In Loving Memory of Velva Angell



Velva Angell passed from this earth on Aug. 14, 2021 at the age of 92. She was proud of her Native American heritage as she was Wiyot, Yurok and Wintun Indian. Velva was born in Eureka, California on April 5, 1929 to her parents, Elizabeth Logan Cooper and Henry Clay Cooper. She attended and graduated from Eureka High School. Shortly after graduation, Velva moved to San Francisco to attend and graduate from California Beauty School.



Velva met and fell in love with the love of her life, Lucius "Bud" Angell III, while he was on shore leave as a sailor in San Francisco. They were married on Feb. 8, 1948, at Christ Episcopal Church in Eureka. Together they raised three sons: Lucius "Bud" Angell IV (Betsy), Bruce Steven Angell and Paul Douglas Angell. They welcomed their niece, Cindy Dunlap Dutra (Dave), into their home after the death of her mother, and raised "their girl" as their own.

Velva worked for and retired from Eureka City Schools. She first worked as a noon monitor at Alice Birney Elementary School and later as a classroom aide at Jacobs Junior High School. She served for many years, with great pride, on the Board of Directors of the United Indian Health Services as the Table Bluff, Wiyot Tribal Representative.

An extremely talented seamstress, she sewed many outfits for her children. School clothes, dresses for dances, cheerleading outfits and formal wear were all sewn with love and an eye for detail. Later, her handiwork was evident in the pine needle baskets she wove, the hand stitcheries she proudly shared with others and the many crocheted caps she made for the premature babies at St. Joseph Hospital.

Velva had four grandchildren: Elaine Angell, Eric Brunton (Taunya), Aaron Brunton (Joy) and Tabatha Leady (Matt), 11 great-grandchildren and 1 great-great grandchild.

Velva was preceded in death by her beloved husband Bud Angell, her son Bruce Angell, her brother Henry Clay Cooper, as well as her three sisters Roberta Cooper Martin, Carole Cooper Koch and Marilyn Cooper Dugan.

Table Bluff Water System Update

Table Bluff Reservation water system is running smoothly. Both wells are being used and we are currently tracking the drawdown at Well 2. We are taking routine water samples at the beginning of every month to North Coast Labs in Arcata. They are testing for the Presence/absence of any pathogens or chemicals. We had a small hole on the water tank repaired. We are working to schedule a tank cleaning for this winter. Another reminder for everyone, California is in an extreme drought. Residents please be mindful of your water usage.

Reservation Wetland wells

The NRD checks the wetland biweekly. We measure the water level and test the water using our EXO Sonde.

Tests include:

Conductivity/Temperature

Dissolved Oxygen

ISEs (Ammonium, Chloride, and Nitrate)

pH

Turbidity

Salinity

Both wells were sampled in 2019 for chemical parameters including, priority metals, fecal chloroform, and E.coli. The tests the last couple months has showed the water level decreasing causing more turbidity in the water. The water level is about 55in from the surface, which is 5in from the bottom of our well. This goes to show how severe this drought is.

Some historically observed impacts of severe to extreme droughts:

Trees are stressed; plants increase reproductive mechanisms; wildlife diseases increase

Livestock need expensive supplemental feed, cattle and horses are sold; little pasture remains, producers find it difficult to maintain organic meat requirements

Federal water is not adequate to meet irrigation contracts; extracting supplemental groundwater is expensive

Fire season lasts year-round; fires occur in typically wet parts of state; burn bans are implemented

Water sanitation is a concern, reservoir levels drop significantly, surface water is nearly dry, flows are very low; water theft occurs

Water conservation rebate programs increase; water use restrictions are implemented; water transfer's increase

Wells and aquifer levels decrease; homeowners drill new wells

Water is inadequate for agriculture, wildlife, and urban needs; reservoirs are extremely low; hydropower is restricted

Fish rescue and relocation begins; pine beetle infestation occurs; forest mortality is high; wetlands dry up; survival of native plants and animals is low; fewer wildflowers bloom; wildlife death is widespread; algae blooms appear

We had Steve's Septic come and pump the septic tanks late august. We had an overwhelming amount of solid build up in the tanks. These problem items in our sewage can cause significant and costly issues in our septic system.

