6. Elders/Disabled wood: Elders/disabled Citizens get one cord per year from Men's Camp

If you have any questions or concerns about the vaccination or the vaccination booster, consult your primary care physician or the Department of Public Health. Please follow the guidelines of the vaccinations and vaccination booster given to you by the health professional.

WIYOT TRIBE **EMERGENCY RENTAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM**

We are proud to announce our own Emergency Rental Assistance program to assist Wiyot households during this pandemic.

This program is to alleviate the costs of rent and utilities if not explicitly a part of your rental agreement, including energy, water, garbage, and home telephone-Internet (*not cellular service*). This program is for those who pay rent, not those who pay a mortgage or own their home. Due to the nature of the program and emergency if you are already evicted or homeless having prior resided in a rental property this program can support a new rental or short-term hotel stay until you find a new residence.

To ensure that we meet the needs of the most citizens, we have an annual (12 months from first award) cap of \$1,500.00 per household.

A qualified applicant must:

- Be an enrolled member of the Wiyot Tribe, Table Bluff Reservation;
- Have one or more individuals within the household who has qualified for unemployment benefits or experienced a reduction in household income, incurred significant costs, or experienced other financial hardship due, directly or indirectly, to the COVID-19 outbreak;
- Be obligated to pay rent on a residential dwelling or be already evicted/homeless; and
- the household has a household income at or below 80% of area median income (ex. as of 2021 median annual household income in Humboldt is \$62,151).

To successfully apply, the application must be completed and have attached the required documents as indicated. Documentation cannot be dated no earlier than March 13, 2020.

If you are currently renting, payments will be made directly to the landlord. Ensure that the landlord contact and mailing information is provided in the application. A landlord may also apply on behalf of the household.

This program will accept applications until the deadline of September 30, 2025, or until funds have been exhausted, whichever comes first.

We hope that this program brings our Citizens some relief during this pandemic. We stand with you.

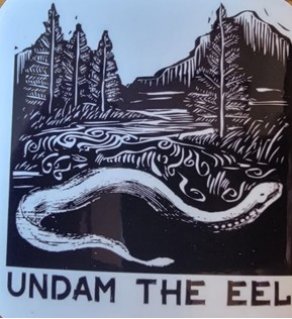

The Cultural department Continues to work with our local Tribal THPOS, Local cities, Federal and County Governments on consultation projects, Section 106, Native Americans: California Environmental Quality Act (AB52), California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), and timber harvest plans (THP). This department has also been sending our tribal monitors on projects in Wiyot Ancestral Territory. During July, this department received and commented on thirty projects. We also had three tribal monitoring projects going on in July. We are also focusing on the removal of the Potter valley Dam project. Our Eel (Wiy`ot) river needs to have its water restored to come back to health for our salmon and eels.

The Department is also assisting agencies with Traditional Land Acknowledgement language when they bring it to us for review before they post. We very are excited that communities in Wiyot ancestral territory are recognizing that they live and work on Wiyot land. There is so much happening in Wiyot territory.

Our department started repatriating three Basket Caps from the University of Missouri Museum. The three Caps have been placed in the National Register to see if anyone claims them. They will be in the register for 30 days. If no one makes a claim, we will start having them return home.

We are still working with the Hearst Museum and the Brooklyn Museum on other sacred items that need to come home. The artifacts are transferred over to the tribe. We are just planning when to transport them home for safe travels.

The Cultural Department is happy to say that our ancestors and sacred items are coming home one day at a time. We are looking forward to our sacred things being home one day.

We are excited to say that we received funding to build our traditional dance house at one of our three known village sites. We were awarded these funds through Seventh Generations Fund. We look forward to seeing this dance house come to life. As well as the dance house we will be starting on our traditional dug-out project with the Blue Ox Mill. These are just of the Cultural projects that we will be doing.

Da gou rou louwi' "the ongoing return of all" (lit. 'continuous again all the returning')

When naming our new Cultural Center, Da gou rou louwi' Cultural Center, we wanted a name that described that this place would house the ongoing return of all thoughts, things, ideas, and initiatives that are important to Wiyot people. This includes sacred and ceremonial practices, Soulatluk (the Wiyot language), life-ways, cultural traditions, healthy land, water, air, plants, and animals, the return of our Ancestors from museums so they can be laid to rest, a voice in our collective history, and a stronger, more cohesive Wiyot Community. Da gou rou louwi' encompasses these ideas and goals.

