Wiyot Tribe's Leadership Pivotal to the Victory for Bear River Ridge (*Tsakiyuwit*)

The Wiyot Natural Resources Department (WNRD) want to wish everyone a belated Happy New Year! It is hard to believe that we're already into the third month of 2020 and the next decade! With that said, we are way past due in thanking everyone and letting folks know about the monumental (no pun intended) victory for Bear River (*Tsakiyuwit*) and Monument Ridges, in the southern part of Wiyot Country. Thank You!

If you were buried under the rug for the last year, then you might not have heard about the Terra Gen corporation's attempts to develop the ridges with forty seven-600 foot tall wind turbine generators (twice the height of the Statue of Liberty), including a thirty-mile transmission corridor along Shively Ridge, all the way to Bridgeville. The proposed project area was within a cultural and biodiversity hot spot along the Pacific flyway, with miles of native coastal prairie, forest, rare plant communities, and archaeological sites that would have been negatively impacted. The Tribe made the case for its cultural and ethnobotanical resources (tribal cultural resources-TCRs) along the ridge, which hosts a multitude of culturally important plants and animals. This is a sacred high-prayer spot according to Wiyot chairman, Ted Hernandez, and cultural liaison Cheryl Seidner, and will be habitat for the planned condor re-introduction by the Yurok Tribe.

When the Wiyot Tribal Historic Preservation Office (THPO) and WNRD were first introduced to the project by the Humboldt County Planning Office, we knew the significance of the *Tsakiyuwit* prairies would be destroyed forever if the project was built, we knew that eagles, condors, and rare plants would be killed, and we knew that the ridge was worth fighting for. What we had no idea about, was the level of commitment it would take, and the community grass-roots coalition and comradery that the fight for its protection would build, which was super inspiring to be a part of. For all of those that helped to articulate the Tribe's sovereignty, position, and concerns, we are immensely thankful and want to send out our appreciation here for the time and words that many contributed and devoted to the cause. We would not have been successful if it weren't for the hundreds of people from the Tribe(s) and greater community that attended marathon meetings, including three grueling Planning Commission meetings, two all-day Board of Supervisor's meetings, informational meetings, and rallies, not to mention all of the personal research conducted by many. The mental and emotional toll of the battle is just now finally starting to subside a little, as it brought out some of the dark colonialist history of our region and capitalism's often unforgiving domination over nature. Anyone familiar with Standing Rock and the fight to undam the Klamath River for can relate. Our big future goal is the dream of undamming the Eel River, which will also need full Tribal and community participation as well. We also must stay vigilant of our ridges and engaged in community efforts to make our region the most resilient it can be in a warming world, while making smart decisions about land use and renewable energy development.

Shawir Darrudaluduk “We Belong to the Wilderness”

Looking back on 2019, with the repatriation of Tuluwat, the victory for Tsakiyuwit and all it stands for, and the last decades of successes, it is clearly the time of the return of the Wiyot, who have survived and stayed strong, despite being knocked down a few times since the Europeans arrived, and as Wiyot cultural liaison Cheryl Seidner has pointed out, “The Wiyot were here before America.” The traditional ecological knowledge that the Wiyot hold rests on thousands of years of local experience, wisdom, and understanding of how the human world is one with the natural world, and the role we are honored to play in helping maintain the ecological balance.

During the recent fight to protect Tsakiyuwit from industrial wind-power development by the Terra Gen corporation, huge considerations had to be made by all, especially the Tribe, who care deeply about the climate crisis, but understand the related and priceless value of the ecological systems and services that nature provides to moderate the climate and maintain biodiversity and culture. Cheryl Seidner showed impeccable leadership when the Tribe was essentially offered a one-million-dollar bribe from Terra Gen in compensation for the loss of the Tsakiyuwit, and when called up to the lectern by Supervisor Bohn, Cheryl’s response struck like lightning on a high prairie, “You would not sell your mother. We cannot sell our Earth,” she said. “We come from the Earth...and the Tribe needed to be at the table for these discussions,” she said. The day that the Board of Supervisors voted down the Terra Gen project, December 17, 2019, was a day that the Wiyot and people of Humboldt County changed history, and crystalized the significance that indigenous people have and must play in the democratic process and the environmental stage. It was a day of de-colonialization at its finest, which would not have been possible without grass roots activism, the words of many, and especially the wisdom of the Wiyot.

As we ease into 2020 and the next decade, we must quicken the pace that we move toward healing the Earth, and the steps we take to return the balance.

The WNRD is already participating in community efforts to find solutions to climate change and sea level rise, which will undoubtedly take all hands-on-deck if we are to slow its momentum and reduce our endless inputs of carbon dioxide into the atmosphere, which exacerbates the greenhouse effect, trapping heat. Some ways of reducing our carbon footprint include driving less, protecting and restoring forestlands, buying less, and sourcing our food from close to home. Thinking globally and acting locally, with Tuluwat as the center of the universe along the pendulum between Tsakiyuwit (Bear River Ridge) and Qus Bugaduli’m (Strawberry Prairie) we can have hope that the second world renewal ceremony since 1860 is planned for this month, as we move out of the darkness of winter and into the light.

