Ha'wa'lou from the Wiyot Natural Resources Department (WNRD)! In Wiyot Country winters can be rough, windy, and wet, yet also mild, and with March upon us, the spring equinox is around the corner, and we recognize this as the season of the World Renewal Ceremony, where the wind and rain blast our imperfections away and with hope we emerge pressure-washed for the important spring work ahead. The wisdom and indigenous knowledge of the Wiyot and other indigenous peoples is finally being recognized across the globe as world views that show reciprocity and respect for our natural relatives. Through the practices and legacy of environmental stewardship we work to ensure that our subsistence traditions, cultural places, and landscapes remain resilient for seven generations into the future. A huge part of building relationships and love toward nature is immersing oneself in nature. This summer the WNRD plans to work with Tsek houdaqh to help lead field trips with Tribal youth to important Wiyot places and provide opportunities to get out to the recently reclaimed Mouralherwaqh forest at King Salmon. We will also be hiring a Wiyot summer youth intern, so keep updated on upcoming job openings. In addition to our regular duties monitoring water quality and environmental issues of concern around Wiyot territory, the WNRD recently received funding from Duck's Unlimited through the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) to help jump start a native plant nursery at Table Bluff, which will expand our abilities to restore culturally important plant communities while also hopefully prospering into an economic opportunity for the Tribe. Be on the lookout for an upcoming part-time nursery manager position opening up in the WNRD.

Additional upcoming opportunities for citizen engagement include participation in the Tribal Marine MPA Collaborative which will be held at TBR on February 24, from 10a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and the Mouralherwaqh eco-cultural restoration planning meeting at TBR on Friday March 3rd from 9a.m. to Noon, with bountiful refreshments, coffee, and tea provided. Please join us for a visionary gathering. March is the month for a handful of opportunities that the Wiyot and TBR are leading the way to contribute directly to program development and funding needs requests around coastal stewardship, such as with the call our from the Wiyot Tribe and the California Natural Resources Agency (CNRA) who would like to cordially invite California Native American tribal leaders, representatives, and staff to participate in the Tribal Nature-Based Solutions Northern California Workshop at TBR on March 23rd from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. In this workshop, participants will review the draft grant guidelines and associated materials for the \$70 million Tribal Nature-Based Solutions program. The goal of this workshop is to connect with tribal leaders and representatives on how to best shape this new program to support California Native American tribes' multi-benefit nature-based solutions projects. To continue the momentum from these important collaborative gatherings at TBR is the Cal Poly Humboldt Northern California Land Back Conference, which will take place on campus Marth 24th, with guest panelist and WNRD Director Adam Canter participating in a special panel about the Wiyot's experiences using state grant funds to purchase a Tribal Cultural Property on the open real estate market in 2022, which lead to the reclaiming of the sacred Wiyot place of Mouralherwaqh. <https://newsfromnativecalifornia.com/event/save-the-date-northern-california-land-back-conference/>

Adam will also be giving a talk for the California Native Plant Society on March 8, Wednesday. 7:30 pm. Entitled “Indigenous Land Return and Stewardship”. Wiyot and other indigenous peoples' efforts to reclaim ancestral lands and habitats can result in the preservation of both eco-cultural traditions and botanical diversity. Adam Canter, Natural Resource Director for the Wiyot Tribe, will discuss Wiyot ethnobotany, plant uses, and the decline of coastal prairie and scrub habitat in the absence of cultural fire and the expansion of settler-colonial development around the Wigi (Humboldt Bay), the lower Wiya't (Eel River), and the lower Baduawa't (Mad River). *View on Zoom* (<https://cnps-org.zoom.us/meeting/register/tZErceioqTguE9ZkodLKWhVSUTKBjCSLltv1>) or gather in person at Six Rivers Masonic Lodge, *251 Bayside Rd.* (<https://goo.gl/maps/a9wpj1czFfK46oUDA>), Arcata. 


Figure 2. Tsakiyuwit (Bear River Ridge) with storm blowing in during one of our January atmospheric river events, looking out to the Wiya't mouth and estuary. A. Canter

This month we were sad to see the departure of our prestigious Fisheries Biologist Dr. Bill Matsubu, who will be continuing the good mission at his new position as Director with the Blue Lake Rancheria Environmental Department. Bill helped to expand invasive predatory Sacramento pikeminnow removal methods on the South Fork Eel by promoting the weir study below Indian Creek, as well as his efforts to expand work into to the Van Duzen and lower Eel mainstem. Bill also helped rekindle the Tribe's lamprey conservation work thru a new Tribal Wildlife Grant (TWG) as well as getting a Good Neighbor Agreement ratified with the Tribe and the BLM to do a variety of needed restoration and monitoring tasks on BLM lands like the Headwaters and upper Elk River as well as Elkhorn Ridge on the SF Eel. We will miss Bill, but his short yearlong legacy with the WNRD will continue onward to further the stewardship role of the Wiyot while providing career building work opportunities to Tribal citizens on the natural resources track.

An exciting season of field work and monitoring lays ahead for the WNRD. Please stay tuned to the WNRD Community Advisory Committee (CAC) meetings to stay abreast of recent project happenings and opportunities to be involved with contributing to Wiyot lead conservation efforts. Always the first Tuesday of each month from 5:30p.m. to 7 p.m. with special guests planned each month as well in person meetings hopeful for the spring and summer seasons. The Eel River Forum reconvened after a 3-year hiatus. About 80 people attended the Forum at the Fortuna River Lodge. CalTrout introduced the Eel River Conservation and Restoration Program. This plan is supposed to cover the entire basin and should be “broadly supported, implementable, and underpinned by physical and biological processes.” Their vision statement reads “A restored Eel River watershed that supports resilient and diverse habitats from headwaters to sea, self-sustaining and harvestable native fish, and healthy local communities.”

The Forum was a time to get together to talk about phase 1, discuss program goals, and move forward from there. The Eel River watershed has a way of being connected by its people. Approaching a basin-wide restoration plan requires those people to come together and collaborate. Bringing the Eel River Forum back has the goal of doing just that.

Mouralherwaqh Updates

Mouralherwaqh continues to serve as a place for Cal Poly Humboldt students to help restore and connect to Wiyot Tribe ancestral lands. A class of 20 students, joined by Daniel “Bubba” Lippe and Allison O’Dowd, spent a sunny afternoon learning about the property and releasing large du’k (Sitka spruce) from the invasive English ivy. This non-native species has climbed to the tops of some of these trees which can act as a sail in high winds threatening to topple these important trees. A small group focused on a patch of scotch broom closer to the road which was overtopping a small patch of vou’gul (evergreen huckleberry).

The WNRD will help facilitate the day’s activities and will identify areas of priority. We anticipate that this will include the pulling of invasive English ivy, scotch broom, and pampas grass.

As we mentioned in last month's newsletter, Lynnika, Nina, and Marnie have begun developing a Soulatluk classroom curriculum which we are using for weekly Soulatluk lessons with Wiyot youth at Tsek Houdaqh. Our first five lessons have focused on words for people (person, man, woman, child, baby, elder); asking and answering yes/no questions, "where?" questions, and "what is it called?" / "it's called ____"; regular pronunciation practice; and everyday greetings and useful phrases. Hou' to the youth who work so hard every week to learn Soulatluk!






