The Annual General Council meeting is coming up on April 4, 2020. Polls will be open (in the Tribal library) from 10 a.m. and close at 2 p.m. for the election of Tribal Chairman and Council member at large and any items on the agenda. If you are unable to attend the Wiyot Tribal Election scheduled for April 4, 2020, you can vote by absentee ballot. In order to receive an Absentee Ballot a form requesting the absentee ballot must be RECEIVED in the Tribal Office not fewer than 14 days before the election (March 21, 2020). Please do not wait until the deadline to submit the request, get your request in early so there is enough time for you to receive the ballot by mail and return it by Election Day. If you voted by absentee ballot last time and submitted a *permanent* Absentee Ballot your absentee ballot will automatically be mailed. If you are unsure if you requested a permanent Absentee Ballot you can contact the office at (707) 733-5055 to verify you are on the permanent Absentee Ballot list.

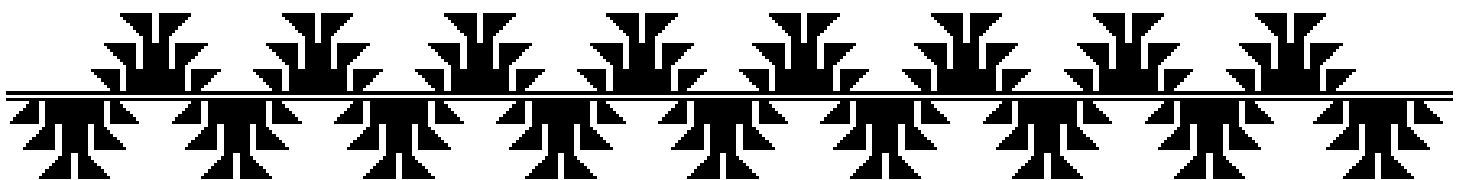
Tribal Chairperson 2020-2024

Ha'wa'lou,

My name is Theodore E. Hernandez. For over 20 years I have lived on the Table Bluff Reservation with my family. I have been married to my wonderful wife for 32 years and raised 5 beautiful children. Our oldest daughter recently graduated with a master's degree in film and electronic media and a bachelor's degree in Native American studies. Our second daughter has an associate degree in early childhood education and works with Native American children as an Early Head Start Teacher. Our son serves in the United States Marine Corps, while our two youngest daughters attend high school and prepare for their college careers. Throughout our children's lives, my wife and I have instilled a sense of confidence and values in our children. We taught them that they can achieve anything they set their hearts and minds to. We have also ensured that our children understand the importance of their culture, community, education, and family.

As a Wiyot person, I understand the importance of the preservation of our culture, language, and practices. I currently work in my community as the Cultural Director, the Tsek Houdaqh Director, and the Historic Preservation Officer. I have sat on the Wiyot Council for eighteen years and have served as the chairman for the past eight years. I am dedicated to serving my people and ensuring that our voice is heard throughout our community. As the current tribal chairman, I have attended 432 monthly Business Council meetings, 36 Annual/Semiannual meetings, 5 Town Hall meetings and numerous other outside meetings regarding Tribal concerns and issues. I currently sit on the Minors Trust Board, Scholarship Committee, Housing Board, Cultural Committee, Parent Committee, and the Events Committee. During my last term as chairman, I was able to facilitate the long-anticipated return of our sacred-ceremonial land, Tuluwat. A goal that was only achievable due to the dedication and perseverance of Albert and Beverly James, Geraldine Rubira, Cheryl Seidner, Leona Wilkinson, and many other Wiyot tribal members. I have also worked alongside tribal members to prevent the placement of wind turbines along the ridge of Bear Mountain, a high and sacred prayer place to our people. As tribal chairman, my next goal is to work alongside the tribal administration to prevent the Potter Valley Dam Project from further damaging our Eel River's salmon and eel populations. I hope that we as a community can replenish our river's ecosystem and create a healthier environment for all.

As a Wiyot person, I have a strong love for our culture and people. Throughout the years, I have learned about our traditions and sacred practices. In 2014, I was honored to participate in the completion of our World Renewal Ceremony as the ceremonial leader. Together, we have participated in demonstration Brush Dances not only within our local community but throughout the country as well. They are the future generation that will someday lead our tribe and carry on our legacy and culture.

However, I believe that this is just the beginning, and there is still much more for us to achieve together.

