WNRD Prepare to launch Ocean Protection Council (OPC) Prop 68 Coastal Resilience Grant

After almost a year of negotiations with the OPC and delays due to the Covid-19 pandemic, our grant agreement is finally complete and we can begin work on Phase 1 of the Wiyot Tribe Climate Change Adaptation Plan (CCAP), which will consist of Tribal citizen engagement and documentation of concerns relative to sea level rise (SLR) and climate change and the development of a protocol for the appropriate collection and application of traditional ecological knowledge (TEK) to guide adaptation efforts.

The proposal which was drafted by WNRD Director Adam Canter with assistance from the Cal Poly Humboldt SLR Initiative and our planning consultants at Greenway Partners, received an additional \$150K on top of the \$100K originally requested with the OPC providing the enhanced funding for the Tribe to develop a TEK protocol focusing on collaborating with other coastal tribes and to work to identify issues and concerns related to Wiyot cultural and natural resources and assets that are vulnerable to SLR and climate change. The OPC is hoping the increased funding can help us work to develop a TEK protocol or approach that could be replicated by others, which has been done at various scales by other tribes. The second major component involves GIS data collection from existing sources by expanding collaborations with land management agencies and entities, along with some possible field mapping to expand the Wiyot's efforts at assessing asset vulnerability. If you have interest in sitting on a TEK/TK/IK subcommittee team or can recommend anyone that we might reach out to who has worked with this topic, we would be most appreciative. Tribal citizen participants will receive a stipend up to \$100 for the meetings they attend. We may be reaching out to some of you individually soon and help spread the word. Hou! (Thanks) and take care, Rra'dutwas (with kindness), Adam."

Cultural Department

The Cultural department Continues to work with our local Tribal THPOS, Local cities, Federal and County Governments on consultation projects, Section 106, Native Americans: California Environmental Quality Act (AB52), California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), and timber harvest plans (THP). This department has also been sending our tribal monitors on projects in Wiyot Ancestral Territory. During July, this department received and commented on thirty projects. We also had three tribal monitoring projects going on in July. We are also focusing on the removal of the Potter valley Dam project. Our Eel (Wiy'ot) river needs to have its water restored to come back to health for our salmon and eels.

The Department is also assisting agencies with Traditional Land Acknowledgement language when they bring it to us for review before they post. We very are excited that communities in Wiyot ancestral territory are recognizing that they live and work on Wiyot land. There is so much happening in Wiyot territory.

Our department started repatriating process to bring home three Basket Caps from the University of Missouri Museum. We are pleased to announce that these caps have not been claimed during the 30-day notice in the National Register. We will be starting the repatriation processes with the University of Missouri Museum to bring them home.

We are still working with the Hearst Museum and the Brooklyn Museum on other sacred items that need to come home. The artifacts are transferred over to the tribe. We are just planning when to transport them home for safe travels.

The Cultural Department is happy to say that our ancestors and sacred items are coming home one day at a time. We are looking forward to all of our sacred things being home one day.

We are excited to say that we received funding to build our traditional dance house at one of our three known village sites. We were awarded these funds through Seventh Generations Fund. We look forward to seeing this dance house come to life. As part as the house building project, we will be looking young and older men to go to Sumeg to help restore the village house at the park. You will work alongside Walt Lara and other young men in restoring these houses. By doing this you will gain the knowledge to help build ours at the site that we choose.

As well as the dance house we will be starting on our traditional dugout project It looks like these two projects will be running alongside each other during the spring and summer. We are working on putting the flyers together for these two awesome projects so keep on the lookout for them. These are just of the Cultural projects that we will be doing.

This department is also working on the 2022 NAGPRA consultation/Documentation Grant through National Park service. We will be submitting for this grant on March 11, 2022. This grant is a competitive grant, if we are awarded this grant it going to allow us to consult with California State Parks and several universities that have sent us consultation letters. We are really working hard to bring home our ancestors or ceremonial items.

These expressions are useful for everyday interaction, and we're calling them dutighu dali'l = "what is often said".

Da gou rou louwi' encompasses these ideas and goals.

G&B Soil

We are expecting a delivery of soil donated to us by Garden and Bloom around the beginning of April. There will be about 4 pallets of soil, we will use some for the community garden and Tsek Houdaqh. The rest of the soil will be available for tribal member use.