A reminder of items that you can NOT flush:

- Wipes (not even “flushable”)
- Feminine products
- Paper towels
- Rags
- Cotton balls, rounds, or swabs
- Bandages
- Diapers
- Cigarettes butts
- Plastic
- Grease, fats, other oils

Wiyot Natural Resources Department Pikeminnow Project update

The continuation of the department's PCSRF (Pacific Coastal Salmon Recovery Fund) grant project, in which the NRD is testing multiple methods of population suppression on the invasive Sacramento Pikeminnow, began mid-June and will continue into late September, potentially doing some work through November. The NRD staff is working alongside colleagues from Still Water Sciences, and volunteers from differing agencies and the greater fisheries community, to collect data on pikeminnow population estimates, removal and population suppression methods and predation on native fish. Methods of population suppression for the invasive Pikeminnow include boat electro-fishing, seine and fyke netting, baiting trapping, traditional angling, and night dip netting. The 2021 and 2022 field seasons will be the biggest efforts put towards this specific project since it's proposal, and we hope that the data collected during these two years will shed even more light on the distribution and population of Pikeminnow in the South Fork, as well as native salmonid predation by the invasive population.

The NRD team has wrapped up Electrofishing. We have started seine and fyke netting, and traditional angling. We will also be tagging any large pikeminnow we catch with these other methods.

We are now trying to tag fish south Indian creek past Leggett and to the Angelo Reserve.

We are deploying Acoustic tags in the larger pikeminnow we catch. Each tag has a unique code associated with the specific fish and location. We must anesthetize the fish, measure, and place it in a piece of pvc as we prepare to insert the tag. We have a water drip on the fish as we make a small incision to insert the tag in the belly. We then suture the incision up and place the fish in a recovery tote to be sure they are healthy to release.

Our plan is to recapture the tagged Pikeminnow to monitor their movement throughout the Eel River.

We will continue to update the Tribal community on the PCSRF project status, and all relevant data will be shared to the Wiyot Tribal Community website once the project season is completed.







Table Bluff Residents please be mindful of your water usage. We are averaging 10,000 gal per day. **California is in an extreme drought.**

We are monitoring the drawdown of the wells. The usual static level was ~70 ft, we are at ~86ft now.

Ways to conserve water inside

- Install Aerators
 - Can save 1.2 gal per day
- Install High Efficiency Toilets
 - Can save 19 gal per day
- Keep Showers under 5 minutes
 - Can save 12.5 gal per shower
- Fix Leaks! (Toilets, faucets, pipes)
 - Can save 110 gal per month
- Turn off water when brushing your teeth or shaving
 - Can save 10 gal per day
- Wash full loads of clothes and dishes
 - Can save 10-45 gal per load


The wells are not recharging to the historical capacity or rate. We are concerned, we do not want our wells to run dry.

We urge residents to refrain from watering the grass and please try to use less water.

Ways to conserve water outside

- Plant water wise and native plants
 - Cacti, moss
- Use a broom to clean outside (not pressure washer)
- Use mulch
- Set mower blades to 3"
 - Encourages deeper roots, can save 20-30 gal of water per 1000 ft²
- Adjust sprinkler heads and fix leaks
 - Saves 12-15 gal. A leak as small as the tip of a pen can waste 6,300 gal per month!

Do Not water your grass!

Elder Meal Program Update



The Elder Meal Program got a new piece of equipment last month—a meal tray sealer. This allows the meals to be sealed, trapping heat and helping our meals be delivered at closer to its intended temperature. We are also using insulated tray carriers with an electronic heating element, also helping keep hot meals hot upon delivery.

These new tools were purchased through CARES Act funds by the Health & Human Services Department. WIYOT TRIBE **EMERGENCY RENTAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM**

We are proud to announce our own Emergency Rental Assistance program to assist Wiyot households during this pandemic.

This program is to alleviate the costs of rent and utilities if not explicitly a part of your rental agreement, including energy, water, garbage, and home telephone-Internet (*not cellular service*). This program is for those who pay rent, not those who pay a mortgage or own their home. Due to the nature of the program and emergency if you are already evicted or homeless having prior resided in a rental property this program can support a new rental or short-term hotel stay until you find a new residence.

To ensure that we meet the needs of the most citizens, we have an annual (12 months from first award) cap of \$1,500.00 per household.

A qualified applicant must:

- Be an enrolled member of the Wiyot Tribe, Table Bluff Reservation;
- Have one or more individuals within the household who has qualified for unemployment benefits or experienced a reduction in household income, incurred significant costs, or experienced other financial hardship due, directly or indirectly, to the COVID-19 outbreak;
- Be obligated to pay rent on a residential dwelling or be already evicted/homeless; and
- the household has a household income at or below 80% of area median income (ex. as of 2021 median annual household income in Humboldt is \$62,151).

To successfully apply, the application must be completed and have attached the required documents as indicated. Documentation cannot be dated no earlier than March 13, 2020.

If you are currently renting, payments will be made directly to the landlord. Ensure that the landlord contact and mailing information is provided in the application. A landlord may also apply on behalf of the household.

This program will accept applications until the deadline of September 30, 2025, or until funds have been exhausted, whichever comes first.






Tsek Houdaqh Youth Program
