WIYOT MOUL ASSOCIATION IS CURRENTLY ACCEPTING APPLICATION FOR OWNERSHIP OF A THREE BEDROOM TWO BATH SINGLE-FAMILY HOME

The WIYOT MOUL (HOUSING) Association is currently accepting applications to own a three-bedroom two bath home on the Reservation. To be considered all applications and income verification must be POSTMARKED no later than December 15, 2022 or delivered to the Tribal office by 4 pm on December 15, 2022.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE? An applicant must meet all of the following requirements at the time of application, be an enrolled member of the Wiyot Tribe; be at least 18 years of age or over as of the date of application for assignment; be without an assignment of Tribal land or similar land use right from this or any Indian tribe; provided, that an undivided ownership interest in a trust allotment obtained through inheritance shall not affect eligibility under this criteria; not have had a previous assignment canceled for cause within one year from the date of application. [Ord. 5-91 Art. VII, approved 3/11/91.]

WHO CAN BENEFIT? With certain limited exceptions, funds may be used to benefit only Indian families whose income does not exceed 80% of median income (defined to mean the greater of the median income for the Indian area, as determined by the Secretary of HUD, or the median income of the United States). The right of tribes to give preference to their own members in providing housing assistance is expressly recognized in NAHASDA.

* The FY 2014 Consolidated Appropriations Act changed the definition of extremely low-income to be the greater of 30/50ths (60 percent) of the Section 8 very low-income limit or the poverty guideline as [established by the Department of Health and Human Services \(HHS\)](#), provided that this amount is not greater than the Section 8 50% very low-income limit. Consequently, the extremely low income limits may equal the very low (50%) income limits.

The chosen application will require background checks for all adult household members to screen out state registered lifetime sex offenders this has been a requirement by statutory law since June 25, 2001. This requirement was announced in HUD Notice 02-22, released on October 29, 2002. HUD Notice H 2012-11, issued by HUD on June 11, 2012, re-confirmed that applicants subject to a lifetime state sex offender registration requirement cannot be admitted to federal housing programs. It also requires immediate eviction of tenants who were admitted in error (i.e., management did not identify that they were on offender registries, beginning June 25, 2001). Once selected the applicant will be required to complete homeowner training.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE HOMEOWNER: The homeowner shall be responsible for all maintenance of the home, including all repairs and replacements (including normal wear and tear those necessitated by damage from any cause). If outside workman or contractors are needed to make necessary repairs, it shall be the responsibility of the homeowner to obtain their services. Adequate homeowners' insurance (fire and property damage) will be carried at the homeowner's own expense and the homeowner shall provide to the TRIBE a certification of said insurance prior to taking possession of the new home. A separate statement acknowledging the requirement for homeowners' insurance shall be signed by the homeowner.


PENALTIES FOR HOMEOWNER VIOLATIONS: Penalties for violation of the agreement shall include Repayment by the Homeowner of the cost to build the home. If violation occurs within 0 to 10 years of initial occupancy, the full amount of the grant must be repaid. If violation occurs within 11 to 20 years of initial occupancy, 90% of the original amount must be repaid. After 20 years of initial occupancy, no repayment.

Cancellation of the Homeowners tribal assignment, which, subject to Sect. 5.2 of the Assignment Ordinance, could result in forfeiture of the home constructed thereon for reassignment to another eligible grantee. Imposition of punitive actions by the Tribal Council, such as withdrawal of eligibility to participate in tribal programs and privileges.

HOW WILL THE APPLICATIONS BE SELECTED? The MOUL Association will review applications submitted by the deadline that are complete all questions answered, and income verification documents are attached. Applicants that meet the eligibility/beneficiary requirements will be numbered. A lottery will be conducted, and the winning number will receive notification to complete the screenings required to move forward. Once the home is awarded, the new homeowner will be required to move in within 30 days.

Please remember to complete **ALL** questions and do not leave any areas blank. It is **CRITICAL** that all income verification documents are completed and submitted along with the application for all citizens 18 years of age or older. Incomplete applications will not be processed.

Furthermore, all applications and income verification must be **POSTMARKED** no later than December 15, 2022 or submitted in person at the Tribal Office before close of business at 4:00 P.M. on Thursday December 15, 2022.

Happy Fall from the WNRD!!! (Wiyot Natural Resources Department)

Once again, we are grateful to find ourselves at that special time of year, when the salmon are waiting to make their sacred run up the Wiya’t (Eel River) and other watersheds within Wiyot Ancestral Territory. We can only hope for a wet winter season and continue to stay informed and push for a swift removal of the Eel River dams and decommissioning of the Potter Valley Project. The WNRD Fisheries crew under the helm of Dr. Bill Matsubu has been taking huge strides in their efforts to improve conditions in the Eel by having big successes in removing invasive Sacramento pikeminnow, which prey on juvenile salmon and lamprey. The fisheries crew is also collaborating with the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) to expand fisheries stewardship in the Hikshar’i (Elk River) watershed and beyond.