There will be 3-4 different types of bagged soil (potting soil, harvest supreme, blue ribbon, planting mix or raised bed) and some fertilizers/amendments.

Happy Spring Solstice from the Natural Resources Department! Winter has officially passed, and we are looking forward to summer field work on the Eel, summertime crops, blooming flowers and sunny days. A couple updates from the month of March include, Wiyot NRD's participation in the Bear River Band's Empowering Indigenous Environments Event, fieldwork plans, and the continuation of the Ichthyoplankton sampling project on Humboldt Bay for Tenera Environmental.

The WNRD staff continued ichthyoplankton sampling on Humboldt Bay with Tenera Environmental. This project will assess the possible impacts to marine life in the Bay from the water intake for the proposed Nordic Aquafarm fish farm facility. The NRD has assisted Tenera with 3 full-day sampling cycles. DNA results from February's sampling showed a collection of Whitebait smelt, instead of the significant longfin smelt species. We are unsure of the significance of whitebait but will receive continuous updates from Tenera on DNA results from our sampling.

During the week of March 7th, some Wiyot Tribe community members and the NRD staff presented in multiple environmental panels for the Bear River Band's Empowering Indigenous Environments Conference. This conference focused on empowerment, outreach and education for indigenous communities, opportunities to further education for youths and tribal to promote Wildlife management, threatened and endangered species, wetlands, fisheries management, traditional ecological knowledge, education/outreach and more. The conference had a mix of representatives from local, state, federal, and tribal organizations discussing environmental work that they've completed and how traditional ecological tribal knowledge can (and should) intertwine with modern wildlife and environmental techniques for conservation and environmental stewardship. The 3-day conference was incredibly enlightening and inspiring, and our department was honored to be part of it.

The NRD has also begun planning the 2022 summer field season for the continuation of our Sacramento Pikeminnow suppression PCSRF project. NRD fisheries biologist Bill Matusubu has been coordinating with Sam Rizza and Abel Brumo of Still Water Sciences to discuss equipment purchases, schedules and field work plans for this project. For the past three summers the NRD has conducted Pikeminnow abundance and distribution surveys and population suppression and removal methods on the South Fork Eel River to control the population of Sacramento Pikeminnow. We will continue efforts this year as well as adding additional tagging measures and removal methods. This project will eventually evolve into a permanent monitoring of invasive species population numbers on the Eel and how to best support the native salmonid population. We are excited to continue this pioneering project.




Figure 2: NRD Fisheries Biologist Bill Matusubu giving a fisheries presentation on the significance of Pacific Lamprey



WIYOT TRIBE **EMERGENCY RENTAL ASSISTANCE** **PROGRAM**

We are proud to announce our own Emergency Rental Assistance program to assist Wiyot households during this pandemic.

This program is to alleviate the costs of rent and utilities if not explicitly a part of your rental agreement, including energy, water, garbage, and home telephone-Internet (*not cellular service*). This program is for those who pay rent, not those who pay a mortgage or own their home. Due to the nature of the program and emergency if you are already evicted or homeless having prior resided in a rental property this program can support a new rental or short-term hotel stay until you find a new residence.

To ensure that we meet the needs of the most citizens, we have an annual (12 months from first award) cap of \$1,500.00 per household.

A qualified applicant must:

- Be an enrolled member of the Wiyot Tribe, Table Bluff Reservation;
- Have one or more individuals within the household who has qualified for unemployment benefits or experienced a reduction in household income, incurred significant costs, or experienced other financial hardship due, directly or indirectly, to the COVID-19 outbreak;
- Be obligated to pay rent on a residential dwelling or be already evicted/homeless; and
- the household has a household income at or below 80% of area median income (ex. as of 2021 median annual household income in Humboldt is \$62,151).

To successfully apply, the application must be completed and have attached the required documents as indicated. Documentation cannot be dated no earlier than March 13, 2020.

If you are currently renting, payments will be made directly to the landlord. Ensure that the landlord contact and mailing information is provided in the application. A landlord may also apply on behalf of the household.

This program will accept applications until the deadline of September 30, 2025, or until funds have been exhausted, whichever comes first.

We hope that this program brings our Citizens some relief during this pandemic. We stand with you.
