## WNRD Awarded Woodlands Management Grant from the BIA

The Wiyot Natural Resources Department (WNRD) received some surprise and exciting news this past month in the notification of an award for over 18K from the Bureau of Indian Affairs to create a Woodlands Management Plan (WMP), which will primarily focus of the Tribe's black cottonwood (*Populus trichocarpa*) woodland on its Cock Robin Island (**Rratga'niyaqh**) property, in the Eel River estuary. The WMP will be a component of the larger Integrated Resource Management Plan (IRMP), which looks at all WNRD programs, primarily in relation to the Table Bluff Reservation. The WMP is an exciting opportunity for the WNRD to continue research and assessment of this unique, but difficult to access property on **Rratga'niyaqh**. Other than work for the development of the Tribe's Wetlands Program Plan (WPP), few funding opportunities have been available to this property, because it is not held in Trust status. The proposal was submitted in 2017 and the award is a great example of the benefits of having shovel ready projects for the BIA, as opportunities vary from year to year. North Coast black cottonwood (*P. trichocarpa*) riparian forest, which when viewed in the context of its geographic isolation, was given a rarity rank of G1S1.1, the rarest rank in the system. The G1S1.1 ranking indicates there are globally fewer than 6 viable occurrences worldwide and/or 2,000 acres, which when viewed from the state ranking of S1, also accounts for all examples of this vegetation type in California and the world. The

threat rank of 0.1 indicates that the type is "very threatened", clearly due to the distribution rarity of this particular species of cottonwood on the North Coast of California. The Wiyot Tribe takes this ranking very seriously and is honored to have an exemplary old-growth stand of black cottonwood riparian forest as part of its Tribal lands. The Tribe acknowledges its role as the caretaker of such a unique and rare vegetation type, a legacy of its cultural landscape, and strives to ensure its sound management. The primary objectives of assessing its woodlands and the creation of a WMP are principle to the Tribe's role as a caretaker of its natural and cultural resources. One of the main issues on the property is winter erosion. Look for updates on the WMP or ask to tag along on a jet-boat ride with the WNRD out to this wild piece of the **wiyat**. 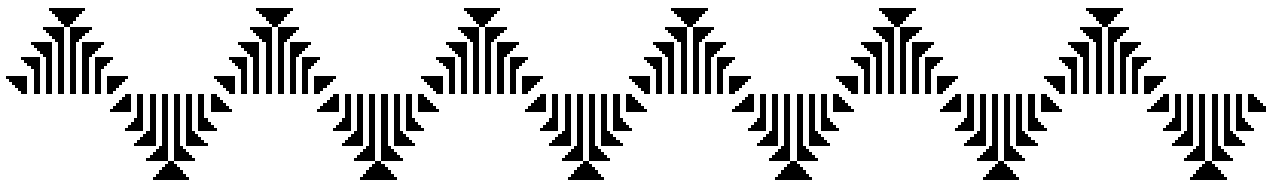

## **Integrated Resource Management Plan (IRMP) Survey Results from Wiyot Day 2019**

The Wiyot Natural Resources Department (WNRD) is continuing work and data collection for its Integrated Resource Management Plan (IRMP). The 2019 IRMP survey taken at Wiyot day showed the opinion and ideas of people invested in the future of the Wiyot Tribe. 100% of the people wanted to see solar energy implemented fully on the reservation. Along with a community garden for Tribal members to use, people also wanted to have commercially sold crops. Crops such as native berries, deer, goats, chickens and eggs. While having these areas for food sources, we should also keep some land undeveloped. From the survey the answer averaged about 40% of land to stay undeveloped. A few surveys also showed interest in more public festivals and gaming prospects. Having some tourist attractions would bring the Tribe more money to grow and create more programs and aid.

# Shawir Darrudaluduk “We Belong to the Wilderness”

**It has been an eventful summer for the NRD working throughout July and August on the South Fork Eel River, but we are now welcoming fall and looking forward to cooler days!**

As many know, the Eel river has suffered from several ailments including water diversions, fish migration barriers, dams, loss of native fish species and suitable habitat, non-native fish population expansion, low water levels and exposure to toxic cyanobacteria blooms during warmer, summer months. The Eel River is home to many culturally significant species to the Wiyot, such as Pacific Lamprey, Eel, several salmonid species, Sacramento sucker, and green sturgeon. In recent years there has been a rapid decrease in the abundance and distribution of these important fish communities, in part because of the rapid population expansion of the non-native, predatory Sacramento pikeminnow. Sacramento Pikeminnow, *Ptychocheilus grandis*, was introduced into the Eel River watershed in the late 1970s via Lake Pillsbury. Since their introduction they have dominated a large portion of the river, competing against native fish for resources and predating on juvenile salmonids and Pacific lamprey ammocetes. Pikeminnow larger than 200 mm in length feed exclusively on juvenile fish and have become a driving factor in the reduction of native fish populations. Due to higher temperatures and low water levels during the warmer summer months, most fish cannot adapt to these harsh conditions and must migrate towards cooler waters, however pikeminnow seem to have accli-

mated to higher temperatures in the Eel, allowing them to withstand warmer summer temperatures and remain in these streams. Pikeminnow are also not known to be anadromous, meaning they don't migrate out to the ocean to mature like most salmonid species, so they stay relatively close to their natal streams, where they reproduce rapidly, allowing the population to continue to rise exponentially.

