

Sea Level Rise

The WNRD have been busy working on the newly awarded BIA Tribal Climate Resiliency grant, who recently hired Wiyot technician, Hilanea Wilkinson has been helping to lead up. Hilanea has been conducting interviews with Tribal members about concerns related to climate change and sea level rise (SLR) and is earnestly looking for additional Wiyot citizens to interview (please contact Hilanea at hwilkinson@wiyat.us 707-733-5055 x 122). Preliminary concerns that folks have shared in common include the increased loss of hunting and gathering sites. As our grant partner Aldaron Laird has pointed out to us, “nearly one-third of Wigis tidal footprint was cut-off starting in 1890, when dike construction stopped the daily flooding and ebbing of tides, across 90% of its salt marsh plains. Now many of these dikes are poorly maintained and vulnerable to breaching during King Tides or winter storms. Sea level rise will overtop these dikes, their breaching will once again allow daily flooding and ebbing of tides of in former tidelands. Wigis will regain its former extent and in-fact will grow with sea level rise (see photo 2, map, gold illustrates former saltmarsh, blue indicates 1 meter of sea level rise). This fall, King Tides occur on November 15th and 16th and December 13-14th, which is an excellent opportunity to see in real time how SLR will impact our region.



Attention TBR Residents

We have noticed some problem items in our sewage that can cause significant and costly issues in our septic system.

I would like to take a moment to remind you to not to flush items such as:

Wipes (not even “flushable”)

Feminine products

Paper towels

Rags

Cotton balls, rounds, or swabs

Bandages

Diapers

Cigarettes butts

Plastic

Grease, fats, other oils

This is not a complete list, just a small general guideline.

Please be mindful and help us take care of our water and wastewater system.

The language department:

Recent topics we have been working on include birds, school & school activities, and directions (north, south, etc.). We have approximately 15 draft conversations currently in the works, with more on the way. Our culture is a living spirit that must continue to thrive. Our generation must carry on with the traditional ways and the stories from our elders and ancestors that have gone before us.



Sleepyhead

At upper Alton, in the old days, Sleepyhead lived there. He slept; he didn't do serious work. Two girls liked him. Those girls said, "how about it?" They go to leave him out west. They carried him down. They put him in the boat and started off. They went west by boat. Upon arrival they saw land. A rock was in the water, they carried him up there, he went on sleeping. That's where they left him. They went toward the shore, and they came back again. Then they landed again.

That's when he went and woke up. In vain he looked here and there; he never saw land. Then he only saw water. He started to cry, he cried for a long time. He looked around in vain there and there, then he looked to the south. He saw something. He kept on crying. Then he looked at it again. Then he looked at it for a long time. Then he thought "it's very big." He looked at it again. That's when he went and saw somebody coming from around there.

A man was coming. He is surprised at his coming on water. Then, on arrival, he came up, then on arrival he talked to him. "Where do you come from?" "I don't know." Then he said to him, "long ago I was sleeping, two girls liked me." Perhaps that's when I was left. He-who-goes-down-west was the one who came around from that way. He was told, "I know you, I know it, where you live." He said, "I am going to listen in the north. That is where they are starting to dance. You are going with me." When I come again, I am going to take you back. Sleepyhead said, "Can I go that way?" pointing to the water. "You will go with me?" Then he said "That's not where I am going to go." He said, "GO!" Then he went. Then he thought that he was going to sink. He started off, him, too. Then that's where he went. They were coming there and arrived.

There were a lot of people. After a long time it got dark, and there was singing. They started to dance. Not long after they sat down to rest. He-who-goes-down-west thought, "I am not known." Then he started to think, "I will sing." They started to think, "He's going to be a doctor." He was a man before I found him, I'm going to give him a present." Then he gave him a present. Then he became rich. The next day, he started to go back. He came back.

Everyone heard about it. Then the two girls heard about him coming back. They went to see him. When they got there, they sat down to rest at the entrance, they sat one on each side, they looked in. Then Sleepyhead thought about it, "I do not like seeing them again, they did not treat me very well. Then he went out. The girls were sitting there. Then he touched them. He didn't go very far, and then he looked back. Then he saw rocks sitting there.

Wiyot Tribe Curriculum Development Project

In November, several of us decided to meet to develop curriculum that could be taught in Humboldt County schools, at Tsek Houdaqh, and at the Cultural Center. We formally met in December and developed a plan to meet monthly to set goals, research, gather previously made curriculum, materials, articles, papers, etc., and develop these materials into curriculum that can be shared with schools. Our hope is that the curriculum will be used in conjunction with a presentation by a Wiyot tribal member or staff person so that students gain a deeper understanding and knowledge base of who Wiyot people are, our history, our language, and our contemporary goals and situation.

Wiyot Tribe Land Acknowledgement Statement

Several tribal staff members are working on developing a land acknowledgement statement. A land acknowledgement statement is a recognition of the fact that the lands a person or organization is living or conducting business on are unceded lands of Native Americans. In this instance the Wiyot people.

Along with this acknowledgement should come responsibility. A person or organization that wishes to recognize that they are living and working on unceded lands should ask themselves, "What does this [land acknowledgement] compel me to do? What actions will I commit to because of this land acknowledgement?" (Dr. Cutcha Risling Baldy, "What is a Good Land Acknowledgement?" 07/03/2020).

Acknowledging the fact that millions of acres of land were forcibly and violently taken from Indigenous people and committing to making changes, partnering, and/or allying with Native peoples builds stronger communities where important work and healing needs to take place. For more information about land acknowledgements, I encourage you to watch a talk that Dr. Cutcha Risling Baldy, Native American Studies Professor and Department Chair at Humboldt State University, gave in July 2020. Statue Removal at the Arcata Plaza

In February 2018, the City of Arcata Council voted to remove the statue of former U.S. President William McKinley and the vote was upheld by Measure M passing with 67.81% of City of Arcata residents voting for the removal in November 2018. In February 2019, the McKinley statue was removed from the Arcata Plaza and relocated to Canton, Ohio, where McKinley is buried and where his library is located. Several of us will be working together to present ideas and suggestions to the City of Arcata about what could replace the now vacant spot in the plaza. Possibly a piece of art that better represents a wider representation of the history of Goudi'ni (Arcata).
