

She served many years on the Wiyot Tribal Council. Joycelyn Teague volunteered countless hours to the benefit of Wiyot people. She was voted Queen of Loleta by the Loleta Chamber of Commerce at Swauger Station Day some years ago. Joycelyn Teague will be sadly missed. 

Marijuana Development in Humboldt

Marijuana legalization is moving forward rapidly in California. With some growers opting to legalize their business through the state's medical marijuana, others growers in the area seem to be waiting for recreational permitting to begin in January 2018. As it stands right now, the county has received 348 applications related to medical marijuana in Wiyot ancestral territory. So far, only 18 permits have been approved.

While most of these are for cultivation, in form of farms or greenhouses, a few are for research labs, processing labs, or sales. Many more are expected. However, it is estimated that there are currently 15,000 marijuana related operations within Humboldt County, with

3000 of those located in Wiyot territory. Most of these operations are expected to seek to legalize for either medical marijuana permits, or to develop and sell recreational marijuana when permitting goes into effect next January. In addition, we are expecting to see marijuana development in more visible locations that were not previously used for growing, for example the Ferndale and Arcata bottoms.

Unfortunately, marijuana growers tend to prefer sites that have access to water, sun, and other factors that have made these areas attractive to people well before European people started to settle in Humboldt County. As a result, archaeological resources have the potential

to be heavily impacted. As a result, we are working with a number of agencies, including Humboldt County Planning, California Food and Agriculture, and the State Water Boards to ensure that archaeological sites are preserved. In addition, we are also working to help make sure that other cultural resources, such as fish, mammals, and waterways are protected through working to reduce the use of harmful pesticides and taking of water from streams and rivers. The Cause of Lighting (Told to Edward Curtis by Jerry James)

Gouriqh Dat Gaqilh had a son. His name was **Gouriqh Dat Gaqilh Gouwiliyawanaqh** [“above old-man his-son”]. They lived alone. **Gouriqh Dat Gaqilh** desired his son to be rich and powerful, and so he invented the gambling games. Then when the men from the other places came and wished to gamble with the young man, his father would secretly keep saying to himself, “I wish that my son may win.” And always his son was winner. He became very rich. Whenever he went hunting, his father would say, “I wish my son would get an elk at once.” And the young man would kill an elk without difficulty.

But he began to mistreat his father, who therefore shut up all the elk in the side of a mountain, so that the young man could not kill even one. And now again the men from other places came to gamble, but **Gouriqh Dat Gaqilh** would say, “I wish my son may lose.” And the young man never won. It was not long before he had nothing, and he went away to the west.

There he found **Dagak**, whose work was to make thunder, and he remained there to help the thunder-maker. When very heavy thunder occurs he is unable to hold on, and is shaken off and falls down to the earth. He seizes a tree-top, but it is not strong enough to hold him, and he falls to the ground, stripping the tree of its limbs on one side.



Hazardous Waste Finds its Way into Debris

Cleanup of accumulated waste on Table Bluff has been going well. The placement of 40 yard debris boxes in the community center parking lot has worked out great for the most part. However, while removing the contents of the last dumpster, Eel River Disposal personnel discovered some unapproved items as well as hazardous waste. Ten gallons of used motor oil, an assortment of fluorescent bulbs, and propane tanks were found mixed in with the debris inside the box. The Wiyot Tribe Natural Resources Department (WNRD) would like to take this opportunity to remind everyone that any hazardous waste, or any questionable items, can be disposed of properly simply by contacting WNRD staff at 733-5055. Let us know what items you have and we can instruct you on proper disposal of that item or we can pick the item up and ensure that it is disposed of properly. We are aware that most Table Bluff residents know, for the most part, what is acceptable to throw away and which items should be recycled. The fact that the dumpsters that have been utilized here on the rez have open tops seems to be a problem. Without being properly locked up, anyone from any of the surrounding communities can simple drive in during the night and throw anything in. In the future WNRD staff will make sure to procure debris boxes that can be secured after hours to avoid this from happening again. WNRD staff would like to thank TBR residents for their efforts to keep the community a clean and safe environment to live, and work, and are committed to helping TBR residents maintain a waste free zone. The following list, while not comprehensive, is included as a reminder of items that cannot be disposed of without special handling.