Da gou rou louwi' Cultural Center Grant Projects

Over the past three months, the Da gou rou louwi' Cultural Center has been awarded four grants, totaling over \$170,000.00. These funds will support various projects that will perpetuate Wiyot cultural knowledge and practices, Soulatluk (Wiyot language), and provide opportunities for youth and adults to engage with and learn from Elders. Here are the grant projects that will be underway in 2022:

Wiyot Curriculum Development: This project will develop and write curriculum about the Wiyot people, history, culture, language, and contemporary issues. We wish to educate peers of our Wiyot children and the local community by providing more information about who Wiyot people are and ensuring we are not relegated to history, to bring to light stereotypes, and to show that we are a contemporary and thriving people. The need for curriculum about Wiyot people, and other Indigenous people, is an urgent need in school systems across the United States and the Wiyot Curriculum we will develop will fill a gap in knowledge in our community and provide another example of quality educational materials that teachers can pull from to educate their students.

Native American teachers and/or Native American ally teachers will be recruited to develop and write curriculum, in collaboration with Wiyot people, Elders, and Culture Knowledge Bearers. Training about Wiyot people will be provided to curriculum writers, consultants, and others who are unfamiliar with Wiyot culture, history, language, etc. and who are part of the project. Consultants will develop supporting teaching materials that are culturally appropriate and include place-based learning. We will pull upon the expertise of Native teachers, reviewers, and curriculum developers to hire curriculum reviewers who have had years of experience teaching and/or training teachers and/or developing Native American curriculum. Finally, we will be able to introduce the curriculum and supporting materials at a launch party for area teachers.

Museum Grant: DGRL Cultural Center received a grant to support a project that will develop, record, and dis-

seminate six cultural practices/traditional knowledge video demonstrations to be used in educational programming at the Cultural Center and online. This project will directly support the ongoing transmission of traditional, cultural, historical, and language knowledge of Wiyot people to each other in during times when we cannot be together due to distance or health and safety protocols. Further, these videos will be utilized well into the future to teach other Wiyot people.

ANA Soulatluk Grant: Inaccessibility to Wiyot lhatsik (stories/traditions) is a contributing factor to the difficulties of learning Soulatluk (Wiyot language) for some people. This issue will be addressed with these grant funds by partnering with artists to visually represent our lhatsik on video, and include the lhatsik recordings we have, so that Soulatluk learners will be better able to hear, see, and learn our lhatsik. These videos will be used into the future in Soulatluk classes.

NYCF Grant: With this grant project, we will develop and implement an Elder-In-Residence Program at the Da gou rou louwi' Cultural Center where we will engage and involve Wiyot youth who live on and off reservation lands by providing a space where Elders and youth can talk and learn together. We aim for Wiyot youth to learn their history, culture, and language from Elders who participate in the Program. We will invite Elders to mentor, teach, and share traditional cultural knowledge and practices that will not only preserve, reclaim, and revitalize the practices, but will also develop and build strong communal and family relationships that are often lacking in present-day tribal communities.

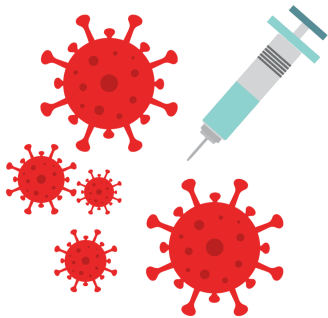

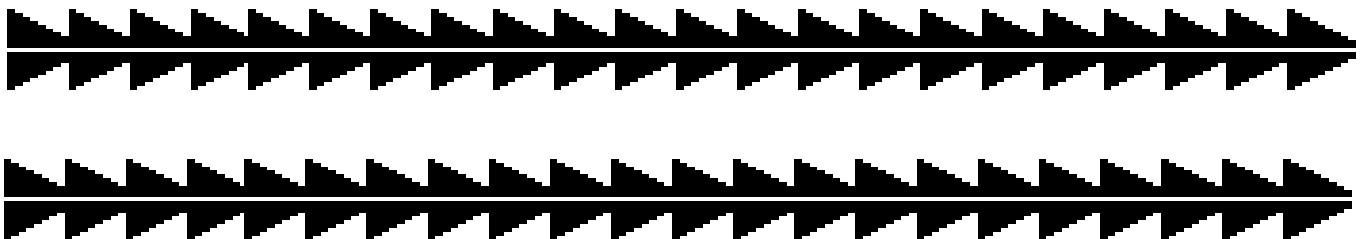

Nonoperational Vehicles

The Natural Resources Department is working with the EPA to retrieve any Nonoperational or abandoned vehicles around the Table Bluff Reservation (TBR). We are in the process of drafting a vehicle surrender form and outreaching to local scrappers with capacity.

