

## **Potter Valley Project Relicensing Update**

The Tribe remains committed to advocating for the decommissioning of the Potter Valley Project (PVP, “Project”) owned and operated by Pacific Gas & Electric (PG&E). Joining other Tribe’s such as the Round Valley Tribe, agencies such as National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW), United States Fish and Wildlife (USFWS), and other environmental organizations such as California Trout (CalTrout) and Friends of the Eel River (FOER), the Tribe has participated in every aspect of the relicensing process. This has included submitting comments on all PG&E PVP related documents (e.g., Pre-application Document [PAD], Scoping Document 1 and 2 [SD-1 & SD-2], Proposed Study Plan [PSP], Revised Study Plan [RSP], and the Final Study Plan) as well as conducting considerable outreach with the Eel Forum, of which the Tribe is a member, and remaining engaged in the overall process through collaborative stakeholder meetings with Congressman Huffman, federal/state agencies, and non-governmental organizations (NGOs). These meetings seek to attain solutions by all stakeholders no matter if the desired solution is fish, water, energy, and/or habitat restoration focused.

Since our last update in February, PG&E presented information at an Eel Russian River Commission (ERRC) meeting informing all

that they have not yet reached a decision on the future of the project but that they were considering all options given the Project’s efficiency of producing enough power to justify relicensing. PG&E presented three paths it may take for the future of the Project including:

- Auction or sale the Project to interested parties
- Surrender their Notice of Intent (NOI) and allow the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) to auction/sale the Project
- Continue operating the Project as is and relicense through the FERC process.

Given the investment of the proposed relicensing studies (~\$10-20 million over the next two [2] years) and an inevitable requirement from the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) to require fish passage over Scott dam (estimated to be \$200-400 million), most of the informed parties (Tribe included) assumed that PG&E will be attempting to unload the Project as electricity produced from the 9.2 kW hydroelectric dam doesn’t warrant this big investment. Combine this investment with potential dam safety issues (think Oroville dam) and it was easy to assume that PG&E would want out of the Project.

## **Potter Valley Project Relicensing Update**

In May, and to no surprise to the Tribe, PG&E announced that they are officially putting the project up for auction this fall. PG&E stated in their letter to the ERRC that “the decision to begin the auction process ultimately reflects that continuing to operate the facility is not in the long-term best interests of PG&E’s electric customers.” PG&E has chosen to present at the ERRC because there have been discussions that the group, and/or their affiliates, may want to acquire the Project for other uses besides the small amount of power being generated. These other uses, of course, would be for water storage and recreational value (e.g., Lake Pillsbury). For background, the ERRC consists of representatives from Humboldt, Mendocino, Lake, and Sonoma counties, three of which see extreme benefit of keeping Scott dam in place and one (Humboldt) that will see continued hardship. This plan would require an update to a Joint Powers Agreement (JPA) that was created in the late 1970s which may include new members. At a recent Humboldt County Board of Supervisors meeting, Humboldt County Supervisor and representative on the ERRC, Estelle Fennell, explained that it may be in the best interest for Humboldt County to include more major stakeholders. These included the Tribe and local cities

such as Rio Dell, Fortuna, and Ferndale seeing that the three other counties have an overwhelming interest in the Project. Many environmental groups and the public are opposed to Humboldt County having any involvement or stake in the Project and think that the County should take the stance that the Project should be decommissioned. Several of the other Supervisors echoed these remarks and believe that the County should put together a defined stance/policy stating that Humboldt County is opposed to the relicensing of this Project.

The Tribe will continue to work to prevent the relicensing of Scott Dam and is seeking the overall removal of both Scott and Cape Horn dams to allow upstream spawning access for Tribal trust species and return the Eel River back to its natural state. We will continue to keep you posted throughout this process but if you have any questions, comments, suggestions, etc., the WNRD would love to hear from you. 


