WNRD Awarded \$470,000 from the U.S. Department of Transportation

Way back in 2023, WNRD applied to the U.S. Department of Transportation's National Culvert Removal, Replacement, and Restoration Grant Program (from hereon Culvert AOP Program) and was awarded funding. The project area is along Butte Creek, a tributary to the Little Van Duzen River which eventually feeds into the Van Duzen River. The proposal aims to design a new stream crossing structure to replace a culvert that blocks passage to four miles of climate-resilient, cold-water spawning and rearing habitat for federally threatened steelhead and Pacific lamprey.



The photo shows the culverts that are parallel to each other and made from corrugated metal. They were designed for overtopping and act as a "low water crossing" but this pair of culverts has degraded over the years, so much so that they put steelhead at risk by blocking access to prime cold-water habitat. Pacific lamprey struggle with these culverts too, because the lips of the culverts are tearing and hard angles that make it difficult for lamprey to use their mouths to attach onto. For this work to be carried out, WNRD is seeking an engineering firm for the design work. The request for proposals can be found on the Tribe's website.

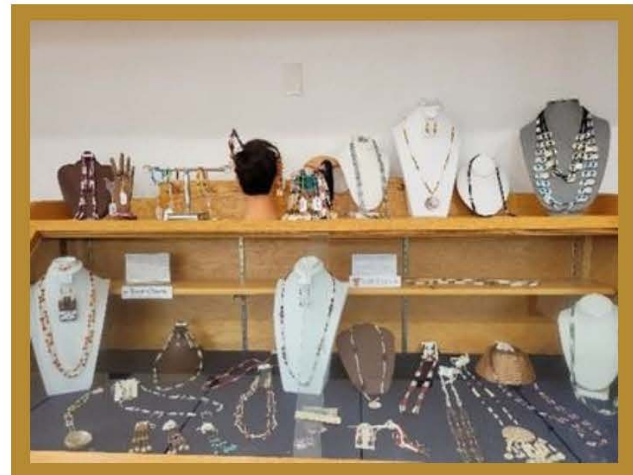

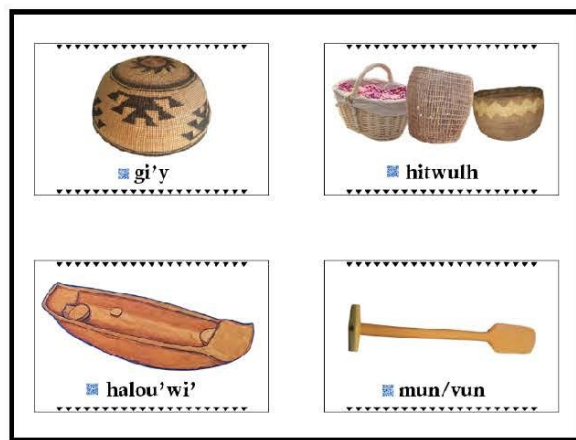

ANA SOULATLUK CURRICULUM AND LESSONS

In January, Lynnika and Nina continued Soulatluk lessons at Loleta Elementary, with the entire 5th & 6th grade class (approx. 10 students) now participating! We are progressing through Unit 5: **Shouwa da ninatou?** (*What is it called?*), in which students learn the names of cultural items such as **halou'wi'** (canoe), **gi'y** (basket cap), and **voutw/moutw** (front skirt/apron skirt), as well as some of the materials they are made from: **vadi'/madi'** (wood), **hiqh** (hide/deerskin), and **huwighurruk** (plants). We will finish this unit in early February and will post the content online (scan the QR code at right). Please feel free to use this for your own self-study, or just to keep up with what your **tsek** (child/ren) have been practicing at school.

