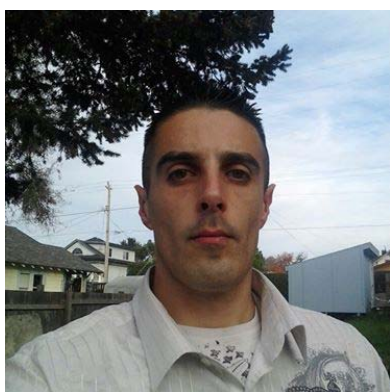


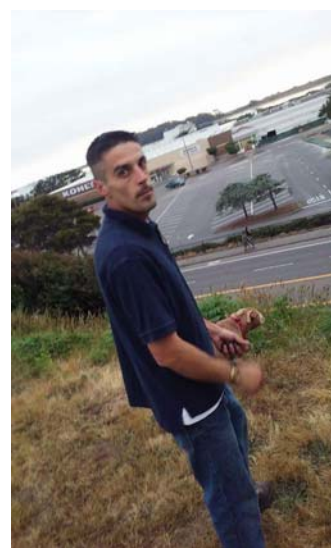


The Da'luk

Nominations for Tribal Council

The following position is up for election in April of 2018, Vice Chairman. Nominations for vacant Tribal Council position will be accepted at the Tribal office beginning January 1 and nominations end on January 15th, 2018. All nominations must be postmarked by or received in the Tribal office by close of business on January 15 in order to be valid. Nominations must be submitted in writing by one eligible voter and signed by the eligible tribal member nominee in accordance with Article IV of the Constitution. The nomination document must specify the following information: Submittal date of the nomination, name of the nominee, position to which the nominee wishes to be elected, name and signature of The person making the nomination, signature of the person being nominated, background (relations, number of meetings attended, committees or boards). Nomination forms are available at the Tribal office. Official notifications of qualified nominees will be listed in the February Tribal Newsletter. Between the months of February and April, but before the elections meeting all nominees will submit at least one article to the Tribal Newsletter or participate in at least one Town Hall meeting to discuss issues they and their constituents find important to the Tribe.

Ha'wa'lou Everyone

We would like to inform the community that Tsek Houdaqh has merged under the Cultural Department as of December 2017. I would like to welcome the staff of that department to Lhatsik Houmoulu'l. They are Donna Wilson as the Youth Program Manager and Kathy Spott the youth assistant and our JOM tutor. Kathy will have her days posted when she will be there for tutoring our youth while they are at the Tsek Houdaqh. We also have Hazel James who is transferring over as the new cultural assistant for this department. These are some of the job duties that she will be assisting me with the day to day operations, youth activities, cultural activities, and evaluating the new cannabis permits that have been coming in daily and processing them. These two departments will be focusing on the growth of our Wiyot Tribe culture, traditions, and education.

Tsek Houdaqh is working on its new calendar for projects for the new year's activities for the youth. I recommend that all our youth should attend or just come check it out. I would also like to announce that Tribal Council has approved to put in a computer lab for the kids to be able to use for their homework and club activities. The Lhatsik Houmoulu'l is always focused on our ceremonies, traditions, and bringing our ancestor's home from the museums that hold them.

We are still looking for tribal elders or the younger generation to come out and share their traditional knowledge, classes, and stories with other citizens. It is so important to share our traditional knowledge with

all our citizens so that it will never be lost. Especially now that our younger generation wants to learn more about our stories and traditions. We will be posting events on our Facebook pages, tribe's web site, and flyers on what is going on in these two department for the upcoming months.

These department are still working on setting up the Cultural Committees and Parent Committees if you are interested in sitting on the committees please contact Ted Hernandez, Hazel James, and Donna Wilson at the tribal office. We can put down your name and set up these committees. To discuss the cultural importance and the needs of the community. The cultural department will continue to post the old stories and photos that we have in our collection in each month newsletter. 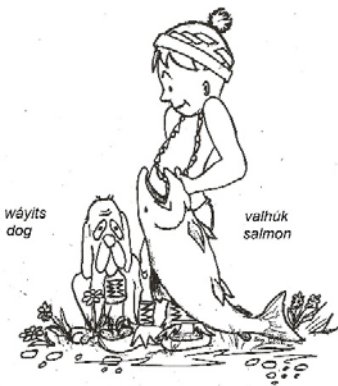

Gatswokwire and the Origin of Salmon

Gatswokwire (culture-hero-trickster) took seeds of the madroña that look like salmon eggs. There were no fish in the world. Gudatrigakwitl ("Above-old-man" or creator) had not let them out. He wanted to keep them a little longer. Gatswokwire, carrying the dry seeds, came to where the fish were kept. There he took them out. Then the one that was keeping the fish thought: "Oh, they are already out. They are about the world." The fish were kept in a hollow rock, all kinds of them. Gudatrigakwitl had made them. Gatswokwire came there because he wanted the fish to be all over the world. Gudatrigakwitl thought: "Well, let it be. Let him make them be all over the world." Then it was foggy and no one saw how the fish went out. Then the sun shone again. Gatswokwire went on and came to a place and saw fish. He came to another place and saw many fish there too. Some of the people had spears, some had set nets, some dip nets. Then he was glad. But Gudatrigakwitl had done it. Some say that the person who kept the fish was a woman, some say that it was a man.

These stories were told to A.L. Kroeber by Wiyot consultants early in the 1900s.

Resolve to Quit



The New Year is rapidly approaching. Many people make resolutions at this time, stopping smoking being one of the most popular ones. Smoking is the leading cause of preventable disease and death in the United States, and quitting now can cut your risk and leave you feeling stronger and healthier. Some things to help on your efforts to kick the habit include:

- Picking a quit date. Starting the new year smoke free is a great idea.
- Letting loved ones know you're quitting so they can support you.
- Listing your reasons to quit smoking.
- Figuring out what triggers make you want to smoke so you can avoid them, especially during the early days.
- Having places you can turn to for help right away, including the free resources listed below.

