



Wiyot Tribe Partners Again with Local Agencies for Coastal Cleanup Day

Five years ago, the Tribe, Humboldt Baykeeper, and Humboldt State University's Humboldt Bay Aquatic Center began a collaborative effort on Coastal Cleanup and Earth Day to clean up the shores of Indian Island near *Tuluwat* and *Etpidohl*. In recent years, other partners including Coast Seafoods and Hog Island Oyster Company have joined the team and provided much needed boat support to unload the near 10,000 pounds of solid waste that has been collected to date.

Every year, community volunteers gather at the Humboldt Bay Aquatic Center for an introductory talk about the cultural significance of the island to the Tribe, past remediation projects, and future efforts undertaken by the Tribe. Baykeeper and other partners provided additional information on bay-wide projects and cleanup efforts, a safety talk was given by Humboldt Bay Aquatic Center staff, and then everyone ventured on a 20-minute kayak tour to Indian Island. Once at the site, Natural Resources Director, Tim Nelson provided information related to departmental activities centered on solid and hazardous waste cleanup and environmental remediation and restoration on the island before volunteers set out to gather debris.

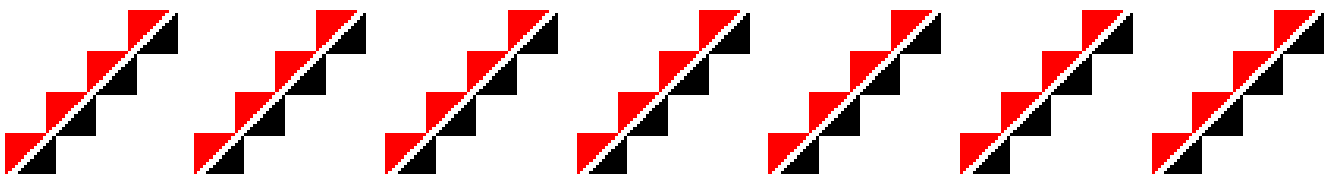
Over the years, the group has collected over 2,000 pounds of solid and hazardous waste in a single event! In conjunction with these cleanups and other efforts performed by the Tribe (e.g., recent homeless camp cleanup in April-May), the amount of trash collected this year was the lowest amount

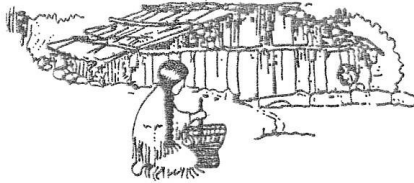
ever collected by the group (~200 pounds). This small amount of trash just proves that our continued efforts are having a big impact on the overall solid waste around Indian Island. The Tribe would like to thank Humboldt Baykeeper, Humboldt Bay Aquatic Center, Coast Seafoods, Hog Island Oyster Company, and the numerous volunteers that have helped to keep Humboldt Bay clean!

TWO DAY EVENT, LOCATION and REQUEST YOUR SPACE!

Dear Crafters/Vendors:

It is once again time for the Loleta Holiday Craft Fair sponsored by the Wiyot Tribe. The craft fair is a **TWO DAY** event. It will be held on:

Saturday, December 8th and Sunday, December 9th, 2018

at the **Loleta Firemen's Pavilion** located at 824 Loleta Drive, Loleta, CA 95551. The event hours will be **9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.**, however, sellers will be able to begin setting up on Friday, December 7th from 3:00 p.m. to 6:00 pm and Saturday, December 8th at 7:00 a.m. You may park in front of the building for unloading only. You will then need to park as far away as possible.

Applications must be received no later than Monday, **December 3, 2018**. Each *table vendor* will be provided an 8 foot table for **two** days. Each *booth vendor* will be provided two 8 foot tables for **two** days. You may purchase additional tables for \$50.00 each for two days. Applications received after the deadline will be placed on a waiting list in the order in which they are received. Deadline to cancel and receive a refund of your space fee is December 3, 2018.

The space fee is **\$65.00** for an 8 foot table space and **\$120.00** for a 10X10 or 12X9 booth space which includes two tables for **two** days. **YOU CAN REQUEST YOUR PREFERRED SPACE. I HAVE INCLUDED A FLOOR PLAN OF THE PAVILION WITH NUMBERED SPACES. MAKE YOUR REQUEST OF YOUR SPACE ON THE APPLICATION.** We will do our best to honor your request. Note lighting and electrical outlets on map. Booth spaces may want to add additional lighting. Each vendor may want to bring their own comfortable chairs or stools.

Prices increased in 2018 owing to the Fireman's Pavilion's increase in rent (**doubling** our rental fee for the weekend event) and cleaning fees as well as the costs of local TV, Radio and Newspaper advertisements.

Of course, you are more than welcome to make your space fit your creative personality. However, we do request that you be mindful of an courteous towards fellow crafters.

