State tax exemption

Did you know that if you are an enrolled Tribal member, you live in Indian Country (reservation or allotment land) and you earn reservation source income (work for a tribe) you may be exempt from State taxes? Also, if you are an Active-duty Military, an enrolled citizen of a federally recognized tribe, stationed in California and you have orders to live outside Indian Country, or you are receiving a military pension, you reside on your Tribe's reservation, you may be exempt from State Taxes.

You need to pay tax if you Earned or received income outside of Indian country or California earned or received reservation sourced income but you live outside Indian country within California Live on an Indian reservation with your spouse or registered domestic partner (RDP) but you are not a member of any tribe

If you think you might be eligible for state tax exemption you must fill out California Form FTB 3504, Enrolled Tribal Member Certification, is a declaration of residency in a tribe's Indian country and exemption from California tax.

Income exemption requirement

For your income to be exempt from California tax, you must meet all of the following requirements:

- You must be an enrolled member of a federally recognized California Indian tribe.
- You must live in your tribe's Indian country, which includes reservations, dependent Indian communities, and Indian trust allotments.
- You must earn or receive reservation source income from the same Indian country in which you live and are an enrolled tribal member.

Certification form benefits

Send us the certification form to declare you reside within your tribe's Indian country and you meet the tribal member income exemption requirements. Submit your certification form early in the tax year to help:

- Reduce incorrect filing enforcement notices.
- Eliminate unnecessary contacts to or from us.
- Avoid future audits.
- Certification form due date
- File the certification form for each tax year that you meet the exemption requirements.

If you have a California filing requirement because you also have off-reservation source income, attach the certification form to your tax return and follow our standard income tax return due date or extended due date for filing.

File the certification form separately if you do not otherwise have a California filing requirement. For each tax year, the certification form should be filed the following year between January 1 and October 15.

Ha'wa'lou and happy Summer Solstice month from the WNRD! As we experience the long daylight hours that this position of Mother Earth's orbit provides for us this time of year, we encourage everyone to make the most of it by getting outside to watch the brilliance of this verdant spring mature into the fabled summer. The fruitful and needed rains that this winter brought has given us a landscape of green across the coastal prairies of Table Bluff and beyond as the Indian potatoes show their colorful blooms around Wiyot Country and in the bulb boxes in front of the TBR NRD office. The WNRD continue to work on and solicit Tribal citizen input for the EPA Tribal Environmental Plan (ETEP), which is a four-year plan (2023-2027) that helps to target EPA financial assistance toward building tribal environmental program capacity to achieve the Tribe's goals. Plans identify areas where EPA may need to prioritize its work and resources for that particular tribe, given the tribe's own priorities, environmental protection needs, and available resources, to carry out EPA's federal environmental program responsibilities. The WNRD has used prior ETEPS to build the current departmental capacity to monitor and protect water quality, promote core community involvement in environmental protection work, provide environmental education to Wiyot youth, and support communication capacities to the Tribal citizenship. The comment period is currently open on the ETEP and the 2024 EPA Performance Partnership Grant (PPG) workplans and please reach out to us soon, ideally before the June 12th Tribal Council meeting, if you have comments and priorities you would like to see for the WNRD in the coming years. Working to Restore and Enhance Mouralherwaqh

Spring is in full bloom and so are the invasive Scotch broom (*Cytisus scoparius*). This invasive plant develops an incredible number of seeds and takes over areas of bare soil. At Mouralherwaq, it is one of our main focuses (see picture) for removal to create more room for culturally important plant species to the Wiyot Tribe. To address this invasive species, the WNRD is submitting a Coastal Development ground disturbance of greater than



This process includes mapping all areas that the WNRD intends to conduct restoration and enhancement activities. One of the first targets is the approximately eight-acre clear-cut located near the top (eastern edge) of the property. There is evidence that this may have been coastal prairie, due to the presence of a coastal manzanita (*Arctostaphylos columbiana*). This shrub does not thrive in dark understory conditions, indicating that this large flat was once an open area.

