Youth Activity Program (YAP)

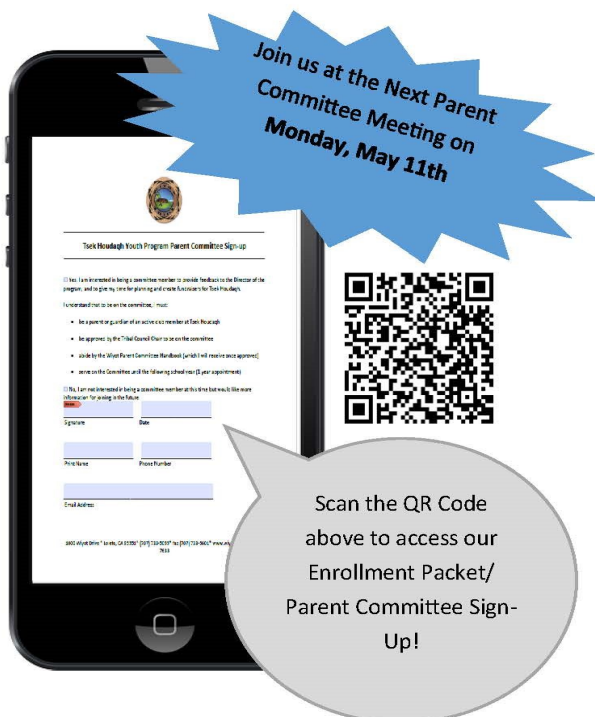
Our Youth Activity Program plans and implements fun and engaging activities for local youth during our after-school hours.

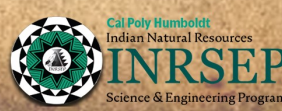

ANA SOULATLUK LESSONS AT LOLETA SCHOOL & TSEK HOUDAQH

In March, staff linguists Lynnika and Nina continued teaching twice-weekly Soulatluk classes at Loleta Elementary School as an elective for 5th-8th grade students, as part of our ANA-funded Wi Soulatlouy ("we will speak Soulatluk") curriculum development grant. Recently we have been joined by observers from College of the Redwoods, Two Feathers, and more, and our students have taught them several Soulatluk words and phrases 😊.

Here you can see some of our regular students making "bets" on whether they can accurately describe pictures the pictures being shown to them in Soulatluk (faces covered at their request):

We continue to practice introducing ourselves at the beginning of each class, and we recently added the phrase **Yil ____ da** = "I live at ____" to our self-introductions.

(**Yil Jaroujiji da.** = I live in Eureka. / **Yil Guduwalha't da.** = I live in Loleta. / **Yil Rraloughugu'w da.** = I live at Table Bluff.)



In Unit 3, we learned a lot of animal words and continued practicing the phrases "I see ____." / "What do you see?". Here are the key phrases we used in Unit 3 (visit <https://www.wiyot.us/449/Ship-Dalouy-Unit-3> for an online version with audio):

HHS Department offers a variety of services to Wiyot Citizens:

- ⇒ Burial Assistance up to \$500.00 (Tribal Citizens)
- ⇒ Hunting/ Fishing license reimbursement (one per Wiyot household or for an Wiyot Elder, every 12 months)
- ⇒ RSTF loan up to \$200.00 (Tribal Citizens, one every 12 months)
- ⇒ Large garbage dump reimbursement (outside Table Bluff Reservation Tribal Citizens, once every 12 months)
- ⇒ Chimney Cleaning reimbursement (one per Wiyot household every 12 months)
- ⇒ Elders/Disabled wood: Elders/disabled Citizens get one cord per year from Men's Camp

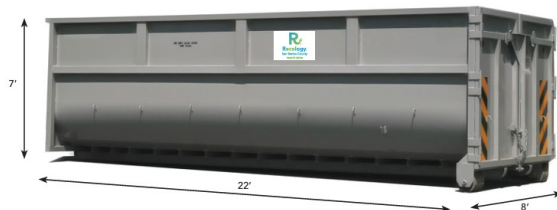
Wiyot Nursery, Staff, Plants, and WSP Members Shine and Renew at Ocean Ranch Watershed Awareness Volunteer Event (WAVE)!!!