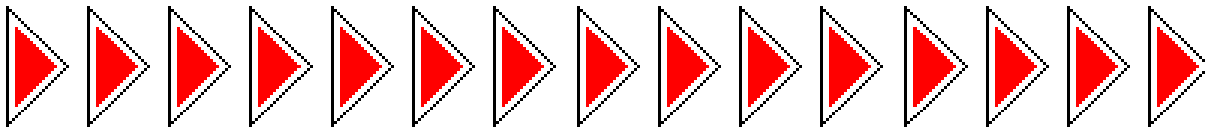

Meet Tsek Houdaqh’s Eel River Valley High School Site Lead

Alfredo is joining the Education Department’s team as the Humboldt Bay Native Youth Community Project’s Eel River Valley High School Site Lead. The purpose of the Humboldt Bay Native Youth Community Project is to increase community collaborative efforts that promote college and career readiness in Native American students.

My name is Alfredo Calderon, the new High School Site Lead working for Tsek Houdaqh. I am 33 years old, was born in San Diego, and lived in Mexico for the majority of my life. I went to elementary school in Mexico and for middle school I started transitioning to going to school in San Diego. My education continued in San Diego up until community college where I had a set ideal on getting a physics degree, I didn't know how hard it would actually be. It took me years to take the classes needed for me to do so and my 4-year college experience became a lot longer because of all the courses I had to take. When I finally finished my transfer courses for that degree, I moved to Humboldt in 2016 to continue my education. The one problem that I faced here which I did not expect to have experienced was that I felt an incredible loneliness; with no one that I could turn to for support when needed, it became very difficult to adjust to life here. As a result of that, I unfortunately had to leave school. In order to gather some funds to get myself back on my feet, I started working here and eventually left Humboldt in search of a better life. I tried many places and ultimately, I noticed that I was not happy; it wasn't because of where I was living but it was because I wasn't happy with how I left my dreams of studying physics. It took me a long time, perhaps a little bit longer than I would have wanted, to realize it. I had gone through so many jobs that were fun and in which I learned a lot but jobs in which I would always be remembered of my education path and how I missed it. After having a couple of jobs which made me realize that I could have been doing so much better if I had finished my degree, I decided to go back to school. All that time that I spent looking for a new life

served me as a lesson to realize that I could not leave my old life behind because it involved my dreams and the people that I love and the promise I made to them and myself. I am very happy to say that as of 2024 I am a graduate of Cal Poly Humboldt in Physics with emphasis in Astronomy. My goals after achieving that were always to help students who, like me, also struggle with their education in any way; for them to find their career paths and/or dreams and how they can uphold themselves and bring others close to them up as well. I would love to eventually be a teacher and inspire more students to continue even if it seems like a very hard subject to learn like Math or Physics can be. If I can do it, so can everyone else. I am very excited to be a part of the Tsek Houdaqh team and be of service and help to the Wiyot Tribe; wishing the best to everyone and for the opportunity to learn as much from you as possible. You'll be finding me more at the Fortuna High School site where I will have an office, but I will also be at the reservation some days. As an extra, feel free to recommend anyone who needs help in Math or any Science class over so we can find the right way to learn.

2024/2025 Honoring Wiyot Graduates

The Wiyot Education Department would like to honor Wiyot Graduates graduating College (honor sash), high school (honor sash), junior high/middle school (two strand necklace), and kindergarten/preschool (one strand necklace). To be eligible you must be a Wiyot citizen. Students are eligible for a graduation honor once per lifetime per graduation type.

Honor cords are provided to recognize Wiyot citizens at graduation ceremonies. Students may submit a complete application to scholarship@wiyot.us.

Students applying for this program need to meet the guidelines below.

Guidelines

The following items need to be included together to be considered:

1. Completed Wiyot Graduation Honor application form.
2. A copy of the student's most recent high school transcript (official or unofficial)
3. Student must be a registered citizen of the Wiyot Tribe
4. Student must be attending presently attending school.
5. Students are eligible for one graduation type Event PER LIFETIME.
6. Students must be classified as graduating.

Application deadline for honor cords is March 31th. Any applications received after this date may not receive an honor cord in time for graduation. Honor cords will be mailed out by April 14th, if the application is received by late applications will not be accepted.