This CDP will incorporate all anticipated restoration and enhancement activities at Mouralherwagh. We look forward to the approval of the CDP so that work can begin this summer to begin clearing non-native vegetation to promote native and culturally important plant species at Mouralherwagh.

More weir(dness) on the SF Eel River

It's been in the works for years now, and it's finally in. There is now a seasonal weir on the South Fork of the Eel River. The main purpose of the weir is to control the abundance and spread of the non-native Sacramento pikeminnow. Objectives include stopping the upstream movement of pikeminnow into cold water refugia; trapping pikeminnow to remove them more easily from the system; and my favorite, learn.

The weir has been up and running for a month now. In mid-April, the Wiyot Tribe's Natural Resources Department's own Stacy Giraldo, Alex Juan, Zack Erickson, and myself met with project partners from California Trout, Stillwater Sciences, UC Berkeley, CDFW, and Cramer Fish Sciences to properly install the weir. As mentioned in a previous newsletter article, this weir is a resistance board weir. The weir has been designed so it does not harm native salmon, trout, lamprey, and other native fish like suckers.

If all goes well, the weir will remain in the water until the end of September this year when Chinook start migrating back to freshwater tributaries to spawn. Until then, staff are at the weir every single day checking the trap box, cleaning the weir and actively performing suppression methods nearby to prevent dense congregations of pikeminnow.

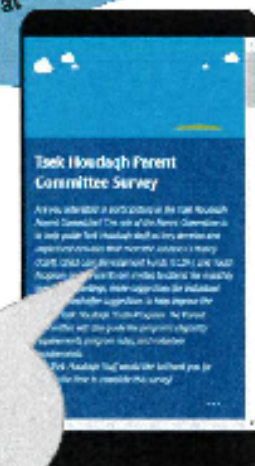

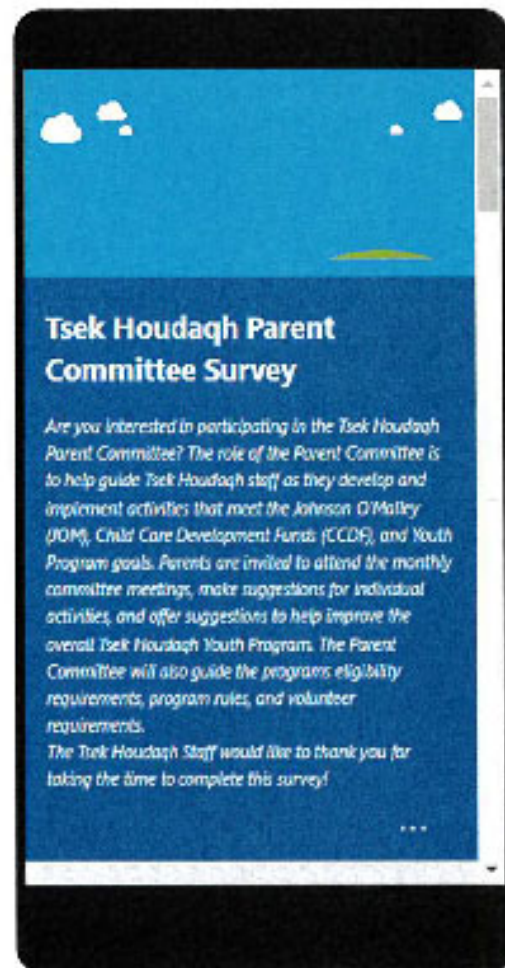

3. RSTF loan up to \$200.00 (Tribal Citizens, one every 12 months)
4. Large garbage dump reimbursement (outside Table Bluff Reservation Tribal Citizens, once every 12 months)
5. Chimney Cleaning reimbursement (one per Wiyot household every 12 months)
6. Elders/Disabled wood: Elders/disabled Citizens get one cord per year from Men's Camp

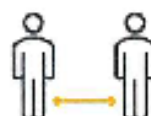

Program ends when funds are depleted. To be eligible:
