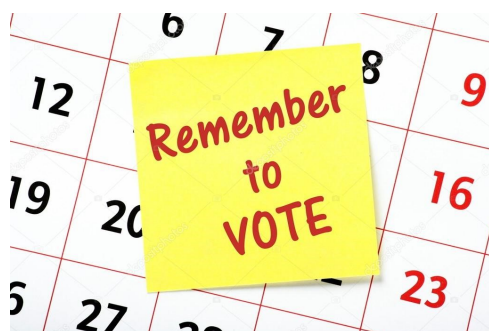

WNRD Attend NOAA Pacific Coastal Salmon Recovery Fund (PCSRF) Grantee Mtg. in Girdwood, Alaska

In September staff from the Wiyot Natural Resources Department (WNRD) attended the annual NOAA Pacific Coastal Salmon Recovery Fund (PCSRF) meeting for grantees in beautiful, wild, and majestic Girdwood, Alaska, outside of Anchorage on the Turnagain Arm of Cook Inlet. The WNRD has received PCSRF funding during the two recent grant cycles of 2020 and 2022, which established the Tribe as one of the first groups to research the predatory invasive Sacramento pikeminnow (*Ptychocheilus grandis*) in the Wiya't (Eel) River watershed and the effectiveness of different removal strategies along with looking at gut analysis and genetics. These efforts confirmed that these invasive pikeminnow prey on juvenile lamprey and salmonids, further impacting the Eel River fishery that is already greatly affected by the Potter Valley Project dams and water diversions. The recent 2022 award is for WNRD fisheries capacity building, which funded attendance to the grantee meeting and will allow the department to continue outreach, education, partnerships, and collaborations with other agencies and fisheries scientists and managers within ancestral territory, furthering salmonid conservation in the region.

Along with guidance on technical aspects of the PCSRF grant program and presentations on exemplary and suitable projects, the WNRD got to network with other Tribes from across the Pacific Northwest and Alaska, including hearing about how other Tribes have collaborated with NOAA and other agencies to address issues with salmonid species declines across the west coast. NOAA representatives were impressed with WNRD efforts on the Wiya't and seemed eager to want to fund future project proposals to promote needed salmonid conservation research and management actions in Wiyot ancestral territory. Not so FHABulous

That water sure is warming up! If you're taking yourself or your family out to the rivers, keep an eye out for freshwater harmful algal blooms, or FHABs. Algae is a natural component of the natural world. Algae are photosynthetic organisms which means they are producing their energy from the sun. Some algae are not toxic, while some algae are toxic. When they are given the right conditions (slow, stagnant, warm water) they can produce an algal bloom. Below is a helpful visual guide to identifying toxic and non-toxic algae. A quick identifier is if you pick up a chunk of algae (with a gloved hand) and roll it around with your fingertips, if it feels and looks like hair, it's probably non-toxic. If it continues to clump up as you're rolling it around, it may be toxic. Toxic algae are only harmful when ingested. It's best to be mindful of children and pets around water that may appear a little funky looking. WNRD is currently collecting water samples in the Lower Wiya't to send to a water quality laboratory for analysis. We will receive and share those results in the next newsletter.

IDENTIFYING A HARMFUL ALGAL BLOOM (HAB)

This quick guide provides a visual comparison of appearance and color and odor that can be helpful in distinguishing non-toxic green algae and aquatic plants from potentially toxic cyanobacteria blooms or harmful algal blooms (HABs).



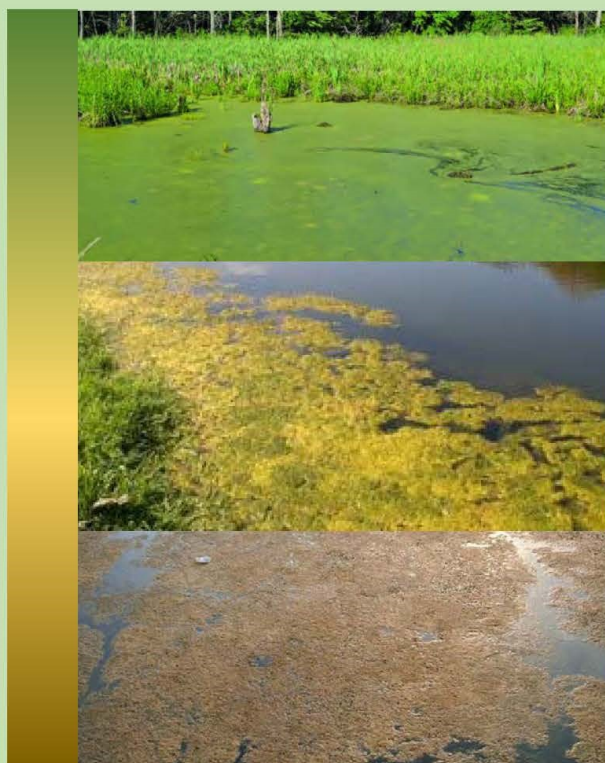

Non-toxic Algae & Plants

COLOR



Algae and aquatic plants are usually green but can appear yellow or brown as they die down.