- Any and all tires with or without rims
- Appliances
- TVs and computer monitors
- Fluorescent lights
- Oil
- Paint
- Chemicals
- Asbestos
- Propane tanks
- Any hazardous waste (if questionable contact the WNRD)





A Recent Success

The tribe recently received 2016 Homeland Security Grant. This grant will allow us to set up an Emergency Operation Plan for the safety of the tribe and surrounding community in the event of a disaster.

Ha'wa'lou

My name is Ted Hernandez and I would like to take this time to thank the Wiyot Tribe and Tribal Council for giving me this opportunity to serve as the new Public Works Director for the Wiyot Tribe.

On my first week as the director I started off by attending the FEMA training up in Laytonville on February 27 through March 2, 2017. At this training, I was shown how to create an Emergency Operations Plan for the tribe. This EOP will bring our community, federal, state, and local partners together to create a plan for the Wiyot Tribe. Which will ensure the safety of this community and surrounding areas in the event of a natural disaster or even in a terrorist threat. In the near future, I will be asking the community to come and join the tribe's safety committee to get input on what we would like to see written in this EOP. So, keep an eye out for flyers and I will be posting on our web pages.

On my return, I met with my team Mike Paguia and Melvin Farmer to discuss our plans on keeping up with the roads, facilities, wood yard, and the grounds of the tribe to exceptional standards. I also met with our tribal elder and senior water and maintenance technician George Buckley too get his input on how this department should run. I would like to thank George for his knowledge that he has to share with us and the next generation. His knowledge and skills will help this department be a strong running system.

This department will be setting up the Tribal citizen's lawn mowing program again. The cost for this will be \$20.00 a yard except for our elders over 65 and our disable citizens there will be no charge. All we ask is that your yard is debris and obstacle free. This way our mowers and other lawn equipment do not get damaged in the process. This will also make it safe for our team to do an exceptional job for you the tribal citizen. We will be sending out flyers soon on the dates that this program will begin and who to contact.

Run-Off Election


There were two ties at the Elections on April 1, 2017. Please keep an eye on your mail as there will be a run-off election. The Council Member position, a 4 year term 2017-2021 resulted in a tie between two candidates Cheryl A Seidner and Kirsten Boyce. The Treasurer position, a position filled by appointment with a term ended in 2019 resulted in a tie between Vincent DiMarzo and Linda Lange. Notice of the election will be sent to all eligible voters (18 and over).

Constitutional Amendments

All of the constitutional amendments were passed by 2/3rd vote at the April 1, 2017 election. The most significant change to the Wiyot Constitution is the addition of Absentee Ballots. In order to receive an absentee ballot the request must be requested 14 days prior to the election. Other significant changes include clarification of Tribal Council back ground check requirements (requiring resignation of Tribal Council members if they have been conviction within the last 3 years, completion of parole less than three years before the election, failure of a drug test, outstanding warrants for arrest, and other situations determined by General Council). Tribal Council nominees will be required to attend at least one General Council Meeting and three Tribal Council meetings during the calendar year before nomination is submitted in January and must sit on one committee or board during the calendar year before nomination is submitted in January. The requirements for amending the constitution include a 2/3rds vote of at least forty person of the eligible voters of the Tribe.

Changes to the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund for minors

Minor Children will no longer be receiving half of the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund payments. All Revenue Sharing Trust funds for minor children will now be placed into Trust. Also, in order to request Minor's Trust funds Young adults will be required to graduate high school in order to request the funds at 18 years of age. If high school is not completed the individual would be required to wait until the age of 21 to request the funds.