A few months ago, while up on Tsakiyuwit with Cheryl, she clarified the good intentions that the Wiyot have for all existence is these words, “When we have our World Renewal Ceremony in March, it’s not for just the Wiyot people, it’s not just for Eureka, it’s not just for Humboldt County, we are global, it’s for the world, we want to make the world right, we want to put it into balance.” It is through the leadership of indigenous voices like Cheryl Seidner, alongside the passionate hearts of a caring community, that we can together, tip the pendulum back to center.

The Wiyot Tribe would like to thank everyone that came out in solidarity for Tsakiyuwit. It took all of us. Now we must take the next steps to get Tsakiyuwit listed on the historic register, so that it is protected from any future attempts at development. We must also weigh our best options and sites for renewable energy on the North Coast, while balancing the critical role that our region plays as a climate change refugium for species experiencing a warming world. ROU SOULATLOUY ~ Wiyot Conversation Book Project: Since November, the Language Program has held six workshops at Table Bluff to brainstorm conversation topics for a Wiyot language conversation book that we will publish in late 2021. Youth from Tsek Houdaqh have been our most frequent participants, but we were happy to welcome several elders and guests

Conversation topics we have brainstormed so far include:

Child/parent interactions: "Clean your room," "It's time to go to bed," etc.

Health & wellbeing: "How are you feeling?", "I don't feel well," "My head hurts," etc.

Weather: "It's sunny/cloudy/hot/cold," "It's raining/snowing/sleeting," etc.

Animals & pets: "I have [one/two/three] dogs," "Feed the dog!", etc.

Gardening: "Please help me plant some flowers," "I'm digging," etc.

Language Specialist Pilar James has been working hard to find Wiyot translations by searching our language database. 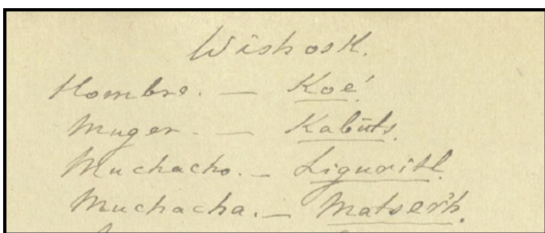

LANGUAGE MATERIALS

We recently acquired Alphonse Pinart's Wiyot language field notes (from ca. 1870), and are in the process of adding them to the Wiyot database to make them more easily searchable. Below is a sample of what the notes look like (words in the left column are in Spanish, right column is Wiyot; "Wishoshk" was a term often used by white researchers for the Wiyot language, but it is most likely a misunderstanding of the Wiyot word **Wishashk**, which actually means 'Athabaskan woman'):

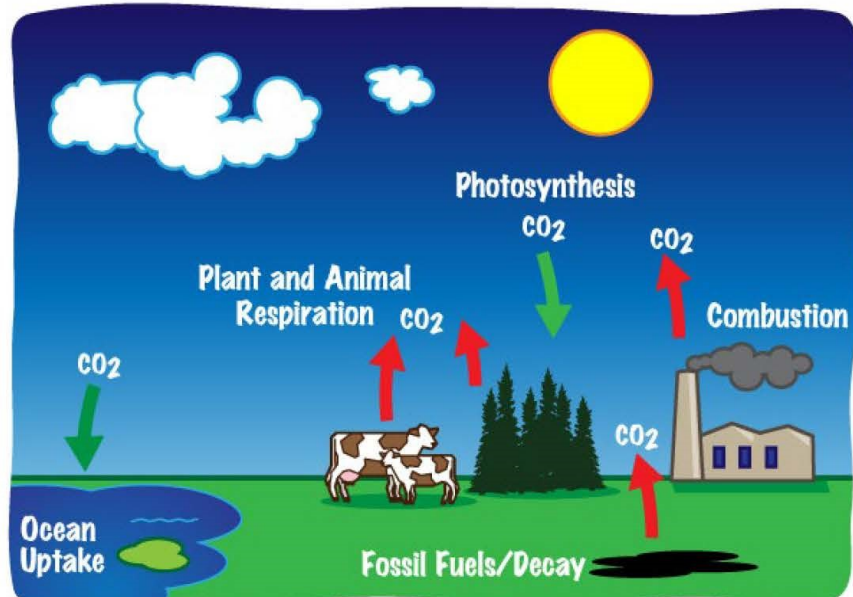
Wiyot Youth Environmental Corner - Climate Change!



Color all the ways you can help reduce climate change!



CO₂ is a big part of the carbon cycle. The carbon cycle traces carbon's path from the atmosphere, into living organisms, then turning into dead organic matter, going into the oceans, and back into the atmosphere. Scientists describe the cycle in terms of **sources** (parts of the cycle that *add* carbon to the atmosphere) and **sinks** (parts of the cycle that *remove* carbon from the atmosphere). The key to keeping everything in balance is for the sources and sinks to have the same amount of CO₂.