The WNRD has been out and inventorying the amazing and diverse forest, shrublands, and wetlands at Mouralherwaqh, near King Salmon (see aerial photo and map). This recent Tribal acquisition and rematriation represents the first forestlands to be returned to the Wiyot and is dominated by the culturally important dap, or Sitka spruce (*Picea sitchensis*), also representing one of the southernmost populations of the species on the West Coast. This property was acquired thru Ocean Protection Council (OPC) Prop 1 Environmental Justice grant funding as a result of a successful proposal between the WNRD and Cal Poly Humboldt, forged by the Department’s relationship with the Sea Level Rise (SLR) Institute (SLRI). The property has 14 acres of coastal freshwater wetlands, now dominated by cattails and sedges, but Wiyot traditional ecological knowledge (TEK) notes the wetlands once hosted more open water and were a haven for important subsistence waterfowl. Sedimentation and potential impacts from adjacent residential development may have promoted vegetation of the wetlands, which are predicted to inundated partially by even 0.5 meters of SLR and almost completely inundated by 2 meters of SLR. By 2100 this could be bayfront property! Not to fear, Mouralherwaqh has both lowland wetland and upland habitat, within two long gradually ascending draws, the western which also hosts a seasonal spring and run in the wet months. This variation in topography and elevation, along with the Wiyot conservation ethic, makes Mouralherwaqh an important habitat refuge which will allow for species migration during SLR and act as a nature-based solution to climate change. The WNRD, along with project partners, are beginning eco-cultural restoration planning for the property, which will focus on Tribal citizen input and include a community engagement plan with opportunities for folks to get out on the land and connect with our more-than-human relatives and each other. To assist with the stewardship of Mouralherwaqh, the WNRD have hired the Tribe’s first Forest Resources Specialist, Zachary Erickson, who studied perspectives in Wiyot co-management at the Goukdi’n (Jacoby Creek) Forest, an important Wiyot watershed that is part of Cal Poly Humboldt. We are excited to bring Zach’s expertise in forestry to the WNRD. The WNRD plan to keep Tribal citizens informed about opportunities to engage in the planning for Mouralherwaqh as well as opportunities to get out into the woods and see the magic for yourself. Please check out upcoming newsletters, the Wiyot Tribal website, and the WNRD Facebook and Instagram for updates about future planning meetings, field trips, and volunteer restoration days. Make sure to get outside and

enjoy the change in the seasons and give thanks as we celebrate the return of Wiyot stewardship to Mouralherwaqh! Remember to check out and participate in the WNRD Community Advisory Committee (CAC) meetings, which are held the first Tuesday of the month on zoom, and for information about how to be involved in Mouralherwaqh or other WNRD projects contact the WNRD Director, Adam Canter at adam@wiyat.us. Shawir Darrudaluduk “We Belong to the Wilderness”

Wiya’t gou’daw houdagu’n (Eel River Pacific Lamprey Stewardship)

The Wiyot Natural Resources Department (WNRD) is excited to announce that we will be restarting the *Eel River Lamprey Research and Monitoring Plan* in 2023. No other systematic Pacific lamprey research and monitoring currently occurs in the Eel River basin, and status and trend data for lamprey populations in California are virtually non-existent. This monitoring Plan was initially developed as part of the Wiyot Tribe's FY2013 Tribal Wildlife Grant. Unfortunately, due to the loss of staff and the Covid-19 pandemic, this program stopped. To continue this project, the WNRD applied for and was allocated \$200,000 from the competitive Tribal Wildlife Grant from the United States Fish and Wildlife Service.

The decline of Pacific lamprey populations from historical levels has degraded the ecological balance of the river. The Pacific lamprey is regarded as an important indicator of ecosystem health by Native American Tribes that depend on them and biologists. In addition to the near disappearance of an extremely important food source, the decline of Pacific lamprey has likely led to the disruption of natural predator-prey systems and imbalances of nutrient cycles and other ecosystem functions. For example, adult lampreys are preyed upon by numerous fish, birds, and aquatic mammals. Seals, sea lions, ospreys, blue herons, river otters, and bald eagles have all been observed feeding on adult Pacific lampreys in the Eel River and Humboldt Bay. Migrating Pacific lamprey are a critical source of marine-derived nutrients that act to increase the productivity of otherwise nutrient poor stream ecosystems. Implementation of the *Monitoring Plan* is a natural continuation of the Tribe's previously successful lamprey projects and is critical to the conservation and recovery of the species. The primary goal of this monitoring program is to monitor trends in abundance and distribution of the Pacific lamprey population within the lower Eel River basin study area. A secondary goal is to improve understanding of the basic biology, life history, and habitat availability of the species to better understand factors limiting the abundance and distribution of each life stage. Since there is no other monitoring of this important species in the massive Eel River watershed, or throughout much of its range, achieving these goals will help the WNRD more effectively manage, conserve, and restore this important species.