During the months of July and August, the Natural Resources Department with help from tribal member Hilanea Wilkinson, Karuk tribal member Emmanuel Cyr, and biologists from Stillwater Sciences, have been working out on the South Fork Eel River testing multiple methods of suppression and removal of pikeminnow. The goal of these efforts is to remove a significant portion of the Sacramento Pikeminnow population, enough to hopefully create patches of unoccupied pools enough to recruit salmonids for a population rebound. These methods included electro-fishing, seine and fyke netting, and baited trapping, all used individually to assess total effectiveness of each method.

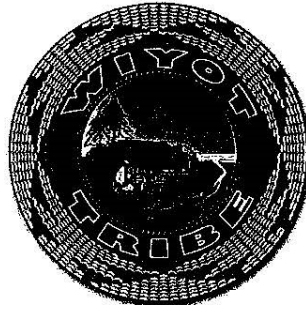
We assessed the effectiveness of each removal method by quantifying the number of fish caught in each trial run. For two full weeks in July the NRD focused solely on electro-fishing deep, complex pools along the South Fork from the confluence, to Benbow. This method required an electro-fishing boat, a boat crew of 3 staff and a shore crew of 2 staff. After each pass electro-fishing, pikeminnow that were caught were processed, weighed, and measured. The electro-fishing portion of our project yielded the most pikeminnow of around 300 individuals removed.

In August, the NRD focused on large, framed baited trapping, seine and fyke netting methods of removal. Traps were deployed for up to 3 hours, baited with chicken liver, salmon roe, and anchovies in deep pools to see if catching Pikeminnow would be successful. A GoPro device was used to record live video of fish behavior surrounding the traps. After a full two weeks of test trapping, we caught 0 fish. The following week brought some success as we dedicated time to seine netting. We were able to catch a good amount of fish during these trials and noted seining as a viable method of population suppression in some sites. Although a slight disappointment for the amount of work put in, we learned a lot from our efforts, specifically about pikeminnow behavior and how to properly execute these strategies to yield the highest percentage of fish. The knowledge we gained from this pilot project allowed the WNRD to better understand the patterns and behavior traits of Sacramento pikeminnow, will greatly increase the effectiveness of our methods for future field efforts.

**Saturday, December 14th and Sunday, December 15th, 2019**

at the **Loleta Firemen's Pavilion** located at 824 Loleta Drive, Loleta, CA 95551. The event hours will be **9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.**, however, sellers will be able to begin setting up on Friday, December 13th from 3:00 pm to 6:00 pm and Saturday, December 14th at 7:00 a.m. You may park in front of the building for unloading only. You will then need to park as far away as possible.

Applications must be received no later than Monday, **December 9, 2019**. Each *table vendor* will be provided an 8 foot table for **two** days. Each *booth vendor* will be provided two 8 foot tables for **two** days. You may purchase additional tables for \$50.00 each for two days. Applications received after the deadline will be placed on a waiting list in the order in which they are received. Deadline to cancel and receive a refund of your space fee is December 9, 2019.

The space fee is **\$65.00** for an 8 foot table space and **\$120.00** for a 10X10 or 12X9 booth space which includes two tables for **two** days. **YOU CAN REQUEST YOUR PREFERRED SPACE. I HAVE INCLUDED A FLOOR PLAN OF THE PAVILION WITH NUMBERED SPACES. MAKE YOUR REQUEST OF YOUR SPACE ON THE APPLICATION.** We will do our best to honor your request. Note lighting and electrical outlets on map. Booth spaces may want to add additional lighting. Each vendor may want to bring their own comfortable chairs or stools.

Prices increased in 2018 owing to the Fireman's Pavilion's increase in rent (**doubling** our rental fee for the weekend event) and cleaning fees as well as the costs of local TV, Radio and Newspaper advertisements.

Of course, you are more than welcome to make your space fit your creative personality. However, we do request that you be mindful of and courteous towards fellow crafters.