Quitting smoking is not easy, but you can do it. For free telephone counseling, self-help materials, and online help to help you quit smoking call the California Quit Line at 1-800-NO-BUTTS (1-800-662-8887) or go to www.nobutts.org/. The American Cancer Society also has a number of resources to help support your decision to stop using commercial tobacco, just go to <https://www.cancer.org/>. United Indian Health Services offers classes based on the Second Wind curriculum to help you quit your habit. People who stop smoking greatly reduce their risk for disease and early death. Although the health benefits are greater for people who stop at earlier ages, there are benefits at any age. You are never too old to quit.

Please respect UIHS and Wiyot Tribal Transportation by using the priority scheduling and canceling appointments 24 hours or more in advance, failure to do so will result in loss of service.*

***No Tribal Transportation appointments will be accepted after 2:30 pm , appointments cannot be scheduled for more than 4 hours, Tribal Transportation is not available on Friday*

**** In order to receive Transportation services you must be an enrolled Tribal member, Spouse, Child or Authorized Representative (attending with Tribal Member) and live on or within 5 miles of Table Bluff.*

*****When making appointments please contact the Health and Human Service Assistant directly (707) 601-8648. Please have the date/ time of the appointment, location and estimated length of appointment available when scheduling. Leaving a message does not constitute an appointment. The HHS Assistant must review the transportation calendar and will confirm or deny the appointment with you directly.*

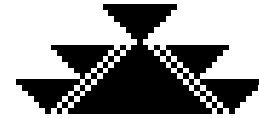
One hundred percent of all proceeds go to support local children and literacy programs. Every dollar helps put a book into the hands of a local child in need!

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) would like to extend an invitation to participate in our Native American Direct Loan (NADL) Program.

The NADLP is a loan program, enacted by Public Law 102-547, to help eligible Native American Veterans obtain home loan financing to purchase, construct or improve homes on Federal Trust Land or to refinance a prior NADL to reduce the interest rate.

Why Use the NADL Program?

- The lender is the Department of Veterans Affairs.
- No down payment
- Easy to qualify
- No Private Mortgage Insurance cost
- The VA offers a low fixed-rate of 4.0% interest rate, 30-year mortgage
- Maximum loan limits of up to \$424,100 in most areas
- This *re-usable benefit* gives Native American Veteran's the opportunity of home ownership and frees up tribal funding to be used in other areas.

A Veteran's tribe or other appropriate tribal organization must sign a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with VA and adopt appropriate ordinances and procedures. The MOU spells out the conditions under which the program will operate on its trust lands. A sample MOU is available on our website at <http://www.benefits.va.gov/homeloans/nadl.asp>.

Western Lily Habitat Restoration Project

The Wiyot Natural Resource Department (WNRD) was awarded a little over 30K from the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) Endangered Species Program to work toward restoring portions of the Table Bluff Reservation (TBR) wetland as habitat for the federally endangered western lily (*Lilium occidentale*). Along with assessing the suitability of the habitat, through measuring soil moisture content and temperature, the project also seeks to restore the lily's associated botanical community and propagate the lily for future out-planting on TBR.

With the onset of fall rains, WNRD botanist, Adam Canter, deployed eight micro-stations, which began sampling soil moisture and temperature on December 1st. Adam received assistance from Arcata U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service botanist, Clint Pogue, and retired lily expert, Dave Imper. These probes will allow the WRND to look at the wetland's saturation and dry-down curves as the season progresses, to ensure that soil moisture availability remains adequate for the lily in the critical months of June and July. Our data will be compared with data from known optimum lily sites, which occur at the Table Bluff Ecological Reserve, only a mile west of TBR, by Ocean Ranch.

The WRND has also begun planting native species associated with western lily habitat within the TBR wetland, in areas invaded by non-native poison hemlock (*Conium maculatum*), radish (*Raphanus sativus*), and mustard (*Brassica rapa*). Planting native shrubs and

trees within weed infested areas is a method used to exclude weeds through shading and crowding. This allows restoration to eventually become passive, once natives are established. The WRND will experiment with different methods within the plantings, including using sheet-mulching and weed mat. Planting in the fall and winter seeks to take the most advantage of our rainy season, giving the plants the most natural opportunity for establishment. This project works in concert with the Tribe's EPA CWA 319 program, which seeks to restore wetland integrity.

Species selected for plantings are culturally significant and also associated with hyper-maritime lily sites and include; Pacific reed grass (*Calamagrostis nutkaensis*), Oregon crab-apple (*Malus fusca*), wax myrtle (*Morrela californica*), hazelnut (*Corylus cornuta* ssp. *californica*), silk tassel (*Garrya elliptica*), and coast black current (*Ribes divaricatum*).

The WRND was very grateful for the assistance with planting and the teamwork provided by Andy Ashley and James Paguaia from the Wiyot Public Works Department! We look forward to watching this exciting restoration project unfold as we begin to see our native Wiyot habitats return to the TBR landscape.

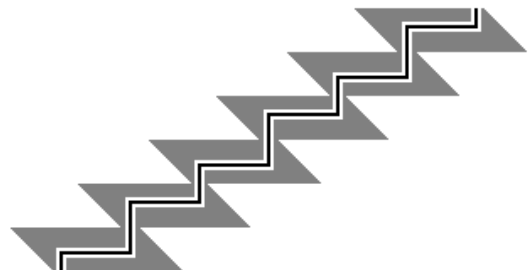