2024/2025 Scholarship Awardee Spotlight: James Tipton

Native American students everywhere continue to pursue their higher education and job training. Whether you are working to achieve a personal goal, earn higher wages, or advance in your career, the Wiyot Tribe may have a scholarship/grant right for you and your educational journey. This month the Education Department spoke with, James Tipton, a 2023/2024 scholarship awardee, about his higher education journey and experience applying for Wiyot scholarships and grants.

What inspired you to pursue your higher education?

My inspiration to pursue higher education stems from a deep commitment to justice and advocacy for Indigenous communities. The injustices faced by Native Americans, from historical atrocities to modern systemic challenges, drive my passion to specialize in tribal law. I aim to help tribes address land disputes and preserve cultural rights, empowering them to protect their sovereignty and shape their futures.

Becoming a lawyer allows me to use the law as a tool for meaningful change—advocating for fairness, transparency, and the preservation of Indigenous voices. My education is a step toward honoring the resilience of our people and ensuring progress for generations to come.

What has the higher education experience been like for you?

My higher education journey has been transformative, and I owe so much of my success to the unwavering support and guidance of my parents, Martha and Thomas. They instilled in me a simple yet powerful belief: with dedication and hard work, I could achieve anything I set my mind to. Their encouragement laid the foundation for my confidence and determination to pursue my dreams.

From a young age, I was fascinated by the law—its structure, its potential for justice, and its power to create change. That fascination grew into a calling,

motivating me to earn a master’s degree in compliance law before embarking on my journey through law school. Each step along the way has been challenging, but it has also been deeply rewarding. My parents’ words constantly echo in my mind, reminding me that perseverance and commitment can overcome any obstacle.

What is one piece of advice you would give a Native American student who is considering pursuing a higher education?

For Native American students considering higher education, I want you to know that your dreams are within reach. Pursuing higher education is more than a personal achievement—it’s an investment in yourself, your community, and the future of our people. Every degree earned by someone in our community strengthens our voice, our representation, and our ability to drive meaningful change.

I would advise Native American students to seek mentors, join student groups, and surround yourself with people who support and inspire you.

If you have a dream, pursue it wholeheartedly. We are fortunate to live in a country where opportunities abound, and with dedication, hard work, and belief in your potential, there are no limits to what you can accomplish. Remember, every step you take toward your goals helps pave the way for others to follow.

Education, as well as everyone involved in making these grants possible. Director Hernandez's collaboration with my law school made the verification and disbursement process seamless, further demonstrating her commitment to supporting Tribal members in their educational journeys.

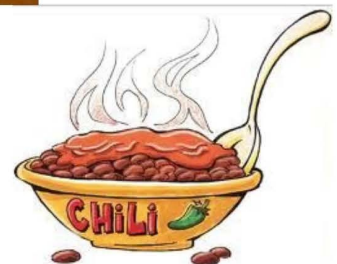
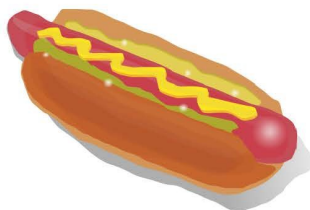

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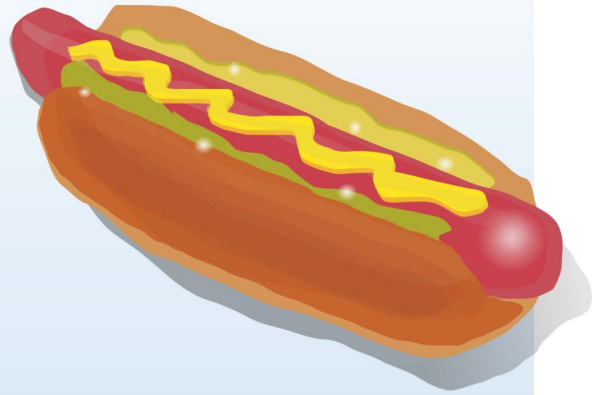
