutored averaging 6 children per day. The Triple Play program held a Frisbee contest and airplane contest.

The Girl Scout Caddettes Ambassadors and Senior's continue to work on planning fundraisers and seeing the patches they have earned. In May the Caddettes and Ambassadors planned "Teen Night" which was a 80's Pac Man tournament. Daisies made planters and greeting cards to earn another patch.

Wise Guys have been practicing traditional stick games when weather has permitted. They are preparing for fall tournaments and when not out on the beach, they are working on their Passport to Men booklet. Culture in the Family members continues to work on making more necklaces for our upcoming Brush Dances.

Members of the week for the month of May were Hunter Blevins, Elizabeth Hernandez, and Wanda Hernandez/ Congratulations! Lunch Program raffle winners were Leo James, Trinity Blevins and Shane James. This month we started the program Music Makers. Members have been singing, dancing and doing karaoke.

There were eight program volunteers during the month of May. All of the youth program staff completed a Native American Families Together training, "Children Who Challenge" course.

We are sad to say that our club manager Rose Hernandez submitted her resignation in May and her last day with the club was June 15th. The club will have a temporary manager for the summer and will be operating on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday at the Table Bluff Site during the summer. On Monday and Friday the Table Bluff staff will combine with the Loleta staff to operate a combined club.

The Wiyot parent committee met on June 7th, 2010. The committee received the directors report and received a presentation by NCIDC's Andre Cramblit and Kathie Hamilton Gentry. NCIDC received some Community Health and Wellness funding and would like to work with the Wiyot Tribe and the Table Bluff Reservation community. 


