Chwanuchguk Returned



March 20, 2025, the Wiyot Tribe closed on the land back transfer of 99.72 acres of Elk River Access property near Humboldt Hill to the Tribe. This land acquisition paid for by the State Coastal Conservancy was facilitated by Caltrot, who received funding for environmental restoration work in partnership with the Wiyot Tribe. Traditionally Chwanuchguk was a fishing village where salmon, caught in the river, was dried.

The Wiyot Tribe, partnered with Caltrot will be assisting in tidal marsh enhancements to restore the river and assist with the restoration project which will include sediment remediation, salmon habitat rehabilitation, riparian habitat expansion, and tributary restoration. The project will also protect, expand and enhance habitat, including native plant populations.

News of this land return is not yet public. More information will come as plans for public press releases unfold with Caltrot and Coastal Conservancy. The Tribe will be focused on an ecocultural restoration plan for the property that will include access for Tribal members for traditional cultural practices.

Do you have any information?

The Humboldt County Sheriff's Office is looking for relatives of human remains found in 1998. On 01-21-1998 the Humboldt County Sheriff's Office (HCSO) responded to a call of found human skeletal remains. Deputies met with a citizen who had been horseback riding in the area. The citizen led the deputies to the remains located on Clam Beach near the mouth of Little River. The remains were collected and later examined by an Anthropologist who confirmed they were human. The remains were sent to the California Department of Justice where a DNA sample was obtained. The sex of the remains was determined to be male. The DNA sample was entered into CODIS (Combined DNA index System) and compared to reported missing persons. No match was ever made. The case was also entered into NAMUS (National missing and unidentified persons system) under case number UP55179. The remains showed signs of being well-worn from either water or sand erosion. It was reported that there had been heavy rain prior to the discovery. It is possible that these remains are from an ancient burial site located near the beach or nearby rivers.

With the advance of technology HCSO has partnered with Othram Inc to complete Forensic Genetic Genealogy. A sample was sent to Othram Inc and later determined to be Native American. The most recent common ancestor was Catherine Prince born in 1843. Research shows Catherine was one of the sole survivors of a Native American massacre along the Van Duzen River near Alton. Catherine may have later been adopted by the Francis family of California. The Wiyot Tribe was contacted and noted the Prince family is documented within the tribe, but no relatives could be located.



ANA SOULATLUK CURRICULUM AND LESSONS



In March, Lynnika and Nina continued Soulatluk lessons at Loleta Elementary, and completed Unit 6: **Gaplhouyit!** (*Let's eat!*), in which students learned the names of several traditional foods like **malhuk/valhuk** (salmon), **ga'muk** (acorns), **hapay** (berries), and more; along with questions and phrases about being hungry, eating, cooking, and liking foods. We also taught Unit 7: **Lhatsik** (traditional story), in

which students learned core vocabulary from the **lhatsik** "Fortuna" and listened to Della Prince's telling of it. At **Tsek Houdaqh**, participants are currently learning Unit 6 (foods).

In April, we will teach Unit 8, which focuses on language about family. We continue making progress in preparing the Da Da'louy (2nd year) Soulatluk curriculum with help from our pedagogical consultants.



Also in March, we held our first hybrid (in-person and virtual) community language classes! We practiced language from the Rou Soulatlouy conversation book about feelings and health. It has been a fun way to connect with the tribal community wherever they are, and we hope you will join us in April! Check the Da Gou Rou Louwi' Cultural Center section of

the newsletter for April times and dates, and **wi vudawi'muduk ku wulasuk waw** (we will be glad to see you all).

All genres, narratives, story forms, are accepted and encouraged. This is a family-friendly event, all content should be acceptable for general audiences. Non-English films must have English subtitles.

We have limited programming time and space. Submissions must be within 1min-25min. Significant care and consideration will be taken for all films submitted through our open submission to ensure an equitable and fair experience.





Sacramento Pikeminnow in Wiya’t...What Did They Eat in Summer 2024?

Over the last two years, WNRD staff have been looking at stomach contents from pikeminnow caught during suppression efforts in the summers of 2023 and 2024. From October to February, we looked at around 200 stomachs from the 2024 season and tried to identify what organisms pikeminnow have been eating in the Lower Mainstem Eel, South Fork Eel, and North Fork Eel.

To save the stomach samples from the summer, field crews removed the stomachs, put them in alcohol to preserve the stomach contents, and froze them for later dissection. When the staff was ready to identify the stomachs, we thawed the samples out, cut the stomachs open, and used a microscope to look at smaller insects and fish bones.

We found all sorts of stuff! Turns out pikeminnow will eat just about anything they can get their mouth around. Here are some examples:



A Letter From the Eel River Team

Dear Families,

As I meet with more students in Fortuna and East High Schools, I'm getting to know how I can best support them. Every student has a different amount of work that's needed from them, and they also have to think about putting in extra time in for their future goals like going to university or getting a job right after graduation. Managing the amount of homework that students get on top of schoolwork and then asking them to put in extra time to focus on their goals can be difficult, it's like a job; it is their job, in fact. Because this particular issue differs from student to student, some having a harder time than others, there are options that we must have available for them to succeed. Some students need a lot of help with homework, I can tell. Some others know they need help but will have a difficult time asking for or accepting help. I am slowly getting to know all the students and seeing where they land on this.

These past few weeks I've had appointments with students to apply to universities and scholarships. This is a great opportunity to get the ball rolling on their higher education as they don't generally have time specifically for that; I get to share resources with them as they need.

I've also had one on one time with some students to

help with classes and from what I can tell, it's usually the math classes they struggle with the most as it can be difficult to focus on. I'm finding out the most successful way of helping them is to just be present with them so they have less distractions and more affirmations in their work. I encourage everyone who is family to a student to sit with them for a small period of time and just be present with them during their hard work.

Whether you are working to achieve a personal goal, earn higher wages, or advance in your career, the Wiyot Tribe may have a scholarship/grant right for you. This month the Education Department spoke with, Tammie Nichols, a 2024/2025 scholarship awardee, about her higher education journey and experience applying for Wiyot scholarships and grants. Tammie currently attends Cal Polytechnic Humboldt and is working towards her Bachelors of Art degree in Social Work.

What inspired you to pursue your higher education?

I decided to pursue higher education in 2018. Initially I was pursuing a degree in nursing, but because of my experience working in Tribal social services I changed my major to social work.

What has the higher education experience been like for you?

My experience in higher education has not been easy considering I had never written an essay and really never imagined that someone with my life experiences can accomplish what seemed impossible. I pushed myself through every assignment (even when I wanted to quit). In 2024 I accomplish my Associate's degree

in social work and now pursuing my BASW. I am on track to graduate in spring of 2026.

What is one piece of advice you would give a Native American student who is considering pursuing a higher education?

If I had to give advice to native students, it would be this; you can do hard things if you just push yourself. Your education is something that nobody can take from you. You got this

My experience in applying for higher education funds through the Wiyot Tribe has been positive thus far. I find that Elizabeth is super helpful and very supportive through the process.


