First and foremost, I would like to send my prayers and thoughts out to our Tribal citizens during these times. With the Covid-19 and now fires our tribe is being put through a lot. Our Tribal staff has been doing an excellent job in trying to provide resources and assistance to our membership during these trying times. The Staff has put on numerous Covid-19 test out here on the reservation. They sent out Covid-19 kits to all tribal citizens, provide food boxes to our tribal citizens, and deliver meals to our elders and youth.

Now we are dealing with the fires here in California there our tribal members that possibly live near these fires please keep them in your thoughts and prayers. Please if you are asked to evacuate do so immediately and please make sure you have all your important family information ready to go. Here is a list on how to be prepared if you need to evacuate:

- *Prescription medications and glasses Infant formula and diapers
- *Pet food and extra water for your pet
- *Important family documents such as copies of insurance policies, identification and bank account records in a water-proof, portable container
- Cash or traveler's checks and change
- *Emergency reference material such as a first aid book or information on www.ready.gov
- *sleeping bag or warm blanket for each person. Consider additional bedding you live in a cold-weather climate.
- *Complete change of clothing including a long-sleeved shirt, long pants, and sturdy shoes. Consider additional clothing if you live in a cold-weather climate.
- *Household chlorine bleach and medicine dropper – When diluted nine parts water to one-part bleach, bleach can be used as a disinfectant. Or in an emergency, you can use it to treat water by using 16 drops of regular household liquid bleach per gallon of water. Do not use scented, color safe or bleaches with added cleaners.
- *Fire Extinguisher
- *Matches in a waterproof container Feminine supplies and personal hygiene items
- *Mess kits, paper cups, plates and plastic utensils, paper towels
- *Paper and pencil Books, games, puzzles, or other activities for children
- *www.ready.gov

It is also important If you live in areas that are very smokey please stay inside especially our elders and children it is not good for these members to be outside. If you need to go out for errand, please wear a mask or see if there are other ways to get these errands done for you. Once the shelter in place is lifted, we will be able to hold cultural classes. We are open to any input on what type of cultural activities you would like to see for our youth and or our community whether it be regalia making or stories about our ancestors. We are still looking for tribal elders or the younger generation to come out and share their traditional knowledge, classes, and stories with other citizens. It is so important to share our traditional knowledge with all our citizens so that it will never be lost. Especially now that our younger generation wants to learn more about our stories and traditions the cultural department will continue to post the old stories and photos that we have in our collection in each month newsletter. So, if you have family stories and or photos that you would like to share, we would be happy to put in our newsletter.

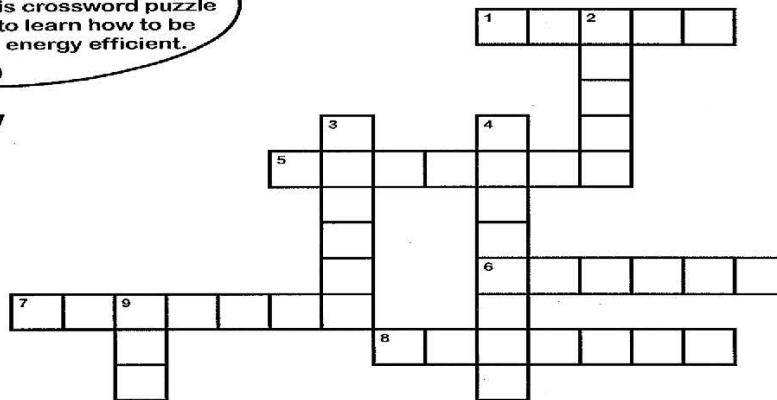
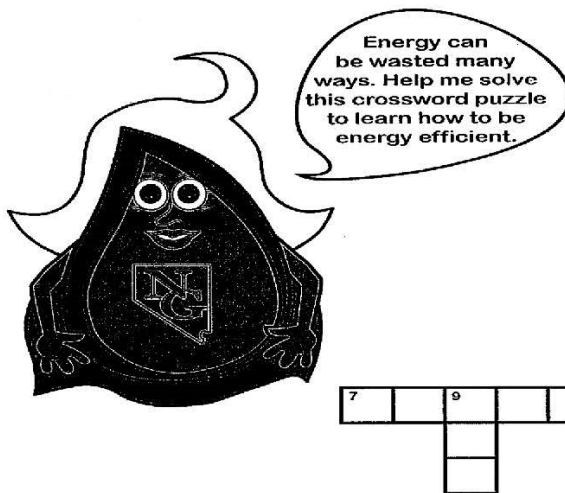


SOLAR SAVES THE DAY