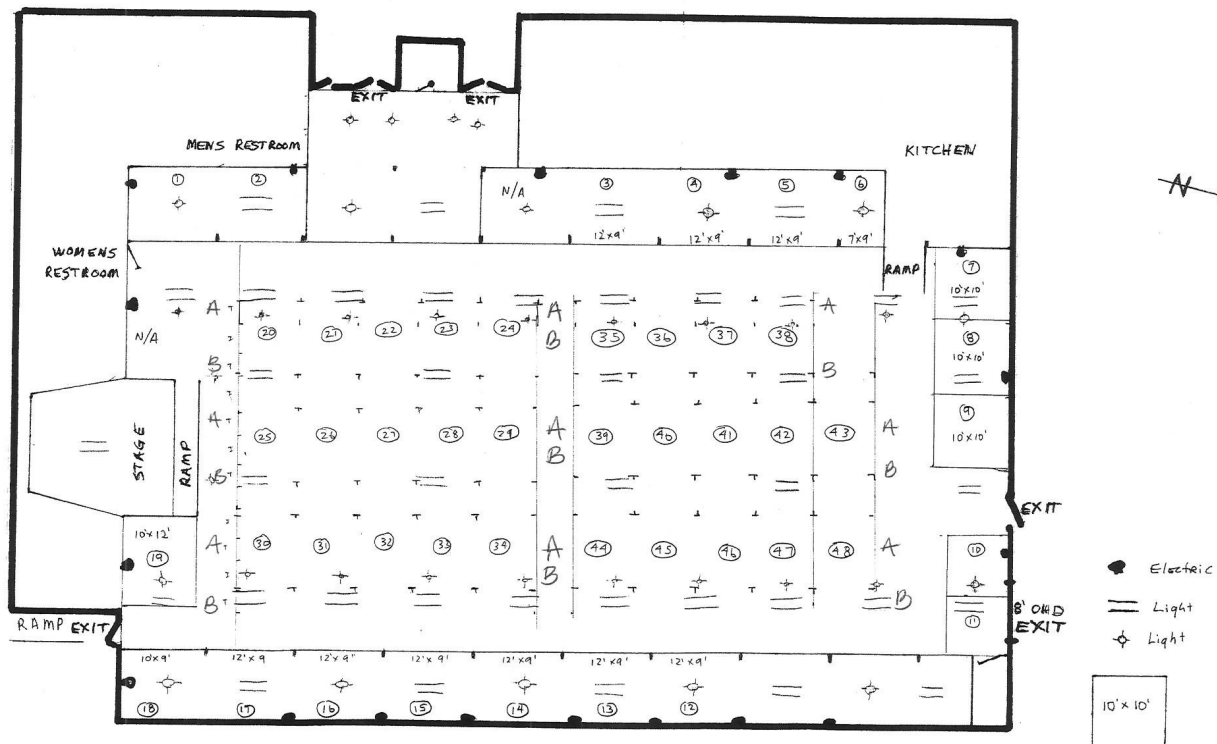

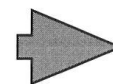



Natural Resources Department Removes Non-native/Invasive Monterey Pine for BIA WUI

The Wiyot Natural Resources Department (WNRD) has been busy trying to complete a last minute FY2018 awarded project, funded through the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) Wildland Urban Interface (WUI) program. A WUI defines an area that is on the interface or edge between a wild and undeveloped landscape and a developed or urban area. The Table Bluff Reservation (TBR) is an area that qualifies as a WUI, which is known to have increased wildfire risk due to a closer proximity of hazard fuels to the residential portions of the Reservation, including large expanses of grassland and an ever-expanding non-native/invasive Monterey pine (*Pinus radiata*) population.

The BIA approved the WNRD's proposal to treat TBR's WUI by reducing the fuel load of our grasslands, through regular mowing, and through removing young Monterey pines that have ladder fuels and pose a risk to the remnant coastal prairies and diverse northern coastal scrublands that occur on Table Bluff. Along with the associated hazard fuel risk posed by Monterey pine, the tree is non-native to areas north of San Mateo County California, and is widely planted as a cultivar, due to its rapid growth and ability to adapt to many soil types. https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Pinus_radiata (Accessed Sept. 17, 2018). This most likely explains why the pine was planted on TBR. However, observations and research have shown the effects of Monterey pine encroachment into treeless coastal prairie

and scrub habitats to be detrimental to herbaceous species diversity and habitat types (Steers et al 2013); including rare vegetation types with cultural significance, like hazelnut (*Corylus cornuta* ssp. *californica*) scrub, coastal bramble, and Pacific reedgrass (*Calamagrostis nutkaensis*) meadows. It is easy to contrast the rich coastal prairies along the bluff-edge to the dark and sparse ecological desert found under the Monterey pine canopies, where virtually no other species are able to eek out an existence, other than the occasional mushroom.

While the WNRD does not enjoy nor desire the need to remove any trees, it understands both the fire risk posed by the Monterey pines and the ecological damage they can wreck on our native early-successional coastal plant communities, already struggling in the absence of cultural burning, lack of native tending, and threats associated with climate change.

All by-products from the pine removal will be put to use by TBR and the WNRD. Larger diameter wood will be donated to TBR for firewood for elders and Tribal citizens. Smaller diameter material will be wood-chipped and used for mulching native plant installations, invasive species sites, and ecological restoration areas. This is a huge resource for the WNRD, who normally must purchase mulch from outside sources, whose purity is sometimes questioned and can be contaminated with other weed seeds if not properly stored

and managed. The WNRD plans to plant our native and culturally significant Sitka spruce (*dap*) (*Picea sitchensis*) to replace the non-native conifers removed during this project. The WNRD will seek appropriate and spaced-out locations for conifer and shrub restoration so as to reduce the risk of prairie and scrub invasion and wildfire risk. Ideas for appropriate conifer restoration sites can be sent to the WRND and will be discussed at future Integrated Resource Management Plan (IRMP) meetings.
