Wiyot Tribe receives Homekey Grant

California Governor Gavin Newsom announced \$47 Million in Homeless Housing Funding to California tribal nations to support their efforts to prevent and end homelessness. The Wiyot Tribe will receive more than \$14 million to purchase, convert and operate an office building and two single-family Victorian-style homes into 39 interim and permanent units serving homeless youth and one manager unit, to create the Jaroujiji Youth Housing Project in Eureka.

The grant will create 39 units of housing for Youth who are experiencing homelessness or at risk of homelessness. "This Youth Center is a true blessing. It will help to keep Wiyot youth and homeless youth protected from addictions and dangerous environments that might try to attack them from the outside world. It is our responsibility to keep our children safe," said Ted Hernandez, Tribal Chairman.

The Tribe is acquiring two properties in north Eureka, with one office building and two Victorian-style single-family homes and rehabilitating them to be suitable for youth housing and to house supportive services for residents of the Jaroujiji Youth Housing Project. The grant has three phases; acquisition of two buildings, renovation and rehabilitation of the buildings to create 39 interim and permanent housing units and supportive services to offer the residents of the project. These properties will be restricted to use as homeless youth housing for 55 years. Creating a transitional youth program that will serve youth for at least the next half century. This grant was developed through the Tribe's Dishgamu Humboldt Community Land Trust. Dishgamu (dish-gah-muh) Humboldt Community Land Trust is an Indigenous led land trust organized under the Wiyot Tribe. Through land return, Dishgamu seeks to return public and private land within the unceded ancestral territory to the Wiyot Tribe.

David Cobb, Advancement Manager of the Dishgamu Community Land Trust commented, "Our name, 'Dishgamu', means Love in Soulatluk (Wiyot language), and this work seeks to invest love and caring into our community of which Jaroujiji (Eureka) sits in the center," Trust. "Housing prices continue to soar, young people just starting off in life are struggling, our work and this project are about stabilizing housing, and providing care and support so that youth in our community have a healthy safety net and a place to grow, heal and develop," said Michelle Vassel Tribal Administrator.

Morgan March, Director of Dishgamu stated, "We have worked very closely with the State to land this grant, and their ambassadors have been very helpful and supportive through the whole process. We hope to build a more stable local housing market and helping those who are the most vulnerable is one part of our strategy. Young folks are the future, and if we can support them towards stability, we feel like we have succeeded."

Dishgamu also seeks to prioritize Wiyot people in affordable housing to allow Wiyot people to remain in and protect their homelands and Environmentally, Culturally, and Ceremonially restore land, take action against climate change and continue to be stewards of their own land/ancestral territory by utilizing deep green building practices and restoration of green spaces. We aim to develop and train local people through our projects to produce living wage jobs in our area and to bring best practices in construction, energy production, building materials, and housing design to Humboldt County.

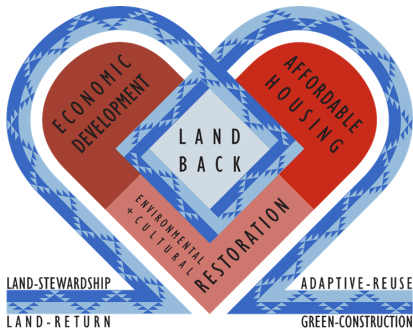

You might recognize this graphic from a few months ago. It shows the different workstreams Dishgamu employs to fulfill our four main missions:

Land Back, Developing affordable housing, Holding land for Environmental and Cultural Restoration, and 4. Regenerative economic development. The way we do that is through Land Stewardship, Land Return, Adoptive Reuse and Green Construction. We would like to give you an update on where we are at with these four different workstreams.

LAND RETURN:

We build solidarity and heal trauma by facilitating land returns to the Wiyot Tribe from individuals, governments, and organizations.

In this category we are happy to say we have gotten two private properties returned to the Tribe as Land Back donations. They are both restricted for natural conservation, and for cultural use. We are still in conversation and negotiation with several different property owners for more land return. We will reach out for future volunteer opportunities to do cleanups and site walks.

LAND STEWARDSHIP:

We support Wiyot stewardship by establishing easements that give the tribe

exclusive rights to steward lands for conservation, cultural, and educational uses in perpetuity.

We are currently in discussion with several property owners to establish access to Cultural and natural easements, but none of them have yet landed.

ADAPTIVE REUSE:

We show love for place by rehabilitating vacant or underutilized buildings into affordable housing and community serving uses.

You might have heard that we got granted \$14 million for a Homekey project from the California Department of Housing and Community Development. Homekey is a project that pays for homeless housing, and the Tribe are underway to purchase 2 buildings in northern Eureka to house 39 homeless youth. We are deep in the planning for the rehabbing of the properties we are purchasing for the Homekey project and will tell you more once the properties are officially ours. We are very excited about these buildings and can't wait to share these gems with you!

GREEN CONSTRUCTION:

We incubate a Wiyot-led regenerative economy by using local labor to build mixed-use multifamily housing on urban infill sites using deep green construction practices.