On March 16, 2024, perhaps the most gorgeous day yet of 2024, the Wiyot Natural Resources Department (WNRD), the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW), and our California Conservation Corps (CCC) Watershed’s Stewards Program (WSP) corpsmember’s Kasie Tyler and Regine Familara successfully recruited 72 volunteers to help with establishing a Wiyot Cultural Demonstration Garden at the recently restored Ocean Ranch Unit of the Eel River Wildlife Area on Table Bluff. The garden is in a triangular shape bordered with driftwood in the spirit of a Wiyot basket design within close proximity to the parking lot and easily accessible to elders and youth and contained some of the first Wiyot cultural plants from the fledging Wiyot Native Plant Nursery to be out-planted in ancestral territory, which is under the competent helm of garden intern Mariah Buckley. Some of the Wiyot cultural plant relatives planted were used for food, basketry, regalia, or cultural items and included Coltsfoot (*Petasites palmatus*) Columbine (*Aquilegia formosa*) Giant chain fern (*Woodwardia fimbriata*) Hazelnut (*Corylus conrunuta* ssp. *californica*) One-leaf onion (*Allium unifolium*), mock orange (*Philadelphus lewesii*) monkeyflower (sticky) (*Mimulus aurantiacus*) Ninebark (*Physocarpus capitatus*) Oregon grape (*Berberis nervosa*) Pacific reedgrass (*Calamagrostis nutkaensis*), Sandberry (kinnikinnick) (*Arctostaphylos uva-ursi*), Vine tea (*Clinopodium douglasii*).

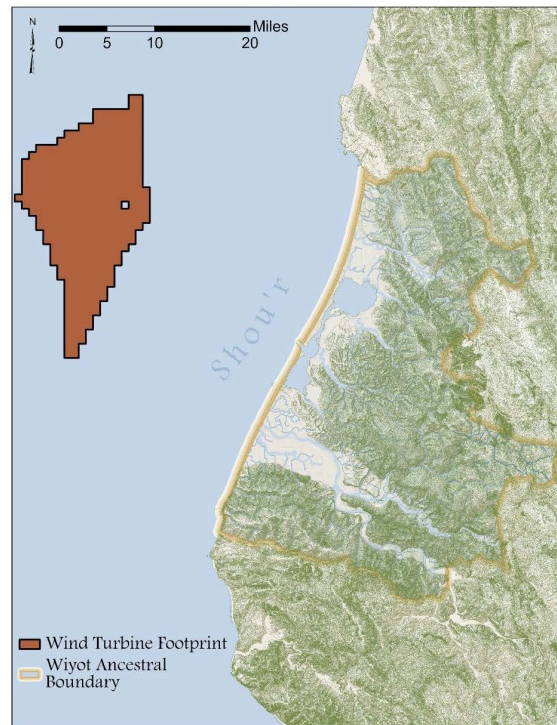

Tribal Cultural Landscape Assessment

Offshore wind (OSW) has dominated conversations in Wiyot Tribe ancestral territory and beyond. Many government agencies and private OSW companies are promising clean energy, jobs, and a way to move past the use of fossil fuels. But there are many questions that have been left unanswered, such as what impacts OSW can have on places and animals. The WNRD is working with the Wiyot Tribal Community to identify special areas of concern, so that we can convey this information (in an appropriate manner) to the Bureau of Offshore Energy (BOEM). While the conversations about OSW continue, this is an opportunity to support the potential consultation process which will occur as these projects are pushed to move forward.

OSW will not only impact the ocean with the 200 mi² footprint of hundreds of wind turbines. There will also be impacts where these turbines will be built. The proposed location for construction, called the “heavy lift terminal”, is approximately 1,500ft from Tuluwat. Furthermore, the cable that will transfer electricity from the wind turbines to the grid will also most likely be making landfall and travelling through Wiyot ancestral territory. The potential extent of these impacts is still unknown, but we do have an idea of where they will occur.

The WNRD is compiling cultural site information, culturally important plant and animal occurrence data, and locations where Tribal citizens hunt and fish to prepare the Tribal Historic Preservation Officer (THPO) for the potential upcoming formal consultation



With the help of elders, knowledge holders, hunters, and gathers, we can tell the complete story of the Wiyot connection to the land. As stated earlier, the agencies require “proof”, for example, that a location is sacred. If there are stories of ceremonies that took place there, we can point to that information and say, “this is why you cannot build here” or this is how certain impacts to an area or resource will affect Wiyot culture and subsistence.

Reciprocal Land Relationships

Reciprocal Land Relationships, an exhibit by the Wiyot Tribe, is scheduled to take place during the month of April at the Da Gou Rou Louwi' Cultural Center at 417 2nd Street in Eureka. The opening reception of the exhibit is scheduled to take place during Arts Alive on April 6th, 2024, from 6-9 pm. There will be a meet and greet with Aldaron Laird and Marnie Atkins, and the new book "A Photographic Exploration of Wigi" and the Shawir Darrudaluduk (Natural Resources department) will have an interactive table to learn about Native plans and make and take Native seed balls to grow at home or to plant in public spaces.

