Do you Have a Vision for the Table Bluff Reservation (TBR)?

Do you want to have a voice for the future of resources management at TBR? Come to the Annual Wiyot Day Celebration August 24th and help develop alternatives and ideas for the Integrated Resources Management Plan (IRMP)!

The Vision of the Wiyot IRMP is to help foster an integrated approach to the management of the Tribes lands and resources, maintain wilderness, natural characteristics, and ecosystem processes of the Tribe's lands, and promote and conduct eco-cultural restoration as a means of ecological stewardship and cultural renewal, while guiding smart and environmentally sound growth and economic opportunities for the Wiyot People.

For the last year, the Wiyot Natural Resources Department (WNRD) has been gathering Tribal and public input for the development of the IRMP, an umbrella big-picture plan for the guided management of resources and lands at TBR. Several public surveys were given, both online and at the annual Wiyot Day festival last August, in an effort to get as much participation in the process as possible, and to ensure that all voices are represented in the IRMP. These surveys, along with two open IRMP focused meetings, have helped the WNRD to better understand Tribal citizens issues and concerns in regards to resources management, and helped to begin the process of developing goals and objectives for the plan.

Some of the highest ranked priorities that were expressed through the community outreach surveys, include:

- 1-Land Preservation and Protection from Development**
- 2-Environmental Education**
- 3-Access to Traditional Cultural Plants for Gathering**
- 4-Eco-Cultural Habitat Restoration**
- 5-(tied)-Development of Elder Comm. Housing, Ex-**

pansion of Water Quality Program

6-Installation of Native Berry and Hazelnut Crops

Results from this past years Wiyot Day surveys, were similar, despite being representative from a broader spectrum of non-tribal respondents and included:

Water Quality

Eco-cultural restoration (Wiyot Day/Ceremonial sites, native plant restoration, basket garden)

Environmental Education

Ethnobotany

Wildlife

Fire/Cultural Burning/Fire Ecology (100% respondents think Table Bluff should begin the process of introducing small cultural burns to the Reservation)

Marine Resource Access

Land Protection Land Acquisition (broader resource conservation efforts throughout Wiyot Ancestral Territory)

Now, we are asking Tribal citizens and the public to dig a little deeper by voicing your opinions about what we have gathered so far, and begin actually developing activities and goals to be developed into a list of alternatives for different sectors of the TBR landscape, including ideas for economic development. **Please come and participate this Wiyot Day 2019 at the WNRD table this August 24th at TBR for your chance to win exciting prizes!** We are the future and the future is bright!

Wiyot Tribe Receives \$48,000 to Install Additional Solar Energy Systems on TBR Homes

The Tribe and GRID Alternative applied for monies through the Tribal Solar Accelerator Fund (TSAF) for the installation of solar electric systems on 4 TBR homes. We were recently informed that we received the full asking price of \$47,815 to install these systems and have worked to line out residences whom have expressed interest in installing a system.

WNRD staff have been working with GRID Alternatives staff to find additional homes for the installation of photovoltaic (PV) systems. For 2019, the Tribe and GRID Alternative have installed PV systems at the three (3) residences and plan to complete additional installations by the end of the year. To date, eleven (11) TBR households have solar panels installed and, ultimately, WNRD and GRID are hopeful to have solar panels on all qualifying TBR households by 2022.

Wiyot Tribe and Humboldt Baykeeper Team Up to Assess Mercury Levels in Pacific Lamprey

The grant through California Environmental Protection Agency (CalEPA) will analyze fish caught by local tribal, subsistence, and sport fishermen in Humboldt Bay and nearby coastal waters in northwestern California to determine the magnitude of mercury exposure from local fish consumption. This project is part of the second phase of a project previously funded by CalEPA and aims to inform tribal members, fishermen, and their families of best practices to avoid mercury exposure. Humboldt Baykeeper will recruit traditional tribal and subsistence fishermen to provide samples of Pacific lamprey, lingcod, black rockfish, and other important local species to assess the human health risk from mercury exposure. Lamprey and fish tissue samples will be collected and analyzed by a certified laboratory to add to results from Phase I. Data from this project will be used to make recommendations to reduce community exposure.

By the next eeling season, the Natural Resources Department will be looking for interested eelers who would like to be paid to catch ocean returning (running) lamprey for mercury analysis. I understand that in order to be eligible for the \$150.00 school clothes, \$20 in supplies my child must be an enrolled citizen of the Wiyot Tribe attending Kindergarten through the 6th grade, 7th - 12th grade will receive \$150.00 and \$40 in supplies. These funds must be requested by the child's Legal Guardian and the form must be accompanied by the proof of school enrollment. Once the application is submitted the funds will be released the following Friday after the application has been deemed complete by the Health and Human Service Director. The Legal Guardian must return receipts for the expended funds for school supplies and/or School clothes by November 1, 2019. Failure to submit the receipts will result in ineligibility for the program in future years.