We have also been awarded a \$300 thousand Transformative Climate Communities planning grant from the California Strategic Growth

Council to do predevelopment planning for new green, infill affordable housing construction in McKinleyville. We are looking at making midrise mixed-use development in a walkable neighborhood. This means we will have commercial space on the ground floor, and then several floors of housing on top, all densely built with green space surrounding it. This grant will help us do some of the planning for a development that is several years down the line. We will share more as we move forward. If you or someone you know want to work with this kind of development, please reach out to us, since we are about to recruit for a Project Management position.

Our program is now open to all children who are:

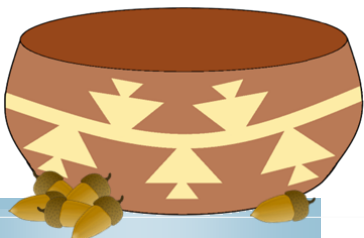
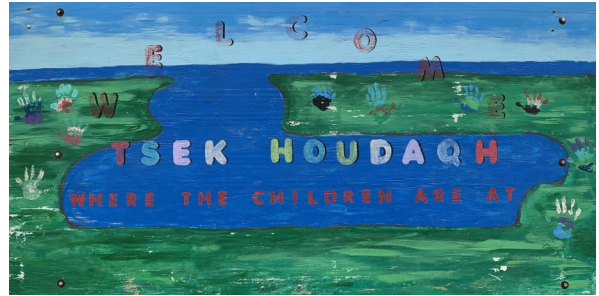
- 3-12 years of age and potty trained,

Summary of Lamprey Summit V & Information Exchange

The Pacific Lamprey Conservation Initiative (PLCI) held the fifth Lamprey Summit in Portland in mid-December. Some background first, PLCI was formed in 2008 by various partners working towards long term conservation of Pacific lamprey and their habitats, and to support traditional uses by tribes. This effort was spearheaded by Columbia River basin tribes and government agencies. There are three components PLCI is built upon: the Pacific lamprey assessment, a conservation agreement, and regional implementation plans.

What stood out the most to me was once again a gap for the North Coast, and California in general. As said in the previous newsletter Zack and I submitted last month on ocean acidification, the North Coast is lacking conservation actions compared to Oregon and Washington. That does not diminish the major ecological and cultural importance of this species. The Columbia River Inter-Tribal Fish Commission (CRITFC), Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife, and the Cow Creek Umpqua Tribe are paving the way for lamprey conservation and education in various forms. CRITFC has been conducting a translocation program where individuals are extracted from the lower basin and transported above dams into the Snake River. Both states have been imple-

menting passage for lamprey that have historically been barriers. Both states have also been conducting educational programs such as fish trading cards, informational pamphlets and lamprey identification.

I want to highlight one of the speakers for California, Keith Parker, fish biologist with the Yurok tribe and of Yurok, Hupa, Karuk and Tolowa descent. Keith used his fifteen minutes of speaking to emphasize the importance and necessity to bridge the gap between western science and traditional ecological knowledge. Keith identified the genetically distinct Klamath River lamprey and coined the ocean and river-maturing ecotypes with Yurok language. *Tewol* is the Yurok word for the ocean and *key'ween* is the Yurok word for Pacific lamprey and is used for the river-maturing ecotype.

Wiyot lands are located within the California North Coast regional management unit and have listed lamprey populations as "imperiled" in the region. The WNRD is excited to bring back the lamprey monitoring program in the lower Eel River. This work can contribute to bridging that data gap, and hopefully bring more awareness and appreciation to these swimming sticks of butter. Tribal Citizen Services

HHS Department offers a variety of services to Wiyot Citizens:

1. Burial Assistance up to \$500.00 (Tribal Citizens)
2. Hunting/ Fishing license reimbursement (one per Wiyot household or for an Wiyot Elder, every 12 months)
3. RSTF loan up to \$200.00 (Tribal Citizens, one every 12 months)
4. Large garbage dump reimbursement (outside Table Bluff Reservation Tribal Citizens, once every 12 months)
5. Chimney Cleaning reimbursement (one per Wiyot household every 12 months)
6. Elders/Disabled wood: Elders/disabled Citizens get one cord per year from Men's Camp

Earth Quake Assistance

CalWORKs-eligible households

There are some non-recurring CalWORKs special needs that you may be eligible for including:

- Payments to replace some lost household items
- Interim assistance for those who are temporarily unable to return to their home
- Up to \$600 for interim assistance and special needs is available
- Homeless assistance is also available for those who became homeless as a result of the earthquake. If families have used the yearly Temporary Homeless Assistance or Permanent Homeless Assistance they are eligible to an exception if they became homeless due to the earthquake.

CalFresh-eligible households

- CalFresh recipients who lost food due to the power outage or earthquake can request replacement benefits.

Current CalFresh recipients can request replacement benefits by completing the [Replacement or Disaster Supplement Affidavit \(CF 303\)](#).

- When completing the form, include the date of the loss and the reason. A dollar amount of the loss can also be listed on the form but is not required.