The exhibit will showcase Lhatsik (traditional story) the Stolen Salmon Story and teach visitors about reciprocal relationships that exist between the Wiyot people and their ancestral homelands. Guests will learn some specific traditional methods for caring for native plants that feed us. There will be two environmental restoration talks. The Shawir Darrudaluduk (Natural Resources department) will be speaking regarding the Wiyot Native Plant Nursery and traditional foods on April 6th, 2024, from 3-5 pm. Very prominent throughout the Northwest Coast, Transformer stories are stories where transformations happen in the World. They include transformations of gou'wil (people), jechach (animals), and lughurruk (land). In Soulatluk, these stories include monster-slaying adventures of tricksters and teaching of mores and folkways that are deeply rooted in place.

Indigenous people from other parts of the country have similar stories with regionally common characters like Spider, Blue jay, Raven, Coyote, Rabbit, Maui, and the Twins in Soulatluk we have

In Soulatluk we say Gouche da wulh... "Long time ago... Butterflies were used as a symbol of the metamorphosis we all experience in our own lives.



Da Rou Gawok (Everyone Working Together)

Two Spirit Day of Appreciation and Celebration March 19

County of Humboldt, City of Eureka and City of Arcata proclaimed March 19, 2024 as Two Spirit Day of Appreciation and Celebration. Becoming the first, Second and the third US government entity to proclaim Two-Spirit Day of Appreciation and Celebration. Held on the spring equinox, the holiday highlights the Two-Spirit identity, described as an umbrella term as an intersection of Indigenous and LGBTQ+ identities. These proclamations set the holiday and encourage people to learn about Two-Spirit traditions a day to celebrate our Gou'mel (both together) an umbrella term in Soulatluk used to include our Two Spirit Wiyot relatives.



Nex Benedict Vigil was held March 9th

In February an Oklahoma Native, Non-binary 16 year old, Nex Benedict, was beaten by three girls in a school bathroom. The next day Nex died. Memorials for Nex happened across the country. Nex died after a long pattern of bullying, both at school and from the Oklahoma state government who enacted hateful policies impacting the daily lives of gender diverse students across the State, empowering hate in schools.

There is a lot more to say about the circumstances leading up to and following the death of Nex, such as the way the school failed to call for an ambulance or document the hate event, and local law enforcements questionable handling of the situation, but for now we will just say this: Two Spirit, Queer people, Native people, and allies across the country are mourning this tragic, preventable, and predictable death. The Wiyot Tribe's Da Gou Rou Louwi' Cultural Center stayed open for the event and Two-Feathers NAFS provided mental health clinicians and support at the event.

Case Dismissed

The Wiyot Tribe prevailed in lawsuit filed against the City of Eureka by a special interest group, "Citizens for a Better Eureka. The group funded by Rob Arkley's business Security national, sued the City of Eureka for their parking lots to affordable housing project. Two of the sites in the parking lots to affordable housing project were awarded to the Wiyot Tribe to construct housing in downtown Eureka. The law suit, which sought to preserve parking, argued that the City of Eureka failed to follow CEQA in that it didn't adequately study the environmental impacts of loss of parking was previously rejected by the California Attorney General's Office.

The lawsuit would have directly impacted the Tribes ability to move forward on contracts, gain site control, reduced opportunity for grant funding and financing. The Tribe intervened in the lawsuit, thus the Tribe intervened arguing that the Tribe was an indispensable party in the lawsuit and that the lawsuit would have prevented the Tribe from accessing financing site control and created construction delays and that the Tribe has sovereign immunity and therefore could not be joined in the suit and so the suit should be dismissed. After oral arguments the judge needed time to make the decision. A week later the judge issued a single page order of dismissal.

The nomination document must specify the following information: Submittal date of the nomination, name of the nominee, position to which the nominee wishes to be elected, name and signature of The person making the nomination, signature of the person being nominated, background (relations, number of meetings attended, committees or boards). Nomination forms are available at the Tribal office. Official notifications of qualified nominees will be listed in the July Tribal Newsletter. Between the months of July through October, but before the elections meeting all nominees will submit at least one article to the Tribal Newsletter or participate in at least one Town Hall meeting to discuss issues they and their constituents find important to the Tribe.

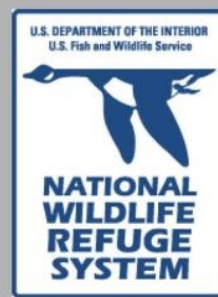
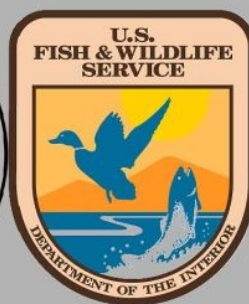
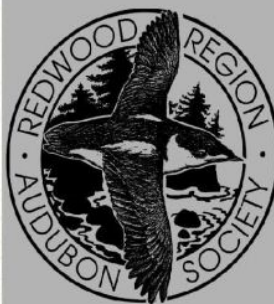