This monitoring plan will be looking at all ages of lamprey that occur in the Eel River. The adults will be observed and counted at the mouth of the river during their upstream migration and during spawning surveys to count and locate areas of successful reproduction. The younger lamprey will be counted upstream where they can live for years prior to swimming into the ocean. To conduct this work, the WNRD will be hiring a Tribal Youth Intern and a fisheries Technician. Feel free to direct any questions to




Figure 1. Project study area in relation to Wiyot Ancestral Territory and Eel River sub basins.

"That the Wiyot People have never given up our rights to fishing, hunting, gathering, and practicing our ceremonies in our ancestral territory. We have been practicing these since time and memorial That we should always know this and never let any government official tell us that we did."

The Cultural department Continues to work with our local Tribal THPOS, Local cities, and Federal and County Governments on consultation projects, Section 106, Native Americans: California Environmental Quality Act (AB52), California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), and timber harvest plans (THP).

This department is continuously working on removing the Potter Valley Dam. The Cape Horn dam power station is not producing any electricity due to one of its transformers still not operating. Potter Valley Project is a small hydropower project in the headwaters of the Wiy'ot (Eel River). Which is in the Eel River headwaters and diverts water from the watershed into the Russian River. It consists of two dams, a mile-long diversion tunnel, and a powerhouse with a 9.4 MW capacity. Removing this project is the first step to fisheries recovery on the Eel River.

But they still want to take our water and send it to the Russian River. These dams are killing our sacred Eel River, causing our salmon to either get sick or die. Our Eel (Wiy'ot) river needs to restore its water to return to health for our salmon, eels, and every other creature that relies on its waterways. This department is still reaching out to the membership. If you have any old photos, stories, or articles of your families fishing on the Eel around early 1900 before the Dams went up, you would like to share them with this department. We are putting together evidence that shows we never gave up our rights to our rivers to any government or landowners.

Our Eel River was once the most significant fishery in the United States. It supplied salmon all over the country. Our salmon was sold in expensive restaurants in 1900. The Wiyot people knew how to take care of this mighty river. They would never overtake. They would only take what was needed to keep their villages fed.

The department heard stories about how this river had so much salmon. The stories of how the banks were full of anglers waiting for the salmon to make their run. Not

just was the bank full, but so was the river with boats. Our elders and ancestors could walk on their backs to get to the other side of the river. Everyone hoped that their lines would not get tangled with each other in the currents.



Our department continues to assist local agencies, schools, and organizations with the Traditional Land Acknowledgement language. When they bring it to us for review before they post it in their facilities. We are incredibly excited that communities in Wiyot ancestral territory recognize that they live and work on Wiyot land. The goal of our department is to have Wiyot Language all over Wiyot ancestral Territory.

Our culture is a living spirit that must continue to thrive. Our generation must continue with the traditional ways and stories from our elders and ancestor



Dishgamu Humboldt Community Land Trust

Our work as a land trust continues to develop. We are focusing on Land Back, exploring several affordable housing projects, and capacity building. Our projects to develop affordable housing are all currently in one of two phases: the acquisition phase or the pre-development phase.

Acquisition phase means we are looking to get land back to the Tribe that is appropriate to build or re-develop into affordable housing, either by purchasing it or by land back donations from private individuals, organizations, or other governments. We are in pre-negotiations with several properties at the moment, from inner city existing buildings to empty lots. In this phase we conduct property searches and site visits, environmental studies, and title reports to determine who holds legal title to that piece of land. We also assess the fair market value of the property and conduct feasibility studies to make sure the project “pencils out.” This includes concept designs and seeking financing and grants.

The pre-development phase is when we are doing surveys and studies to find out what the existing condition of the land is— environmental studies, to-scale drawings of existing buildings, topographic surveys and plot plans, utilities surveys etc. We also work with engineering and architectural consultants to create design and plans for the remodel or new construction. This work also includes making sure the plans are to code and securing all the required permits and to pass the required environmental reviews.

The financing and budgeting, what is called a “pro forma”, are also part of this work – how do we pay for it all? Grants, tax credits, philanthropic money, investors, and standard loans are all in our toolbelt to build a “capital stack”, a portfolio of different money sources flowing into the project.

In short, pre-development is everything to get a project “shovel ready”, to start construction. This process can take many years for a new multifamily housing building. If the project is a fairly simple remodel of an existing building it might be done over 3-4 months. Once we are done with pre-development we get to the actual development phase, the construction and/or rehabilitation of the buildings. None of our projects are there (yet).

Our work to acquire properties for natural resource and cultural restoration and conservation is also progressing, with a few projects in the early acquisition stage. As these projects develop, we will be able to share more with you. In the meantime, rest assured that the staff of the Dishgamu Humboldt Community Land Trust Department are hard at work preparing to return ancestral land to tribal stewardship.

We are also hiring and engaging more staff and contractors: project managers, outreach workers, and tribal artists. We are hoping that by the time you read this we have our newest project manager employed and that the ad for the next Project Manager position is on the tribal homepage. 