We also would like to remind everyone that there is language project going on now with our linguist Lynnika Butler and our language specialist Pilar James we encourage you to come check it out, all are welcome. The Cultural Department is in the process of planning this years Wiyot day we are looking towards August 22nd or August 29th once we decide on a definite date we will send out save the date to the community.

The language department and Tsek Houdaqh Youth Program are also under this Department.

The Language department has started their language classes where everyone is welcome to come join them and learn our language and create new and old phrase. Also check out the Wiyot webpage under the language section for the Rou Soulatlouy page. The language page also has words that you can hear or even scan with a bar code reader on your phone. Learn a new word a week. Remember that language is important to the Wiyot Culture.

HOW EEL LOST HIS BONE

Kutaw (Eel) said to Carogock (Sucker), "You have bones, and I have bones, and you have a mouth of the same kind as I have. You suck and I suck. So, let's gamble. They started gambling to see who might win all their bones. In a little while Sucker won all the bones. He really beat Kutaw bad. Kutaw didn't know what to do and said, "All I want now is that you make a little present to me, even though you won the bet. I want my backbone again and I want my teeth." So nowadays that is all that Kutaw has, his backbone and his teeth.



Nordic Aquafarms has proposed to build a land-based fish farming project

The dust has finally begun to settle after the fight against Terra-Gen’s wind farm development project on Bear River Ridge, but the NRD’s focus remains on climate change reliance and energy independence. Due to PGE’s recent “Public Safety Power Shutoffs”, or PSPS, the NRD has been working on increasing Tribal resilience and emergency preparedness, to eventually create a more grid independent reservation for the community. The NRD has submitted a grant proposal intended to fund new solar panel systems with battery backups for TBR homes, and back-up generators for the community center, lift station, and the well 2 water pumps to account for any type of future power emergencies. We will continue to apply to any and all grants to help fund and promote energy independence, emergency preparation, and climate change resilience. It is extremely important to remember that even as a small, rural community we do our part when it comes to global climate change, by protecting the environment from pollution, preserving all land in Wiyot ancestral Territory, but by also dramatically decreasing the Wiyot carbon footprint by moving away from our significant grid dependence.

In other news Nordic AquaFarms has proposed to build a land-based fish farming project on Humboldt Bay’s former pulp mill site, in Samoa, that they say will use a mixture of fresh and salt water to raise 33,000 tons of fish, discharging 7.7 million gallons of effluent daily through the existing 1 1/2 mile long ocean outfall. Land-based RAS production is a rapidly emerging method for sustainable production of salmon. It is based on indoor production in a controlled environment using large tanks and water treatment systems. Despite some concern expressed by the community, the company has highlighted the economic potential of the Samoa Peninsula. Representatives from Nordic AquaFarms have been in contact with the Tribe and the NRD to schedule a meeting to discuss the project, and any possible questions or concerns the Tribe might have.

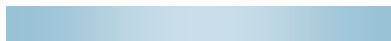

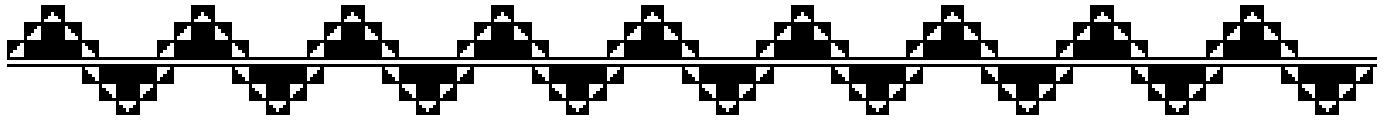

Did you know:

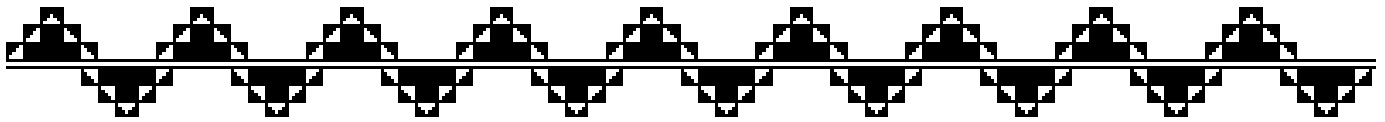
- Recycling is the process of turning used waste and materials into new products. This prevents potentially useful materials from being wasted as well as reducing energy use and pollution.