Many factors influence the turnout of any given event. Attendance last year was 900+ shoppers on Saturday and 600+ shoppers on Sunday. We will be providing each vendor with craft fair flyers once the application has been accepted to help promote this event. 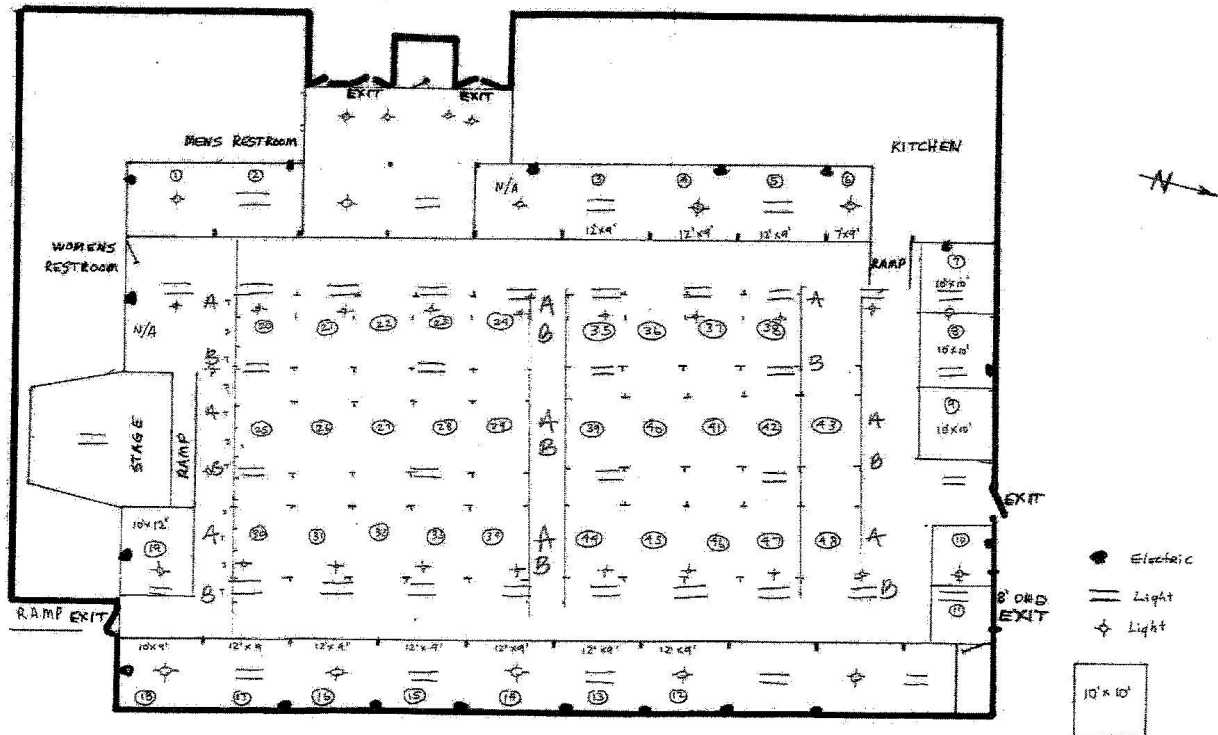

## The Bartow Project Kickoff

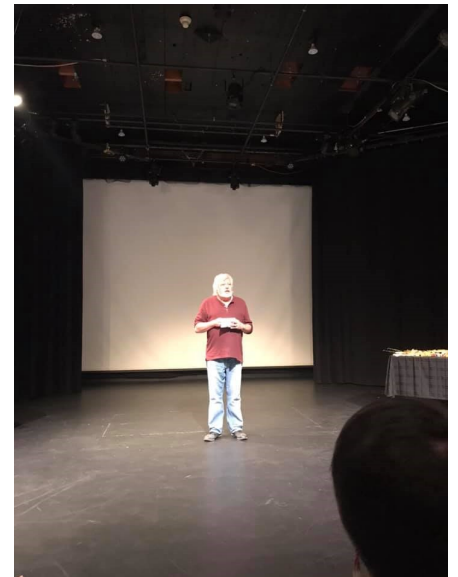
The Bartow Project kicked off on Thursday September 19, 2019. This project is a multi-year collaboration between the Wiyot Tribe and Dell’Arte International to create a full-length piece of theatre inspired by the art and life of Wiyot artist Rick Bartow (1946-2016). Rick Bartow: *Things You Know But Cannot Explain* represents the artist’s first major retrospective and a contribution to the substantial growing body of scholarship on contemporary Native artists. Bartow (Mad River Band Wiyot) established his art career in the 1980s following service in Vietnam and a period of recovery from PTSD and alcoholism. His work consists of large-scale paintings, drawings, prints, and sculptures that often feature haunting combinations of animal and human forms, and are often both deeply personal and culturally relevant. Divided into thematic sections such as “Self,” “Dialogue,” and “Tradition,” this exhibition speaks directly to the personal and cultural aspects of traditional Native art within Bartow’s oeuvre while demonstrating his close engagement with the work of 20th-century masters, including Francis Bacon, Robert Rauschenberg, and Jean-Michel Basquiat.