To surrender a vehicle, you will need to provide the title and a bill of sale. If any of the paperwork has been misplaced, you can get a “junk slip” from the CA DMV. If the title is lost but has current registration you just need a bill of sale.

The Wiyot Tribal Code

Nonoperational Vehicles Ordinance

The storage of abandoned and nonoperational vehicles poses both human and environmental health risks to the community members of Wiyot Tribe and the surrounding community. The risks associated with the improper storage/maintenance of abandoned and nonoperational vehicles include, but are not limited to, pollutants like gasoline/diesel fuel, oil, transmission fluid, and power steering/brake fluid can leak, polluting soil, ground, and surface water. Vehicles also contain other hazardous materials that may harm the environment (i.e., lead-acid batteries and mercury switches). They are often utilized to store materials such as garbage and other refuse, which may attract pests and become disease vector breeding grounds.

Dismantling or destruction of any vehicle(s) or vehicle part(s) for the purposes of sale, recycling, destruction, and/or vandalism that is not performed by licensed vehicle dismantlers is prohibited.

With the exemption of routine vehicle maintenance and any vehicle(s) or vehicle part(s) that is/are completely stored within an enclosed building in a lawful manner.

“Nonoperational vehicle” means a vehicle that is incapable of starting and moving under its own power

“Routine vehicle maintenance” means maintenance or scheduled service performed on a vehicle that does not involve any form of vehicle dismantling. Examples can include, but are not limited to, repairs, part(s) replacement, and lube, oil, filter, and tire rotations.

The Wiyot Tribal Code is current through Ordinance 16-20, passed June 8, 2020.

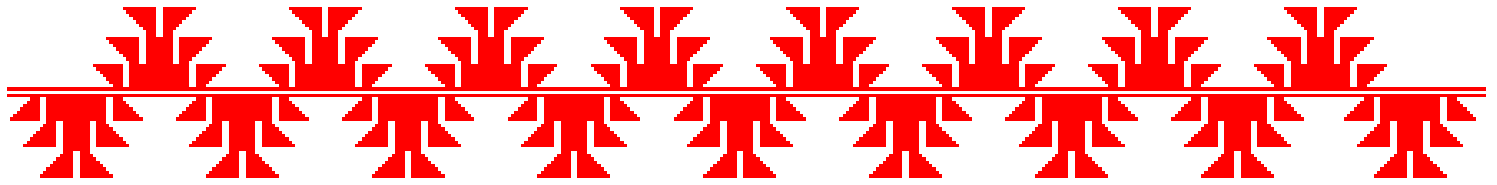

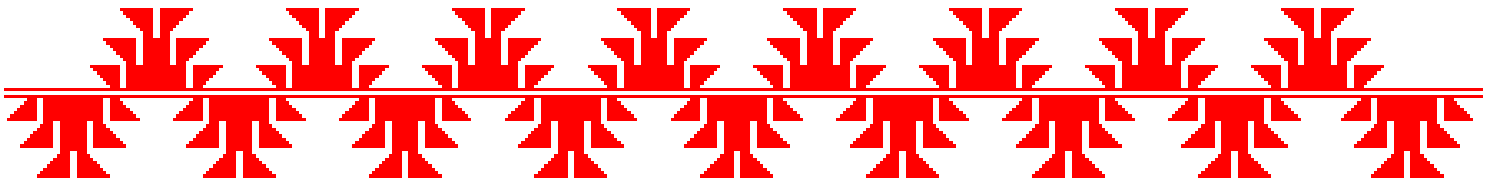

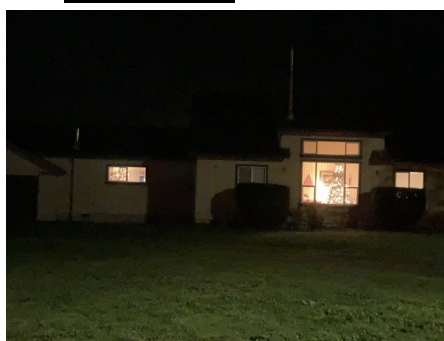