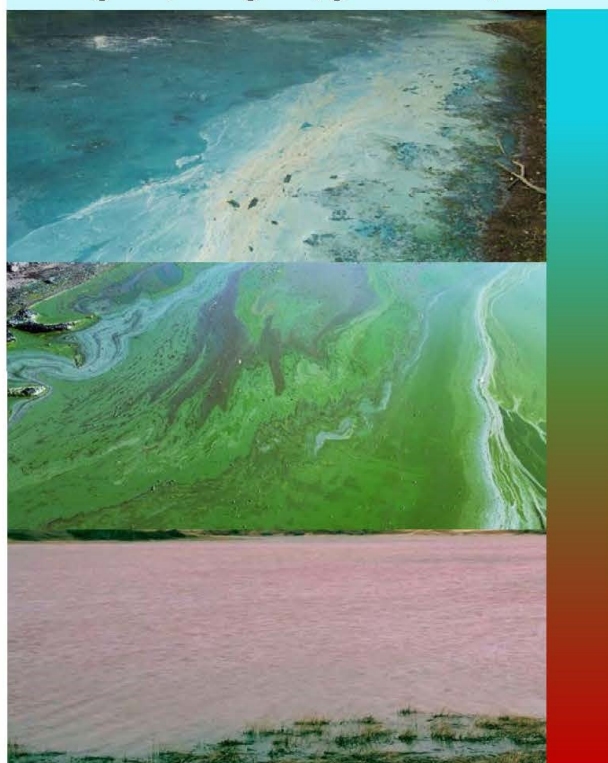
ODOR



Algae and aquatic plants are usually neutral or leafy in scent, but when dying or dead smell musty/rotting.

Cyanobacteria/HAB

Cyanobacteria get their name from their blue-green pigment but blooms can often look green, blue-green, green-brown, or red.



Cyanobacteria blooms can have a distinctive smell, sometimes described as gasoline, septic or fishy.

Restoration and Enhancement Work at the Table Bluff Ecological Reserve

We all know that Table Bluff is a unique and special place. But did you know that it is home to a federally endangered flower called the western lily (*Lilium occidentale*) (Figure 2)? This beautiful flower is an inhabitant of Table Bluff with a population located within the Table Bluff Ecological Reserve (TBER) which is found at the western edge of the bluff. Though this flower has long inhabited this place, its habitat has been degraded. The Wiyot Tribe NRD, California Department of Fish and Wildlife, and the Mattole Restoration Council (MRC) have partnered together to support the lily by enhancing its surrounding habitat.

This restoration effort will include the removal of many dap (Sitka spruce, *Picea sitchensis*) which have encroached into once open coastal prairie. Though the lily can tolerate partial shade, many areas have now become fully shaded by the encroachment of dap. As the tree branches begin to touch each other, less sun is reaching the lilies who struggle beneath the dense canopy. Three areas have been identified for the removal of trees (Figure 1). As you can imagine, this habitat is sensitive to any sort of disturbance, especially on the ground. So, you may be wondering, “How can they safely remove trees without disturbing the forest floor?”. The answer to that question is helicopters.

MRC will be utilizing their crew of fallers to remove trees identified in a preliminary inventory conducted by CDFW and WNRD. These trees, branches, and all, will be picked up and transported by a Chinook helicopter. The destination of these trees will be Table Bluff Reservation and Ocean Ranch. Trees transported to Ocean Ranch will be used to support aquatic habitat enhancement efforts. Trees taken to TBR will be placed near the wood processing area between the water treatment and leach field.

Coastal prairies have been negatively impacted by fire suppression, lack of cultural burning and prescribed fire, and overgrazing. Much of this land has been encroached or converted to non-native

grass species. This collaborative effort is focused on restoring native plant habitat through restoration activities. After the removal of large trees and the subsequent opening of the coastal prairie habitat, the project seeks to re-introduce fire to measure its effects on this species.

Prior to European contact and removal of Wiyot land management and cultural burning helped to maintain early successional habitat for the lily. The WNRD continues to support native plant species by collaborating with different groups to enhance habitat and return cultural management practices. The reduction in tree density will increase the amount of light reaching the forest floor which is anticipated to benefit the western lily directly. The project seeks to minimize negative impacts due to the tree removal by utilizing a helicopter to move every large tree from the property.

This project is set to take place in the coming months. So, when you see a helicopter overhead carrying large dap, know that a collaborative group is lending a helping hand to an endangered and special flower, the western lily.

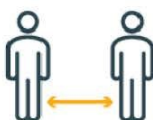

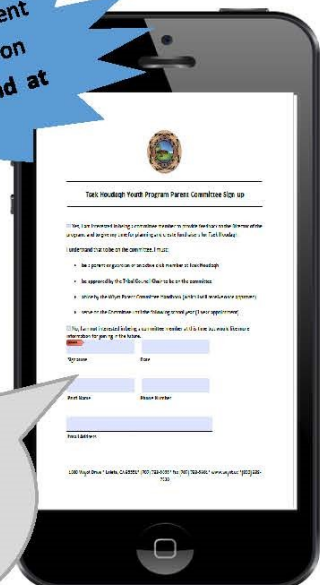
