Tuluwat returns to the Wiyot Tribe after 160 Years!

It has taken decades for the tribe to regain Tuluwat, once was the center of our world and where we held our ceremony's. After the 1860 massacre the island was purchased without consent of the Wiyot people. It took a lot of fundraising and tireless effort but in 2000 the Tribe bought 1.5 acres back on the eastern edge of Tuluwat.

Albert James said it the best in an article in 1973 "I believe they'll dance and sing again, the island was the center of the Indian Dances and feasts"..."I can see my peoples children running along the beach" his vision became a reality, The City of Eureka voted unanimously in December 2018 to give back the remaining 202 acres and on October 21, 2019 the City of Eureka signed over the deed to Indian Island. The next World Renewal Ceremony will be held in March of 2020.

Please Attend Planning Commission November 7th in opposition to Bear River/Monument Ridge Wind Development Project!

If you aren't already aware, a mammoth industrial wind project is proposed by an out-of-town corporation, Terra Gen, on a Wiyot sacred site on *Tsakiuwit*, or Bear River and Monument Ridges, along the southern border of ancestral territory, with a new thirty-mile transmission corridor along Shively Ridge, all the way to Bridgeville. This project area is a cultural and biodiversity hot spot along the Pacific flyway, with miles of native coastal prairie and rare plant communities that would be negatively impacted. The Tribe made the case for its cultural and ethnobotanical resources (tribal cultural resources-TCRs) along the ridge, which hosts a multitude of culturally important plants and animals. This is a sacred high-prayer spot says Wiyot chairman, Ted Hernandez, and will be habitat for the planned condor re-introduction.

Since the Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR) comments were due in June, the Tribe and public have been waiting for the County to respond and set the Planning Commission (PC) hearing for the proposed project, and that time has finally arrived. The Final EIR (FEIR) is slated to be out to for public review on November 1, with the first PC meeting of November 7th, giving the Tribe and the public only a week to review the massive document. The timeline is on a fast tract, which highlights the importance for Tribal citizens to speak out at the PC hearing, which is tentatively set for November 7th, most likely at 4:30 p.m. This will be the first of three PC meetings and will be a workshop where members of the public can speak for up to 3 minutes regarding questions about the FEIR. The FEIR will be available on Humboldt County's website for the project, <https://humboldtgov.org/2408/Humboldt-Wind-Energy-Project>.

Additional PC meetings are set for 11/14 and 11/21, which will also be important to attend, where the PC will then decide whether to deny or approve, from which the decision could be appealed to the Board of Supervisors. This is our opportunity to join as a community to protect this iconic Wiyot cultural landscape. NEW GRANT PROJECT!



Wiyot Tribe has been awarded a 2-year grant from the **Institute of Museum and Library Services** (<https://www.imls.gov/>) to create a Wiyot Conversation Book based on YOUR input. Pilar James is working as the Language Specialist for this grant, and with her feedback we have decided to call the project **Rou Soulatlouy**, which means “we all speak Wiyot”.

Our first project meetings (food provided!) will be **Wednesday, November 13 AND Wednesday, November 27 from 4:00-6:00 p.m. in the Big Room** at Table Bluff Reservation. Please come and tell us what topics YOU would like to be able to talk about in Wiyot. We will take your ideas and research all of the language materials we have to figure out how best to express them in Wiyot. (In future meetings, we will go over what we have come up with in our research, and you can help us improve and refine it.)

We would like to hear from adults, elders, and youth, so please feel free to participate whatever your age!

Meetings will be held approximately twice a month, and you are welcome to participate just once, every meeting, or any time that your schedule allows (or when you have new ideas).

If you live off-reservation, and/or out of the area, and would like to participate, we do plan to have occasional meetings off-site, so please contact lynnika@wiyot.us to let us know if you would like to organize a meeting in your area. In the meantime, if you have access to Skype, with a little advance planning we can have you join us remotely!

NEW! LANGUAGE CARDS

This summer, in collaboration with Shawir Darrudaluduk (Natural Resources), I created two sets of (round) Wiyot vocabulary cards for learning the names of native plants and animals. Professionally printed cards are available for \$15/deck at the Tribal office (the plants deck has 56 cards, and the animals deck has 64; all cards have QR codes which you can scan with your phone to hear each word pronounced). CalFresh Benefits Replacement Available for Families Impacted by Power Outages



Are you a CalFresh recipient whose food spoiled due to the power outages?

You can request a replacement of your CalFresh Food benefits if your food spoiled due to a power outage. You have up to 10 days after the food was lost to request the replacement. Contact your local county office for help.

How do I request a replacement of my CalFresh Food benefits?

Contact your local county office. You will need to complete, sign, and turn in a 'CF 303' form to request a replacement. Include your contact information and a short description of how your food was lost. Include the time and date of the power outage.

Won't my local county office be closed because of the power outages?

We recommend calling your county office before visiting in person to make sure they are open. They may also be able to help you by phone.



I lived in Sacramento for four years, going to school and working with the Native youth and moved back home to Humboldt County to be closer with my family in 2009. I am a Yurok fisherwoman and really enjoy spending time on the river. I go out into our homelands harvesting our basket and traditional foods. I grew up gathering in our homelands and I love it! Thank you for this opportunity, I am happy to be cooking and working the elders.




